

a defense worker. In Gatesville, be working for the railroad, Blue-Bonnet Ordnance, or Camp Hood. It is essential that one member of the family be employed as such. a lot. 5. The houses will rent for \$25 .-00, \$30.00, and \$40.00 unfurnished. That is the price set by the administration and is not subject to change by the rent control.

6. The houses may be sold after a period of four months, but they must be sold subject to the restrictions under which they are built, namely; that they will be occupied by a defense worker, either as purchaser or tenant.

It is vital to the business interest of Gatesville that these houses be built at Gatesville. The Government must have the housing and desires that Gatesville citizens build them, but if they cannot be built here, the present allotment will be cancelled, and no further housing will be allowed.
