YOU MUST HAVE YOUR JOHN FRANK POST CLASSIFICATION AND PASSES AWAY IN **REGISTRATION CARDS! LOCAL HOSPITAL**

The deadline is February 1, 1943 for all between 18 and 38 to have their Classification and Registration cards in their posession at all times, under the severe penalties of the law, according to Gen. C. Watt Page, head of the Selective Service of Texas.

The 45 to 65's don't have to have classification cards because they are not classified but must have their registration cards.

If you don't do either of these, you are eligible, rather liable to a fine or even imprisonment they tell us.

HERE'S THE CAUSE FOR THE PRESENT HOUSING SHORTAGE

In the 1940 census there were Thursday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock 995 housing units, of all shades, in Gatesville.
