Supreme Court To Look Over OPA Rent Control

Washington, Mar. 19 (AP). — Supreme Court was asked Friday to pass on the constitutionality of rent control powers of the Office of Price Administration.

Edward Roach of South Bend, Ind., filed the appeal. Judge Thomas W. Slick in the federal district court at South Bend dismissed the suit on the ground that the delegation of rent control powers to the OPA was unconstitutional.

Judge Slick ruled that "Congress never intended to delegate this omnipotent power (the right to arbitrarily fix rents at certain levels) to the administrator of the emergency control act, and if it was so intended, the act, under such circumstances, is unconstitutional."

And here, again from Dallas. — "Modification of rent regulations to permit landlords speedier recourse in cases of non payment of rent was announced Thursday by the Dallas Rent Control Office, effective Wednesday.

Under the change, the waiting period for starting eviction proceeding, after written notice is given, is in accordance with local laws, but not less than 3 days. In as much as there is no statutory waiting period in Texas, the 3 day rule will apply in Dallas.

The 10 day notice period now required will continue to apply in cases of eviction on other grounds.

TRUMAN BLANTON IS COMMISSIONED AT CAMP HOOD TDS

Here's The Law On Soldier Benefits

This will probably interest 75% of the people of Coryell county, and at least that many of our readers. It concerns the Family Allowances under Public Law 625, 77th Congress. This is from the 8th Service Command Headquarters, Dallas, and we are giving it this importance on account of the interest.

What is a Family Allowance?

A government check sent to the soldier's dependents regularly every month. The Family Allowance is made up of money set aside from his pay and money contributed by the Government. It is granted only upon application. It is payable only to dependents eligible under the law. Those include primarily, wife and child (Class A relatives), dependent parents and minor dependents, sister and brothers (Class B dependents).

How much does it cost the soldier? \$22 a month, if the allowance is for Class A only, or class B dependents only. \$27 a month, if it is for both Class A and Class B.

Examples. Wife \$50, wife and child \$62, wife & 2 kids \$72, father & mother only \$47, wife and parents \$80.

When does it begin? It begins to accrue the month after he applies and is payable when that month has ended. For instance, if he applies in March, the allowance begins to accrue in April and is payable in May.

Who may apply? The soldier as soon as he enlists. All enlisted men in the 4th, 5th, 6th or 7th grades may apply. Dependents may apply, too, but it is better for the soldier himself to do it. His wife or child (also a divorced wife to whom alimony is payable) may receive this benefit with or without his consent. But Class E dependents may receive it only if the soldier agrees.

How to apply? Application only on official form WD, AG 625. These are available at Reception Centers, Recruiting Stations, local Red Cross Chapters, Service Command Hdqs., and the Office of Dependency Benefits.

Is documentary proof of relationship and dependency required? Yes, and soldiers or relatives should gather proof before submitting applications and attach it to application. This is certified copies of public or church record of marriage and of the birth of the soldier's children, 2 affidavits of dependency, sworn to by disinterested persons, for each Class B dependent named in application. Evidence MUST accompany any application filed by a relative or dependent of the soldier.

Army men may authorize Class E allotments from their pay for

BUTTER, OLEO, LARD FROZE

Washington, Mar. 21 (AP). — OPA today banned for a week the retail sale of butter, margarine, lard and other edible fats and oils which go under point rationing March 29.

OFFENSIVE OPEN IN TUNISIA

London, Mar. 21 (AP). — Gen. Montgomery's British 8th Army is "on the move" against Marshal Rommel in southern Tunisia, Prime Minister Churchill announced dramatically just before 10 p. m. tonight, in what apparently is a major offensive to smash the axis troops left in Africa and prepare the way for an invasion of Europe.

HITLER POPS OFF

London, Mar. 21 (AP). — The destruction wrought by American and British air bombings wrung from Adolf Hitler the admission today that German soil had become a "war zone," but he declared the crisis on the eastern front was overcome and that the German nation was moving in a gigantic mobilization toward "success until final victory."

JAPS FAIL IN BURMA DRIVE

New Delhi, Mar. 21 (AP). — British Indian troops appeared to be holding their own Sunday against a Jap onslaught in the Arakan district of Burma, where heavy fighting was reported Saturday, and a British communique said no important change had taken place there.

COAL CONCILIATOR TO APPEAR

New York, Mar. 21 (AP). — Edward R. Burke, president of the Southern Coal Producers Association, said Sunday the appearance of federal conciliator at the Southern Appalachian joint wage conference between representative of the UMW and the operators Monday is a logical possibility.

GOP FOR RUMPL PLAN

Washington, Mar. 21 (AP). — Calling for enactment of the Ruml plan to skip an entire income tax year, a Republican minority of the House ways and means committee described the administration tax collection proposal as a straightjacket for small taxpayers and soon to the wealthy.

REDS LOSE BELGOROD

London, Mar. 21 (AP). — The Russians Sunday night acknowledged their forces had evacuated the town of Belgorod, 50 miles north of Kharkov on the upper Donets front where the German oggrndibr has been smashing ahead for days.

U-BOAT SINKINGS RISE

The much heralded Axis submarine offensive appeared under way as more cargo ships were announced last week as sunk in the Western Atlantic, the highest weekly announcement toll in those waters in 2 months.

This raised to 634 the Associated Press tally of announced western Allied and neutral cargo losses since Pearl Harbor.

BERLIN DAMAGED BADLY

Stockholm, Mar. 21 (AP). — Marshal Goering's sprawling, gay tone air ministry building in Berlin suffered a direct hit in the RAF's big raid on the German capital March 1, and thruout the city 30,000 were left homeless, trustworthy sources reported tonight.

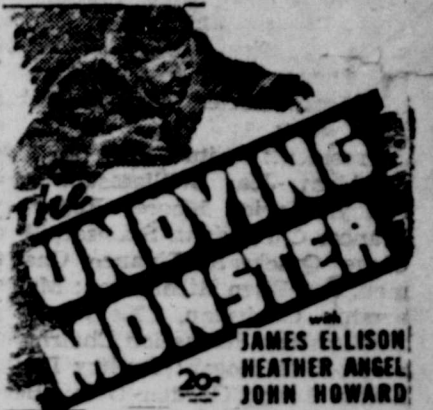
