Sgt. Loyd L. Ivy has written his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Ivy of Gatesville, Rt. 1, and sends with the letter an Algerian Bank Note, 5 francs, and the writing is Banque DE L'Algerie, Cinq Francs and also on the same note, is some Arabic, Turkish or some of those languages, which probably no one in Gatesville knows.

Ex-Hood Owners Can Get All Or Part Of Money

Special Assistant to the U. S. Attorney General, Nathan J. Harben, was conferring with Clarence O. Bussa, Project Manager of the Local War Department Land Purchasing Office at Gatesville, Tuesday, regarding land-owners who have sold their property to the Government getting their money.

Mr. Harben stated that \$250,000.00 was on deposit in Waco banks with which to pay for this land.

The main part was that whether or not final settlement has been made, the land owner can get a part payment, and if not satisfied with the price set this can be settled later. And, to put it another way you can get a "down-payment on your farm or if final settlement is satisfactory you can get it 'paid in full'".

In a few cases, where the title is not in order, nothing can be done until this is straightened out.

REDS GAIN NEAR SMOLENSK

London, Mar. 10 (AP).—Soviet troops fighting from a new defense line below Kharkov repulsed Axis attacks Wednesday, killing hundreds of Germans and destroying 35 tanks, Moscow announced at midnight.

MORE SOCIAL SECURITY BY FDR

Washington, Mar. 10 (AP).—President Roosevelt Wednesday sent to Congress a revolutionary plan to achieve freedom from want thru unprecedented government influence over the nation's post war economy and an immediately expanded cradle to the grave Social Security system. Utopia! As Babson says "2 and 2 makes 5 for the New Deal, but after it's over, it'll still make 4."

MUNICH RAIDED

London, Mar. 10 (AP).—The RAF struck explosives and fire deep into the heart of Naziism for the 2nd straight night with a 500 ton blockbuster and incendiary attack delivered by the big bombers on Munich Tuesday night and followed it Wednesday afternoon with extensive fighter sweeps over France.

ROMMEL TRAPPED (?)

N. Africa, Mar. 10 (AP).—Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's

British 8th Army began testing Marshal Erwin Rommel's crippled tank forces Wednesday preliminary to a Tunisian showdown in which Montgomery promised to give the enemy a bloody nose now that he is "caught like a rat in a trap." REVOLT HOPEFUL IN FRANCE

London, Mar. 10 (AP).—Fighting French headquarters declared Wednesday that hundreds of Germans have been killed in attacks by Frenchmen protesting the Nazis' conscription of labor, and one spokesman asserted that resistance and outbreak are now mounting in France daily.

STANDLEY CRAWFISHES

Moscow, Mar. 10 (UP).—Admiral Wm. H. Standley, U. S. Ambassador, conferred with Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov Wednesday afternoon at the Kremlin, 2 days after his complaint that American aid to Russia had not been sufficiently acknowledged. He thinks his complaint was misunderstood.

UNION CONTROL BILL PASSED

Austin, Mar. 10. (AP).—By a

majority of 49 votes the Texas house of representatives today passed and sent to the senate a bill bringing activities of labor unions under state security. Reck on it'll stick?

ALL 3-A's CALLED BY FALL

Washington, Mar. 10 (AP).—A hint that the rate of draft inductions may be speeded came today in a statement from Charles F. Taft, assistant director of the office of defense health and welfare service that all 3-A registrants may be inducted by next summer.

LEND LEASE GETS 'YEAR'

Washington, Mar. 10 (AP).—A year's extension of the lend lease act was voted overwhelmingly by the house today after it blocked a republican sponsored attempt to state specifically that congress shall have the final say on what this nation will seek as payment for its wartime aid.

TEAS SOLONS WANT AAA CHANGED

Austin, Mar. 10 (AP).—A resolution approved today by the house agricultural committee petitions the federal government to further remove cotton acreage restrictions for the maximum production of feed and edible cotton.

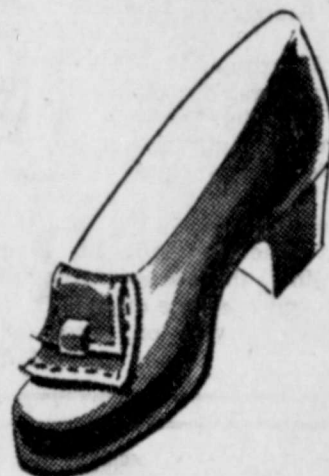

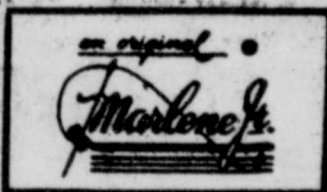

From Guadalcanal Island

The following letter from their son, Pvt. Volley Jack Gates, was received by Mr. and Mrs. John T. Gates, Cherokee, Texas. Pvt. Gates is a nephew of Mrs. Byrd Whitt of Pearl.

Solomon Islands.

Dear Folks:

This letter leaves me just fine. Hope you are the same. I'm out here in the land that God forgot, Guadalcanal, Solomons Islands. You can find it easy on the map. I'm driving a large gasoline truck, filling airplanes. So you don't need to worry about me. I'll be okay. There is nothing here much but coconuts, limes, lemons, pineapples, bananas, etc. All kinds of animals from horses to monkeys. A lot of Japs but not as many as there were, and a bunch of rugged Marines. This place is very hot, and work is very hard, and truck driving on the place is no exception. I'm still in the Air Corps ground crew and like my job fine. We have been at New Caledonia—you can find that on the map too. I wrote you there and also got your letter of Dec. 4th there. We've been everywhere since we left the states. I can tell you lots of things when I get back. We usually stay out here 5 or 6 months then come home on a 30 to 40 day leave. I'm looking forward to coming home but am doing okay. So don't worry if you don't hear from me often because

we don't have much time. Write soon and often. I'll get it some day. Tell everyone hello for me. I'll see them when I come home. Love to all, your son, Jack Gates.

Jack is 18 years old and graduated from the Cherik high school last May 13th and volunteered in the Marines Sept. 23, 1942. He was reared in the Salt Branch community where his folks still reside.

Dear Friends:

It is always difficult to know just how far we should consider personalities in connection with legislation. We recognize that this is, or should be, administered by men. The stronger the influence of bureaucracy, the more directly the personality of men will influence our government. The weaker the influence of the bureaus, the less the course of events will be directed by individuals and the more completely will the activities of the government and of the citizens be directed solely by laws. As one who believes it desirable to prevent the consideration of power, I believe that we should do all we can to keep this a government of law and to be governed by laws, applicable to all alike, and not allow it to become a government controlled by personalities.

On the other hand, in taking action on policies, Congress must take into consideration the personality of the men who will carry out the policies. A good example of this occurred this week. The House considered a resolution to establish a new committee on aviation. I feel that the present as well as the potential importance of aviation to the Nation as a whole would justify the creation of a new committee of which would have control of freight rates on air-borne commerce. I feel that the South and West have suffered so long under the unjust zone system of freight rates which now make it cost 165% more to ship manufactured goods from Texas to any point in the Northeast than it costs to ship the same goods from a factory in that favored territory to Texas, that we are justified in taking any action we can to get a part of the control of freight rates away from the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, the members of which Committee have always stood in the way of any freight rates reform. I had therefore thought that I would support the creation of the new committee.

It developed, however, that the Republicans had already committed themselves to placing Mr.

Ham Fish on this proposed committee. It also appeared that if the committee were created that certain Democrats who are almost as indiscreet as Mr. Fish would have places on the committee. The State Department, remembering Mr. Fish's activities before the war, including his visit to Von Ribbentrop, felt that it would be most dangerous to create a committee with the membership that this committee would have had under the seniority rules of the House. I felt that these fears were well founded. Evidently, an overwhelming majority of Democrats as well as a substantial number of Republicans felt the same way because the new committee was finally defeated by more than one hundred votes.

This should not, however, be taken to indicate that the Congress is not deeply interested in the problem of post-war aviation. On the contrary, I take this action simply to indicate that the House wants this problem settled in a more judicious manner than Mr. Fish and his colleague, Mrs. Luce, have evidenced in the past. The United States has been building and is continuing to build airports all over the world. These bases are being built for military purposes at this time but after the war, they will be essential to the development of commercial aviation. Most of these bases are on the territory of foreign nations. Of course, the war will not wait while we work out agreements as to their post war use, but on the other hand, it seems clear to me that we should be making agreements with our allies now to guarantee that our air commerce will be privileged to use these fields which have been built by our troops without discrimination after the war.

I believe that these arrangements can best be worked out by our State Department without the interference of Ham Fish or Mrs. Luce, and I hope that the vote in the House on this measure will be taken as a mandate to the State Department to proceed with all dispatch. I know that we can make a far better trade now than we can after the war is won.
