120 Apply For Citizenship At Camp Hood

One hundred-twenty enlisted men at Camp Hood have filled preliminary applications to become citizens of the United States under the congressional speed up plan only to men in armed services.

The process allows soldiers with 1 month's honorable service to make this application. Full citizenship is granted after the men have been approved and formal application made.

The men at Camp Hood will be investigated starting Feb. 15 by a group of examiners from the Western Judicial District of Texas. U. S. District Judge Charles A. Boynton will give the massed oath of allegiance later in the month at Waco.

COFFEE RETAILERS & WHOLESALEERS, THIS IS FOR YOU FROM OPA

Coffee wholesalers and retailers who were unable to obtain at the start of rationing, by means of purchase warrants, the total inventories of roasted coffee to which they were entitled, may now obtain certificates for such amounts, Mr. Nesbitt, chairman of the CCWP&RB announced today.

A new amendment authorized the board to issue certificates, effective Feb. 1.

They may apply for certificates in Feb., and must submit to the board a statement declaring the weight value of purchase warrants they were allowed to issue, how much coffee was actually acquired on purchase warrants they issued, and how many pounds they transferred between 12 12 42 and 1 26 43, against purchase warrants issued by others.

A wholesaler who has acquired roasted coffee on a certificate issued by OPA as the result of a petition for inventory adjustment will have the weight of that coffee deducted from the amount allowed.

Retailers or wholesalers who receive delivery of coffee against purchase warrants, after receiving a certificate under the new amendment, must surrender to the board for cancellation by 3 15 43, coffee stamps, or certificates equal in weight value to the roasted coffee received.

38% OF CHEESE FOR ARMY

Washington, Feb. 7 (AP).—Sec. of Ag. Wickard issued an order today which was designed to reserve about 38 percent of the cheese for military and lend-lease and other war requirements. Guess that's "the big cheese".

REDS BATTLE FOR ROSTOV

Moscow, Feb. 7 (AP).—A special announcement tonight said that the entire southern bank of the Don had been cleared of German resistance and implied that only the 1400 foot river stood between the victorious red army banners and Rostov as artillery duelled across the stream in the opening salvos of a new battle for the city on the Don.

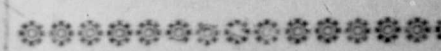

HOW TRUE PROPHECY WE REALIZE NOW

F. V. Clark, a reader of the Dallas News recently sent in the following article to the Dallas News, which appeared in its columns:

Dec. 23 was the eighty-sixth anniversary of the birth of Woodrow Wilson, who was one of the few great statesmen and men of letters produced by the United States.

When it was apparent to him that the covenant of the League of Nations would likely be rejected by the United States Senate he uttered the following prophetic words in an address at St. Louis Sept. 25th, 1919.

"Boys, I told you before you went across the seas this was a war to end wars, and I did my best to fulfill the promise, but I am obliged to come to you in mortification and shame and say I have not been able to fulfill the promise. You are betrayed. You fought for something you did not get. And the glory of the Armies and Navies of the United States is gone like a dream of the night, and there ensues upon it, in the suitable darkness of the night the nightmares of dread which lay upon the nations before the war came, and there will come sometime, in the vengeful providence of God, another struggle in which not a few hundred thousand fine men from America will have to die, but as many millions as are necessary to accomplish the final freedom of the peoples of the world."

GASOLINE COUPONS MUST HAVE CAR NUMBER & STATE

There has been some misunderstanding relative to passing gasoline coupons in the purchase of gasoline as to whether these coupons should have certain information on the back of them. Stations have accepted them without the information in the past, some of them, and now find that they must have this if they are to secure additional gasoline for sale.

Hereafter, according to one dealer who was talked to, each coupon, whether A, B, C, T-1 or T-2, must have on the back of them the license number of the car and the state of registration:

Another matter over which the stations have to say in the matter is that of selling for cash. "Commencing Feb. 1, 1943 no person shall, directly or indirectly, grant or accept or participate in granting or accepting of credit in connection with the same of any petroleum product by or through any retail outlet." That is the ruling that the filling stations must abide by in the future, and persons who have been accustomed to credit need not be offended when he starts to drive off and have it charged when the "filler upper" says "cash, please".
