### Missing 1 Year Sam Gribble Now P. O. W. Of Japs

J. M. Gribble of Gatesville has just received a telegram from the Adjutant General of the U.S. Army that his son Pvt. Sam H. Gribble, reported a prisoner of war of the Japanese government in the Philippine Islands, and that a letter will follow.

Pvt. Gribble has been reported "missing in action" since May 7, 1942, and was stationed in the Philippines.

Sugar. No. 12 in Book 1 good for 5 lbs., 3-16, 'til midnight May 31.

Coffee. No. 23, Bk. 1, good for 1 lb. 4-26 'til May 30.

Shoes. No. 17, Bk. 1, 1 pr. shoes thru June 15.

Meat, etc. Red stamps in WRB 2 used. Each holder Bk. 2 allowed 16 points per wk. Red stamps A, B, C, D, expires 4-30. Red stamps E, F, G, H, and J expires 5-31 and become valid as follows, E-4-25, F-5-2, G-5-9, H-5-16 and J-5-23.

Processed Foods, Blue D, E and F stamps 48 points in WRB two good for purchase of rationed processed foods 'til Apr. 30. Blue G, H, and J valid Apr. 24 thru May 31st.

Gasoline. Value of each coupon in A, B and C books, 4 gals. Third 3 coupons in A book good until May 21.

Tire inspection. All "A" book holders must have 2nd official tire inspection by 7-30-'43. Subsequent inspections, once every 6 months.

"B's" 2nd inspection by June 30. "C" 2nd inspection, May 31. "T" inspection 60 days of last inspection.

**WRB NO. 3**  
Will be distributed thru the mails to 120,000,000 individuals beginning June and ending July 21. Mailmen will leave post card applications at every home between May 20 and June 5. The card, properly filled out by family head, and mailed to OPA will bring the book.

Plenty of baby carriages, in fact 300,000 will be made in the next 2 months. Also, 163,500 strollers, baby-walkers and sulkies by June 30. Big crop expected.

Burial places of American soldiers who fall on foreign soil will be properly recorded by Graves Registration Units of the U. S. Army. Except when combat interferes, overseas burials are approximately the same as those conducted in the U. S. with full military honors rendered.

Maybe we won't see much of it, or, maybe any of it, but anyway, 16,500 officers and men are moving into North Camp Hood this week, within four miles of Gatesville. Before the war, if you remember, Coryell county's population was only 20,225, so this makes 4/5th's of our pre-war population moving. It's soldiers.

This is the "moving in" of the Replacement Training Center started yesterday.

Replacement center training will be suspended for the entire week, no new recruits will be received at the center, and no troops will be shipped out.

The trek, which started early yesterday over the 23 mile west range road, will be done by regiments, with each of the five regiments allotted one 24-hour period for its move.

The west range road will be clogged with RTC traffic without interruption until midnight Friday, when the wholesale movement will have been completed.

The move will be almost entirely by motor transport, men and equipment, with the 1,200 motor vehicles of the RTC doing overtime duty making the transfer.

All equipment, however, will be moved. Beds, for instance will be left in their present barracks, and new beds issued by the quartermaster at the North Camp. Other equipment which can be more economically re-issued at the North camp will also be left behind, Col. Walter A. Dumas, RTC commander has advised.

Heavy Motor equipment such as tank destroyers, will be sent to North Camp after the move has been completed.

At Camp Hood, men of the RTC will leave their company mess halls and move into big mass-production, battalion mess halls at North Camp Hood.

Contractors are working up to the last minute getting the RTC area ready for the mass move. The move will go thru on schedule, rain or shine.

The RTC occupies the lower

half of the new cantonment. Soon the Basic Unit Training Center will start moving its battalion from Camp Bowie to occupy the upper half of the area.

Final completion of the entire project is not scheduled until May 23, but it will be almost entirely in use by the time the last work is done on the construction contract.

The new cantonment comprises more than 2,000 buildings of theatre of operations type of construction and is located (as is most of Camp Hood) in the hills of Coryell county at the northern tip of the 160,000 acre military reservation which is the largest in the country.

The combined camp has a capacity of nearly 100,000 men and an actual strength of around 80,000, making it the largest in Texas. It is all under the overall command of Major General A. D. Bruce, commanding general of the Tank Destroyer Center.

Gosh, what a county!

### SEIZE KEY POSITIONS

N. Africa, Apr. 25 (AP). French troops have seized Djebel Mansour, strategic hill position ten miles southwest of Pont du Fahs the French announced today, while allied armor and infantry kept hammering at German positions along the mountainous 140 mile Tunisian front.

### RANGER SUNK IN ATLANTIC

The Berlin radio said last night (Sunday) that the 10 year old 14,500 ton U. S. aircraft carrier Ranger had been sunk by a German sub in the north Atlantic. No confirmation of this has been made by any allied source.

### McNAIR WOUNDED IN AFRICA

Washington, Apr. 25, (AP).—Lt. Gen. Lesley J. McNair, 59, one of the United States army's top leaders, has been wounded on the Tunisian front.

### REDS CAPTURE POSITIONS

London, Apr. 26 (AP).—Russian troops have seized the rocky mountains rimming the Black sea port of Novorossisk, last major German base in the Caucasus, the Berlin radio acknowledged last night, and the soviet midnight communique said that an attacking red army had improved its positions in that area.

### NAZIS APPROVE, WON'T COPY

The Berlin radio last night quoted official German sources as saying that they backed Japan's execution of American airmen who raided Tokyo. Another dispatch said "time will show" whether Germany adopts the Jap conception of international law in warfare.

Amos Chancy departed from this life on Sunday afternoon at 5:20 o'clock March 28. Making his stay here on earth 66 years and 28 days.

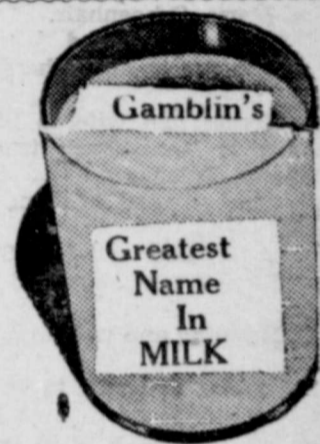

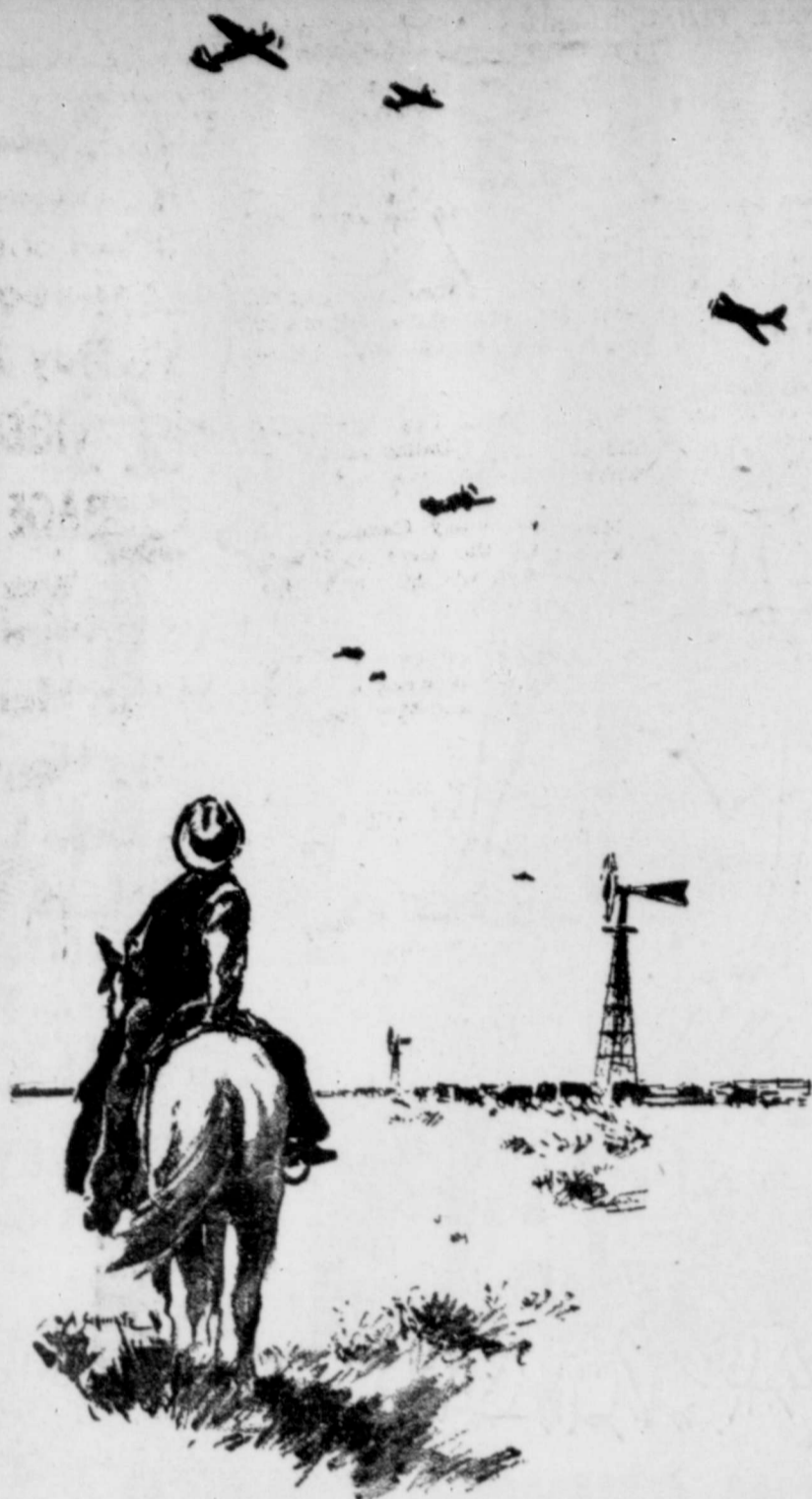

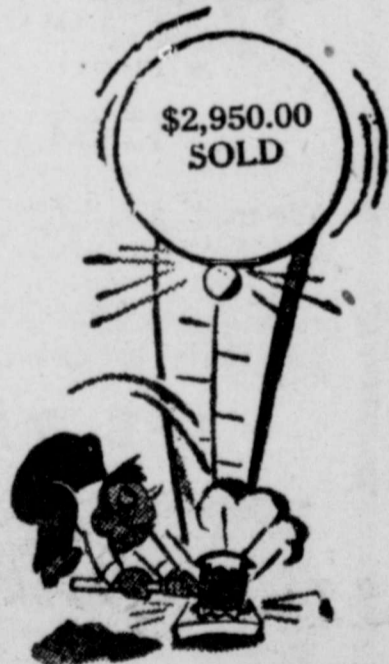

March 15,

Dear Folks,

I'm getting along just fine this is the best country I have been in. I have gained all my weight I lost over at the other place. I lost 20 lbs. This is the best country I've been in. The people over here are awful nice to us. And a lot of pretty girls, and do they like the Marines! Don't be surprised if I bring one back with me.

I have just had a 7 day leave sure had a good time. I went 200 miles from camp. I was invited out for dinner everyday I was gone. They drink hot tea six times a day. I don't like it too good,

but I sure like their milk, butter, eggs and meat.

Dixie is over here but I think he is in the hospital, I will go see him before long. I saw him over at the other country. I have seen lots of country and expect to see more. Our next place is Tokyo.

We don't have much to do now, I think we will start training soon, and I'm the happiest guy because I have a new gun and is it a honey. I'm liking the Marines better every day. I guess I'll stay another 4 years. I expect to go to China before I come back. I don't know when I'll come back to the states but don't worry about me. You know the Marines are the best.

How is Daddy getting along? How is Mary Sue and the other kids making it? I had a letter from Nina sure glad to get it.

Mother I get a letter from you once a week.

I have Daddy a gift. I'll bring home to him, it is some Jap's gold teeth, now don't that sound good.

I have been over in another tent singing, it didn't sound so good, but kept us from being lonesome.

Tell the kids hello and write.

Pete Jr. a letter for me and tell him I'm O. K.

I finally made a P.F.C. I'll be looking for a letter from you soon.

Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Wittie received the following letter from their son, Nathan N. Wittie who was stationed at San Diego before sailing overseas. Nathan was a football star from Gatesville high school in 1938-39. The letter reads "Feb. 16, 1943.

Dear Mother and all,

Since I only have a few more days here, I'll drop you a line to let you know I am O. K. We won't be here by the time you get this letter. I have an idea that we will go to Australia or North Africa. Boy I am going to be glad to get my chance at those dirty skunks. I know I will be one of the lucky ones who will never be hit with a thing.

I am sending some little snapshots of myself and Bobby. Some of them are just the negatives but you can have them finished, since I wouldn't have time to get them

back. The one of four of us is my crew. I am the Commander the other big guy is the gunner, Bobby is the assistant gunner and the other one is the driver. We really have fun and have one of the best crews in the Battery. I know we will get our share of the Japs or whoever we fight.

As soon as we get across you will get word of it. We filled out the cards today, stating that we had arrived safely over seas. They will be mailed as soon as we get there and you will get it in a few days. Now Mother don't you worry a bit about me. You know we have to fight for what we love, freedom to live as we please. It makes me feel good to know I have a chance to fight for what we know is right. If there is a branch of service anywhere you can depend on to be there fighting, it is the Marines.

Well I had better close and get some sleep because we have a big day tomorrow. We have just about all of our stuff aboard ship so we won't be long now.

Be good, keep well, and keep things going right till we all get back.

I hope to eat next Xmas dinner in the W. C. Wittie Home.

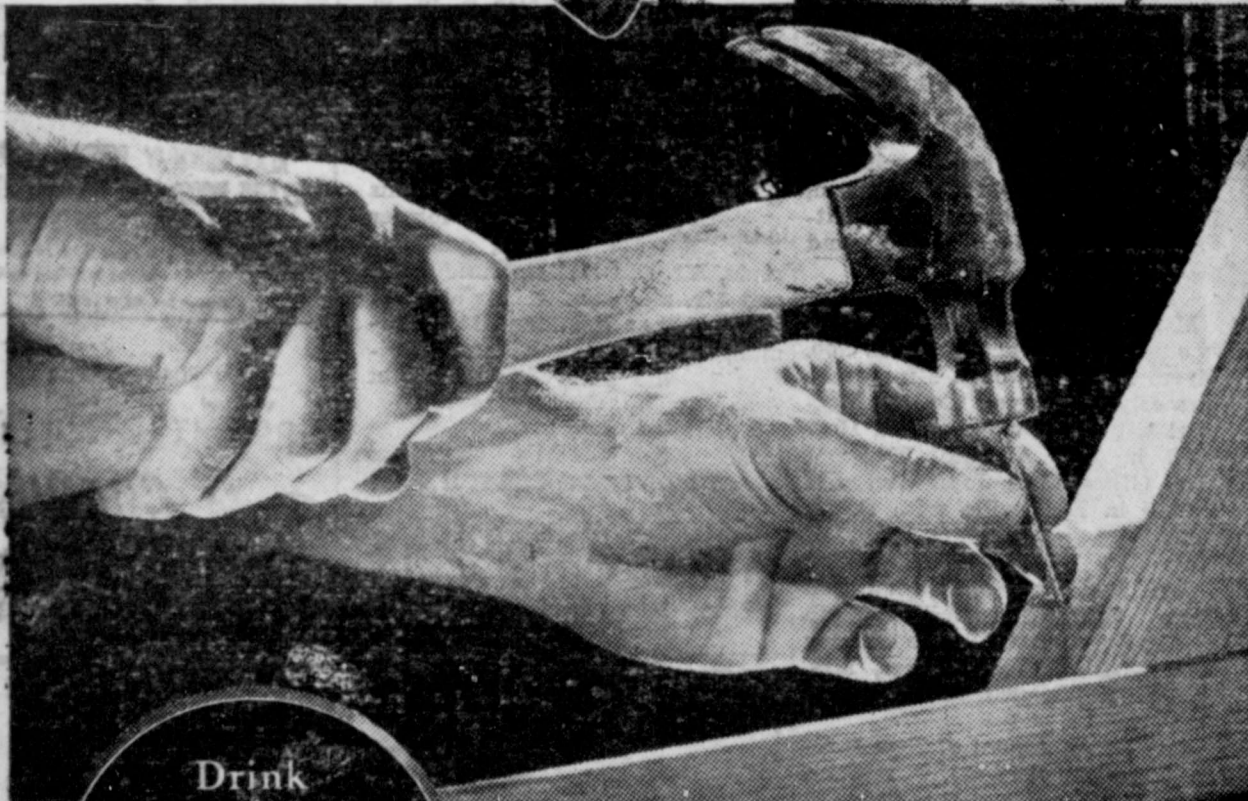

Lt. S. Alex Box, nephew of Chaplain John Neal, and among the first into Africa, was killed in action Feb. 19. Chaplain Neal received a clipping from La. State U. Alumni

News which contained a letter written from Africa by Lt. Box to his old roommate. The letter follows:

"Dear Red:

Have really been having a time of it down here. To the surprise of all, mainly myself at any rate, I was decorated this past week with the DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. Gen. Teddy Roosevelt did the honors, so all in all it was some ceremony.

The story is this. We were moving upon our final objective in battle. About midnight we were suddenly pinned down by machine gun fire—couldn't tell what was there—sent out patrols, no luck. So I volunteered to take my half track thru the village, locate enemy guns, knock them out if possible, and, if not to report their positions. Went thru—ran into point blank machine gun fire 27 mm. cannon and numerous riflemen—knocked out some of them—came back with equal success—reported to commander,

I went back thru town, drawing was a lopsided one, with the Bo enemy fire and thus disclosing ylemen riding far out on the long enemy positions. We gave patrols end of the count.

40 minutes and set out again — The Classification Club erased drew enemy fire—came back thru the TDRTC Adjutant Section and town throwing hand grenades Ration Sections softballers twice right into machine gun nests, then by top heavy scores. 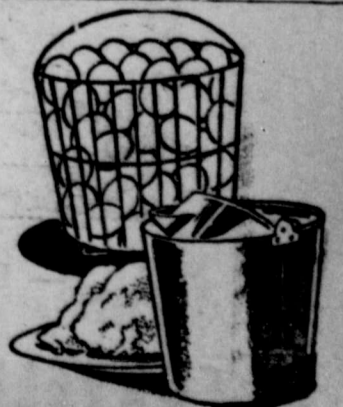

- Be sure door gasket makes a tight seal.
- Don't open door oftener than necessary—close it quickly.
- Do not store hot foods. Let them cool first.
- Clean dust from condenser coils periodically.
- Use fast freezing sparingly. Keep control at lowest setting to maintain safe temperature.
- Don't store canned goods, ketchup, and other items that will keep as well on the pantry shelf.
- Don't overcrowd shelves. Leave room for circulation.
- If an open unit model, keep oiled per manufacturer's directions. Sealed units need no oiling.
- Have your refrigerator checked by a competent serviceman once a year. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

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
