Citizens Asked To Build Defense Houses

Citizens of Gatesville are urged to build 25 defense houses in the near future, or that number that was allotted to Gatesville last February will be cancelled. Twenty-five additional houses will be allotted if they will be built here.

These houses must be built under certain restrictions, but the rental price allowed will give good revenue. The restrictions are as follows:

1. The house must be rented to a defense worker. In Gatesville, that means that the renter must be working for the railroad, Blue-Bonnet Ordnance, or Camp Hood. It is essential that one member of the family be employed as such. For instance, the family of a girl stenographer at Camp Hood would be eligible if she made that her home. More than two thousand defense workers will be employed at North Camp Hood alone.
2. The house must be built within 50 feet of all utilities.
3. The floor space is limited to 1,000 sq. ft. for five rooms and bath, 800 for four rooms, and 520 for three rooms, and the floor plan must place the bath adjacent to the kitchen so that the least a-

mount of critical material will be used.

4. The house can be either privately financed or financed thru the FHA. If it is financed thru the FHA \$500.00 is the maximum amount that will be allowed for a lot.

5. The houses will rent for \$25.00, \$30.00, and \$40.00 unfurnished. That is the price set by the administration and is not subject to change by the rent control.

6. The houses may be sold after a period of four months, but they must be sold subject to the restrictions under which they are built, namely; that they will be occupied by a defense worker, either as purchaser or tenant.

It is vital to the business interest of Gatesville that these houses be built at Gatesville. The Government must have the housing and desires that Gatesville citizens build them, but if they cannot be built here, the present allotment will be cancelled, and no further housing will be allowed. The need will be met by the construction of Government housing upon the area, all of which has been built at the other end of the camp.

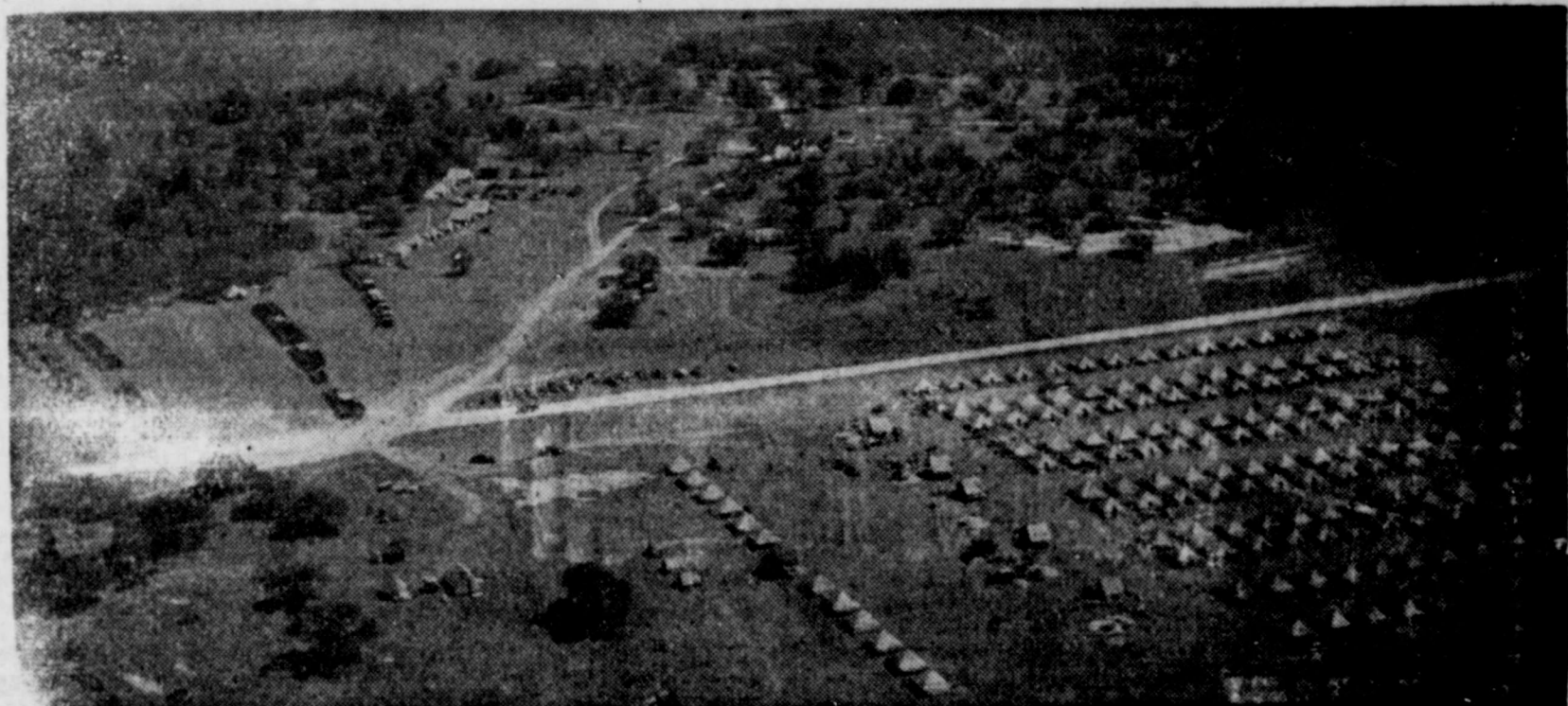

FDR-LEWIS LOCK HORNS

The War Labor Board turned the soft coal wage dispute over to the White House Wednesday thus heading it for a final showdown between President Roosevelt and John L. Lewis, the United Mine Worker's chieftain. "Biting the hand that's been feeding him". Maybe we'll finally find out who's running this country.

YANKS WIN NAZI HELD HILLS

N. Africa, Apr. 28 (AP).—The British Army threw in a powerful assault Wednesday against an Axis mountain position only 21 miles from Tunisia—the Djebel Bou Aoukaz commanding open stretches of the Medjerda Valley leading down to the Tunisian capital—while American troops completed the storming and capture of 3 important hill defenses on the route to Mateur and Bizerte.

RAYBURN "APOLOGIST" FOR BUNGLERS

Austin, Texas, Apr. 28—Senator Sam Rayburn of the national

House of Representatives, who spoke Wednesday to the Texas Legislature drew pointed criticism a few hours later from Lt. Gov. John Lee Smith.

"Rayburn continues to be the chief apologist for the bungling policies of Washington Bureaucrats," Smith said in a statement, "and especially of the labor coddling policy which now threatens our war effort".

THEY BACK UP ON JOB FREEZE

Washington, Apr. 28 (AP).—The entire nation will be put under an employment stabilization program within 48 hours to enable workers, under certain circumstances, to shift from one essential employer to another for higher pay, officials said Wednesday.

500 HOMELESS IN STORM

Akron, O. Apr. 28 (AP).—Northern Ohio counted 3 dead Wednesday night and destruction mounting upward of \$4,000,000 as it dug out of debris strewn by a series of tornadoes that left nearly 500

homeless and injured more than 150.

CANUCKS FLY OFF USIANS

Washington, Apr. 28 (AP).—Canadian pilots flying U. S. Warhawk fighter planes, joined the continuing aerial offensive against the Jap base on Kiska Island Monday, the Navy reported Wednesday, and assisted in delivering a total of 13 attacks during which a number of buildings were destroyed.

NAZIS USE FLAME THROWERS

N. Africa, Apr. 28 (AP).—British infantry stormed halfway up the last hill shielding Tunis on the west today while French gnomers on the southern front cut the Pont du Fah-Entfidaville road in a sudden shift of their attack which imperilled the flank of axis troops facing the 8th army. The axis, for the first time on the African front, was employing flame-throwing tanks, but its lines were straining almost to the buckling point in virtually every sector.

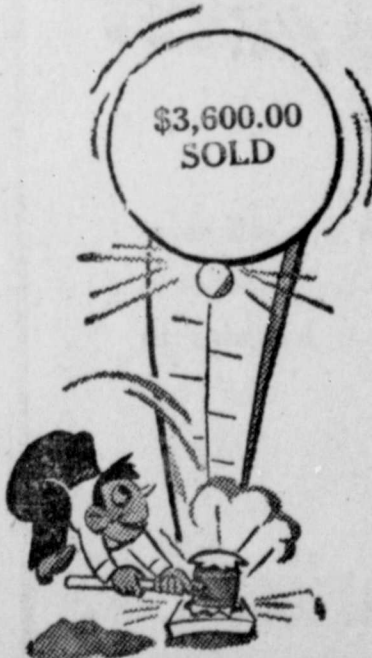

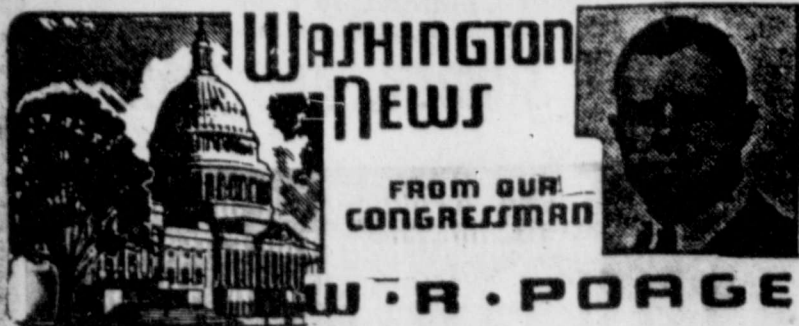

Dear Friends,

A sudden quiet has fallen on Capitol Hill. The debate on the Agricultural Appropriation Bill lasted for a week and a day. The sessions ran on into the nights and at times they became very heated. On the 21st we finally passed the Bill by an overwhelming vote. Before the final vote was taken, the Bill was amended in several important particulars. Most important of all was the "Cannon" Amendment which prohibited the Agriculture Department from using any of this money to make "incentive payments". I think that the wording of the Bill was clearly to the effect that this money should not be so used, and I feel that there has never been any authority to use public money for this purpose, but we have had such frequent experiences where these Departments exercised powers never given to them that those of us who believe that the farmer should be given a fair price in the market place wanted to be sure that the money we appropriated for conservation payment would not be used to keep farm prices from reaching a fair level; and that is exactly what the De-

partment planned to do with the "incentive payments". I think the most effective "incentive" to production is the assurance of an adequate price, I therefore voted for the Cannon Amendment.

Likewise I voted for the amendment to provide money for the continuation of the R. E. A., and I am happy to report this amendment carried, although the amount will be substantially less than in the past. In this connection it must be remembered that we can not at this time carry on the kind of R.E.A. program that we should like because of the shortage of copper. Therefore, this small appropriation is probably adequate for the time being. I trust that when material is available that we will be able to secure all of the funds needed for a really comprehensive R.E.A. loan program that will enable us to bring electricity to every rural home.

Since passing this bill we have considered several less important but highly controversial measures. Among them was the District of Columbia Appropriation Bill which was passed, but which always engenders considerable discussion. Then we debated the conference report on the Govern-

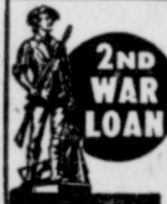
ment Pay Bill, and finally withdrawn by the committee that proposed it.

Throughout all of this debate there has been the constant background of clashing opinions in regard to the Tax Collection Bill. In the beginning there seemed to be no party alignment on this question, but as it has gone on, the great majority of the Republicans have lined up in favor of waiving or forgiving all of the taxes that would under the existing law be payable this year (based on last year's income). In like manner, a majority, but not all of the Democrats, have moved more to the belief that our government simply cannot give the tax payers a whole year's tax obligation or even a major portion thereof without seriously injuring our financial solvency. The Democrats have all realized the need of a pay-as-you-go and "collection-at-the-source" program and in a sincere effort to work out a compromise have offered the Republican more liberal concessions than we should in my opinion make. The entire problem will be again debated on the Floor of the House beginning on the 3rd of May. In the meantime, the House has recessed until that date. I hope to come home but realize that I will be able to stay only two or three days. I am sorry that I will not be able to spend enough time in Texas to visit over our district. As I have often pointed out, I believe that a Member of Congress will inevitably make a better Representative if he is able to visit the people he represents at frequent intervals. I, therefore, try to come home at every opportunity in spite of the fact that travel has become very difficult and expensive (and a Member of Congress must pay his own traveling expenses save for one trip per session).

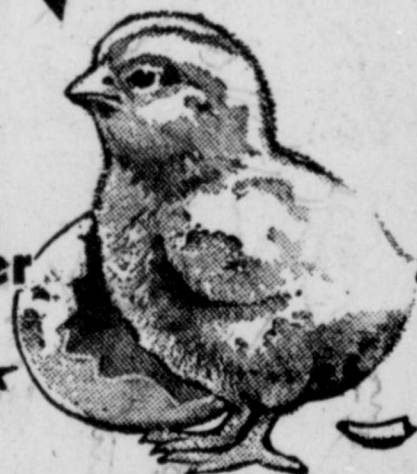

Will Americans Be More Tender With Their Money Than Lives of Their Sons

Washington, D. C.—A blunt challenge—whether Americans will be more tender with their money than with the lives of their sons—confronts U. S. citizens as they prepare to meet the appeal of the government to put an additional 13 billion dollars into the fight in the next three weeks.

American dollars which run off to some cozy shelter to hide while American boys are dying to defend our cities and towns from destruction and invasion will face a rising demand from all classes of patriotic citizens to come out and fight.

Millions of workers who now are buying War Bonds regularly out of current income must lend extra money to their government during the Second War Loan campaign (which started April 12).

In recognition of the spirit of sacrifice which is sweeping over the land as our troops swing into offensive action in Africa and await the signal for a landing in Europe, the Treasury Department is offering a series of government bonds to fit every pocketbook.

No matter whether Americans buy the familiar Series E Bonds or 2½ per cent bonds or 2 per cent bonds or tax certificates, they will be doing their part to make the Second War Loan drive a success.

Consumer Spending Too High.
Consumer spending in 1942 was

much too high to meet the war situation of 1943. Last year more than 82 billion dollars of our soaring national income went to feed the desires of Americans for clothes, recreation, foods and luxuries. As these items grow scarcer, more of our income must be diverted from such expenses into government bonds.

During 1942 millions of our fathers, sons, relatives and friends were in training here and abroad. Some were already in action. Casualties were beginning to bite into every community. War Bonds became a vital link between the home and fighting fronts.

Today sacrifice has become a way of life for America's fighting men. Civilian spending on the 1942 scale must go out the window if the home folks are to attempt to match the heroism of our boys at the front.

Not every American can take his place in a bomber or in a foxhole or on a fighting ship but he can fire away at the enemy by lending money to the government.

Previously I have mentioned to you my interest in the aged citizens of our state. Few of us have given enough serious consideration to the problem of these grand citizens of Texas during this time of war. The increased cost of living and daily necessities of everyone regardless of their age has been increased. There is an urgent need that all additional funds possible be added to the monthly payments for those in declining years.

House Bill 9 was passed in the Senate last week and sent to the House for further consideration, and if it passes there will be available, \$1,900,000 per month for Old Age Assistance to be matched by federal funds. This will make \$3,800,000 monthly for this purpose.

When the bill came up for consideration, I was endeavoring to secure \$2,000,000 a month, state funds, but with a close vote, I saw this was going to be greatly reduced. With a determination to keep our funds as high as possible when every effort was being made to reduce the funds, that would be available, I was able to defeat a substitute amendment to the bill, and succeeded in securing adoption of another amendment to the bill, raising the appropriation.

It is with genuine pleasure that I am able to report that the Old Age Assistance will have \$1,900,000

of state funds, plus an equal amount of federal funds a month, if the House will approve the bill as amended through my efforts in the Senate.

Should the House, for any reason fail to approve this appropriation, then it must go to a conference committee composed of both House members and Senators. That will mean additional work, but I will be found fighting this battle to the end. There are only a few days remaining before adjournment on May 11, and until that hour, every effort humanly possible for me to make will be made in seeing to it that our aged citizens get just and fair treatment.

I personally feel that we have done a good job for the aged, when we take into account the reduction in tax receipts, and the big reduction necessary to be made in all state governmental agencies.
