Work in Africa

The first United States fighting for officials of Coryell county as unit in Africa to be cited by the Free French was a company of a tank destroyer battalion, according to reports received from north Africa.

Reports indicate that the unit was cited for "outstanding courage in battle", and that:

"Under the command of . it has accomplished by skilled maneuvers and exceptional daring in less than 2 days the recapture of an important locality occupied by the enemy, the destruction of a strong armored column which attempted to recapture the locality, and the capture of a motorized column which threatened its flank"

Other news from North Africa indicates that one tank destroyer knocked out 5 German tanks with James M. Phillips Frank K. Jones, seven shots, and that another time it knocked out 2 German tanks with 3 shots.

Further reports from the North Africa theatre indicate that those who know of tank destroyer action in the fighting there "uniof tank destroyer self propelled weapons."
