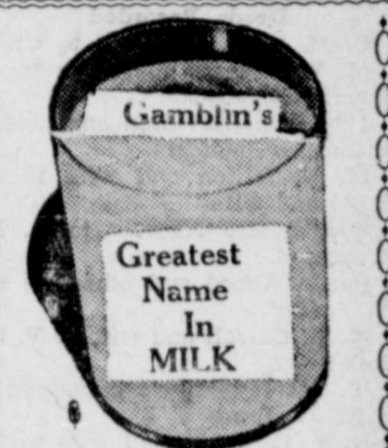

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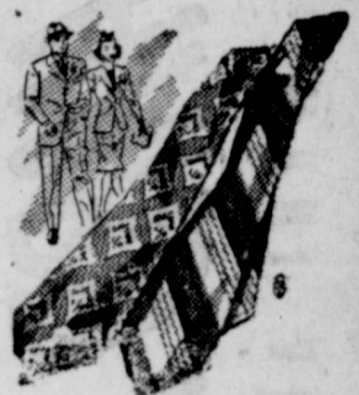

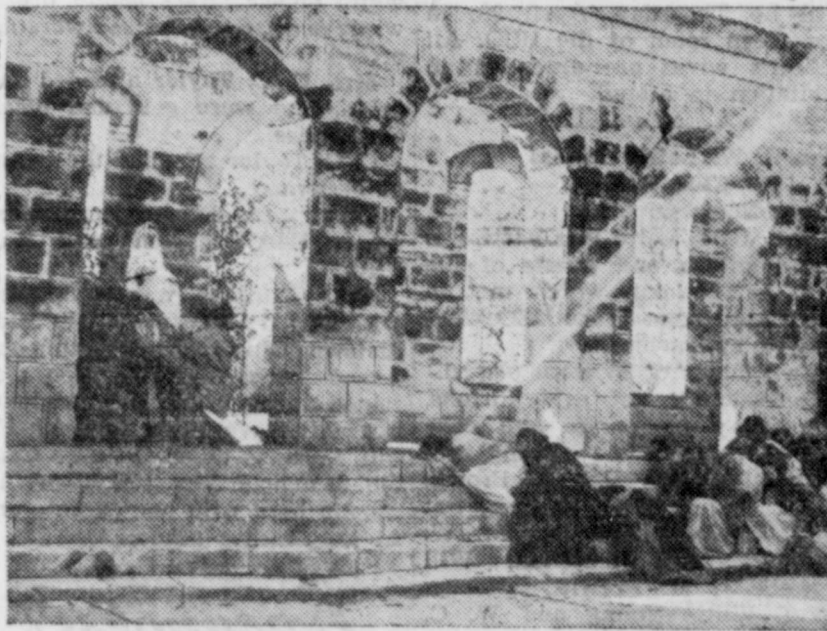

From Mrs. J. W. Whittenburg of The Grove, comes this information regarding a former Texan. Sgt Jack Eozer of Arnegard, N. D. is mentioned in an AP news story about a heavy bomber group which was stationed in England, then went to North Africa and now is back in England.

He is waist gunner on the "Liberty Lad" Liberator bomber known as a "Miracle Ship" because it has completed 25 raids in both war theatres and suffered only five minor holes.

The group left England on a short notice with clothes enough for only a few days. For three months it operated without any ground crews, combat crews doing the servicing on their own planes. It made the raid on Sfax last Dec. 21, which was called the "best bombing in the middle east." The group has made 10 raids on Italian territory flying as much as 900 miles to targets and returning after dark. (From Milliston N. D. newspaper).

Jack was wounded just after this was printed, March 22, 1943. The war board wired his mother, Mrs. Chas. Peschek of Arnegard, N. D., he had been seriously wounded and was in an English hospital. Particulars of the detail or the accident were not given.

He was in England in active service less than six months after he enlisted March, 1942, being sent direct to Sheppard Field for his first 4 weeks of service, and he is a brother of Mrs. J. W. Whittenburg of The Grove.

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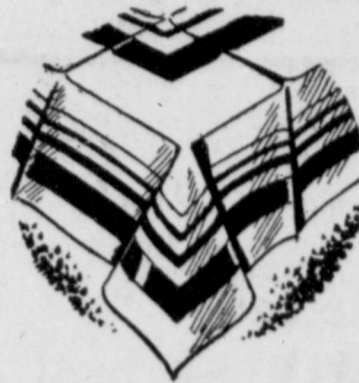

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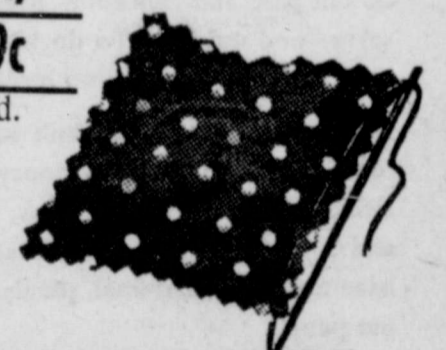
