## Work To Start On New Patio For Galesville USO

Everything's shipshape, and soon Galesville's Soldier Haven, the USO will add the new Patio, which will be placed east of the building, providing facilities for at least 500 more men.

Plans call for 3,150 square feet of concrete, a 75 foot picket fence with 3 indexed seats arranged in the fence, moving back to the back of the building. A 75 foot awning to extend from the building 10 feet out to provide a porch overlooking the activities on the Patio.

An 8 foot stone wall, 30 inches high and one foot wide will be built around the flag pole which will also hold a flower garden. A regulation official shuffleboard court will be made into the floor. Fifty pieces of rustic wood furniture will be placed on the Terrace and Patio.

### 8TH'S BIG PUSH ON

London, Mar. 17 (AP).—An assault which appears to be a major attack by the British 8th Army against Marshal Erwin Rommel's Mareth Line positions in south-eastern Tunisia is under way, the German radio announced Wednesday while field dispatches reported that allied forces were getting set in the Tunisian north for the final coordinated blow to drive the Axis from Africa.

FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN

W. R. POAGE

March 12, 1943

Dear Friends:

Sometime ago I predicted that this Congress would exercise a larger degree of independence. This afternoon the House gave a very convincing demonstration of its determination to accept responsibility for domestic legislation by passing a bill which definitely placed the control of large salaries under authority of law rather than under executive order. The preceding was extremely confused. As a matter of fact, I am afraid that some of the confusion was deliberate and that it was planned by a few members who did not want their constituents to know just how they voted.

The bill under consideration was the Debt Limit Bill. The first three sections of the bill simply raised the national debt limit from 125 to 210 billion dollars. This increase formidable as it is, was absolutely necessary if we are to continue our all-out war effort. No one welcomes such a debt, but as in the case of practically every measure where the prosecution of the war is clearly involved, the House was almost unanimous in its willingness to do the necessary thing. The item that caused the debate was Section 4 of the Bill. This section was also known as "the Disney Amendment".

This section related to the President's executive order limiting all salaries to a net of \$25000. Of course, this is an issue on which a demagogue can easily arouse prejudice and misunderstanding. So few people make salaries of this sum that it is easy, from a political standpoint, to do this small group an injustice. I don't suppose that there is a single person in our District who makes such a salary. I think most of us will agree that no one should be allowed to get rich out of this war. I have long advocated legislation to prevent the development of a "crop" of war millionaires, and I have supported the tax legislation which we now have that takes 90% of the earnings of both individuals and corporations in the higher brackets. This combined corporate and individual tax makes it possible for the Government to take as high as 99% of the returns from certain of the very large closely held corporations. It must be admitted, therefore, that Congress has done a great deal to prevent anyone from making a great fortune out of this war, but these highest taxes are what is known as "excess profits" taxes. I think all "excess" income—that is all extra income earned as a result of the war—should be strictly limited.

The Presidential order which has been issued in spite of the fact that Congress had never

granted the authority to issue it undertook not only to prohibit new salaries of this figure but cut all salaries back to this amount. This is contrary to the policy followed in regard to fixing ceilings on all other prices and wages. In other cases, the ceilings were definitely limited to prices or wages existing when the war began.

The Disney Amendment (Sec. 4) prohibits by act of Congress the fixing of any salary in excess of \$25000. net for a year unless such salary was being paid before the United States went to war. If a salary were higher before December 7, 1941, it can, under this provision, remain at its pre-war level; but it can not be raised as a result of the war. I think this is fair. I think that it is a matter that should be controlled by law and not by decree. I therefore voted for Section 4 of this Bill. The votes were taken on various motions to substitute, amend, etc., and were not recorded; hence it will be impossible to read the Record and learn how anyone stood. Some of the members wanted it this way because they did not believe that their people would understand the issues involved. I believe that the people of Central Texas are intelligent enough to understand and to want fair play for everyone, and I believe that they expect me as their representative to vote for justice and Constitutional government and to let them know how I voted.

Earlier this week the House had shown just as conclusively that it would go along with the President on any measure which he showed it might be needed to win the war. On Wednesday by a vote of 407 to 6 the House voted to continue the Lend-Lease program of aid to our Allies. I think this is most convincing proof that practically the entire membership is anxious to cooperate with the Administration in the winning of the war. Lend-Lease is costing us billions of dollars, but it is saving thousands of American lives, and I am sure that the American people want us to spend every dollar that will contribute to the shortening of the war.

The "A" plant of the company produces the Texan (AT-6) advanced trainers for the Army, Navy and United Nations. NAA has also originated and produced the NAA Mustang Fighter, both Texan and Mustang being their own designs.
