YOU MUST HAVE YOUR CLASSIFICATION AND REGISTRATION CARDS!

The deadline is February 1, 1943 for all between 18 and 38 to have their Classification and Registration cards in their possession at all times, under the severe penalties of the law, according to Gen. C. Watt Page, head of the Selective Service of Texas.

The 45 to 65's don't have to have classification cards because they are not classified but must have their registration cards.

If you don't do either of these, you are eligible, rather liable to a fine or even imprisonment they tell us.

HERE'S THE CAUSE FOR THE PRESENT HOUSING SHORTAGE

In the 1940 census there were 995 housing units, of all shades, in Gatesville.

Now, here's the reason there are no housing facilities here. Since January 1 there have been 768 different and distinct people applying to the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce for houses to rent. No, this does not include those wanting rooms, apartments, or any other accommodations, just houses only.

Still the FHA is holding up the grant of 25 new houses that can be built here. You figure it out, we can't.

JOHN FRANK POST PASSES AWAY IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

John Frank Post, age 46, a resident of Gatesville all his life passed away in the Coryell County Memorial Hospital at 9:18 Wednesday evening.

Mr. Post returned home from his work in McGregor Monday afternoon and was suddenly stricken. He was rushed immediately to the hospital but death came Wednesday night.

In 1917 Mr. Post enlisted in the army and was assigned to the 36th division, training at Camp Bowie, Fort Worth. He was an ex-service man serving with the United States in France.

After the war he returned to Gatesville and married Miss Genella Morrison in Oct. 1920.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock at Scotts Funeral Home with Rev. Lawrence Hayes conducting the service.

Mr. Post is survived by his wife and three children; John Frank Jr. and Fred Post of Gatesville, and Mrs. Henry Clay of Waco; one brother, Kirby M. Post, Tyler; four sisters, Mrs. Fred Knapp, Dallas; Mrs. L. K. Thomson and Mrs. Erman Chamlee of Gatesville and Mrs. J. T. Lesson, Abilene.

REDS GAIN, 'S NO NEWS

Moscow, Jan. 25 (AP). — The tottering German positions in the Donets Basin lost another prop Sunday when the Red army, after a 23 mile advance in 2 days captured the railroad town of Starobelsk, 52 miles northwest of Voroshilovgrad, a special communique, said Monday.

RAF BLASTS NAZIS

London, an. 24 (AP).—The RAF dealt the German war machine 2 smashing blows Saturday night, blasting the U-boat nest at Lorient for the fourth time within ten days and pouring a cargo of bombs on the heart of industrial western Germany.

SALES TAX WINS SUPPORT

Washington, Jan. 24 (AP). — Proponents of a federal sales tax received new support Sunday from the Brookings Institution and Wesley Disney of Oklahoma of the House ways and means committee.

PLANE WRECKAGE SOGHTED

Lima, Peru, Jan. 24 (UP). —

The wreckage of a missing Pan American Grace airways commercial plane with 15 persons aboard has been sighted from the air near Chaparra, 350 miles southeast of Lima, and signs of life were noted it was announced today.

MORE RATIONING YET

Washington, Jan. 24 (AP). — Secretary of Agriculture Wickard, declaring it good common sense to give the military forces and the lend lease programs first claim to the nation's food supply, called upon civilians today to accept rationing as a "part of the price of victory".

TANKS HURL BACK NAZIS

London Jan. 24 (UP).—American tanks bolstering the sagging French lines in Tunisia have inflicted heavy losses on a German column in fighting which may gauge the course of the final African campaign, and American planes have downed or damaged 35 enemy aircraft without a casualty themselves in fierce dog-fights over Bizerte, it was revealed tonight.

FARM LABOR CONTROL SHIFTED

Washington, Jan. 24 (UP).—War Manpower Chief Paul V. McNutt tonight consolidated the farm labor supply functions of the department of agriculture and the U. S. employment service in a move to mobilize agricultural manpower more effectively.

ALLIES HIT AT RABAUL

Australia, an. 25 (AP).—Much bombed Rabaul, where 24,000 tons of Jap shipping was sunk recently and nearly 20,000 more tons damaged, has been raided again, the high command announced today.

BRITISH PRESS ROMMEL

North Africa, Jan. 24 (AP). — Without a break in its stride, the British 8th Army has sped on far to the west after occupying Tripoli and caught up with the enemy rear guards who are under a continuing assault by air, land and sea forces, Allied reports from Cairo said today.
