## Tentative Plans For North Camp Hood Opening

Friday evening, in the county court room, Lt. Frank W. Mayborn and Captain A. K. Querbacker, representing Camp Hood, N&S, met with a committee of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce, city officials and others to formulate tentative plans for the opening of North Camp Hood, which now, will be May 29.  
Those present besides the officers were Howard Frank, H. M. Jackson, Roger Miller, J. O. Brown, Mrs. Tom Mears, Floyd Zeigler, Eiland Lovejoy, C. E. Gandy, Joe White, Rufus Brown, Earl McClellan, Robert W. Brown, Floyd Murray, Edwin Majors and E. W. Palmatier.  
Committees have already been named by President Floyd Zeigler, and are entertainment, decoration, clean-up, transportation, and the controlling committee. Personnel of these have not been disclosed.  
Army camp plans will not be made known as yet, until they are definitely announced by the army, and the main discussion of the meeting was the handling of traffic in and out of the camp to prevent any jams, if at all possible. Entrance will be only at the main gate (highway 38 entrance nearest Gatesville) and a south entrance to take care of people from Lampasas, Austin and south.  
Tentative NCH program includes a flag raising, address, introduction of speaker by Gen. A. D. Bruce, invocation by Chaplain, music by massed Army Bands, parade of 12,000 troops, including WAACs, inspection of equipment and barracks, and visits to various ranges thruout entire Camp Hood.  
Stands will be erected for as much crowd as can be handled that way, and some reservations will be made, particularly for former landowners of NCH and the new part near Copperas Cove. Present, will be many dignitaries, newsmen and other officials, but further developments will be made as their certainty is announced.

## "FRANKIE & JOHNNIE WERE."

John L. beat President Roosevelt by 20 minutes in the recent "mine front" battle between the two.  
"John L. Lewis announced tonight (Sunday night) a two week agreement has been made with the government ending the work stoppage in the nation's anthracite and bituminous coal fields as of Tuesday, pending further negotiations". That's from one AP story.  
"President Roosevelt, speaking 20 minutes after John L. Lewis had announced a 15 day truce in the coal wage dispute, declared tonight that America faces a serious crisis and appealed for uninterrupted production.  
Mr. Roosevelt followed the text of the speech he had prepared before Lewis' New York announcement.

## STRIKE IN WAR, CRIME? YES!

Washington, May 2 (AP).—Aroused by the idleness of nearly 500,000 coal miners, senators were giving serious consideration tonight to legislation which would make it a crime to call a strike or interfere with operation of any essential industry in wartime. Well, if somebody wrecked a troop train, what'd they do? Or, sank a ship, and they knew who it was.

## 7,000 NAZIS SLAIN

London, May 2, (AP).—The red army has killed 7000 Germans and knocked out 25 armored cars to repulse a 6 day German offensive at the Black sea port of Novorossisk, last major axis foothold in the Caucasus, Moscow announced early today.

## WARSHIPS RAKE TUNISIA

N. Africa, May 2, (AP).—Fighting thru razorback hills so steep that advanced units were supplied with food and ammunition dropped from planes, American and French troops have pushed closer toward Mateur and Bizerte and Gen. Henri Giraud today predicted complete allied victory in Tunisia by May. British warships raked shore with with big guns.

## NAZIS TRYING TO RAISE ARMY

Stockholm, May 2 (AP).—German newspaper admission that total mobilization has failed to provide Hitler all the trained manpower he needs coincided with reliable reports here today that the nazis are trying to raise recruits in the occupied Baltic states.

Washington, May 2 (AP).—The finish fight begins tomorrow on pay as you go income tax legislation.

## 7 PLANES LOST; ST. NAZAIRE

London, May 2 (AP).—RAF bombers and fighters struck at industrial targets at Brindan in the Netherlands Sunday following a heavy raid Saturday by big American bombers against the German sub base at St. Nazaire that cost 7 planes.

## REDS PRAISE WAR EFFORTS

Moscow, May 2 (AP).—Pravda, Communist party newspaper, in a straight forward, front page editorial Sunday put the war effort of Russia's Allies in the same scale with the Red army victory at Stalingrad, and declared "the Hitlerite command fears active operations of our Allies on the European Continent like it would fear fire"

## 10TH OF MEAT FOR LEND-LEASE

Washington, May 2 (AP).—Lend lease administration figures showed today it shipped our allies about one-tenth of the available meat supply in the first three months of 1943.

## JAP KIERA BASE BLASTED

Washington, May 2 (AP).—Fighting thru weather so bad that results could not be observed American fliers dove hit twice again at the Jap base on Kiera in the Aleutians.

They practiced about three days and decided that they were ready. The Clown act was first and I mean every Carny who could possibly get away was there to see it and it sure was something.

Everything was fine until Zo Zo stood on Cecil's shoulders and attempted a back flip, to be followed by him holding his hands together and the Master of Ceremonies stepping his foot in Zo Zo's hands to get pitched for a back flip also. 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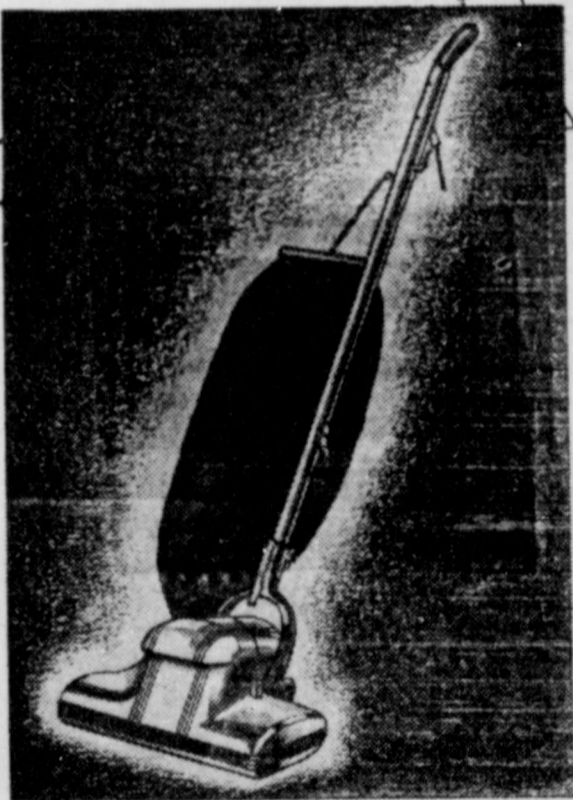


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Beating rugs by hand is hard on you and hard on your rugs, but it's your only alternative if you allow your cleaner to become damaged beyond repair. Here are a few hints on how to keep it in A-1 operating condition:

### TIPS ON CLEANER CARE

- Empty dust bag every time cleaner is used. Dust in bag reduces suction.
- Avoid running cleaner over pins, nails, coins and other hard objects. Pick them up by hand.
- Keep brushes free from lint, hair and threads. Clean after each use.
- If cleaner is not picking up threads, check belt to see if it is turning brush. Increase tension or replace belt if necessary.



- Be sure that brush is properly adjusted. Bristles should extend about one-eighth inch below nozzle.
- Coil cord loosely on hooks. Pulling too tightly may break wires inside insulation where cord bends over hooks.
- Disconnect cord by grasping plug at outlet. Do not yank cord or you may damage connections.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions on cleaning and oiling. Consult your dealer if you have lost directions.

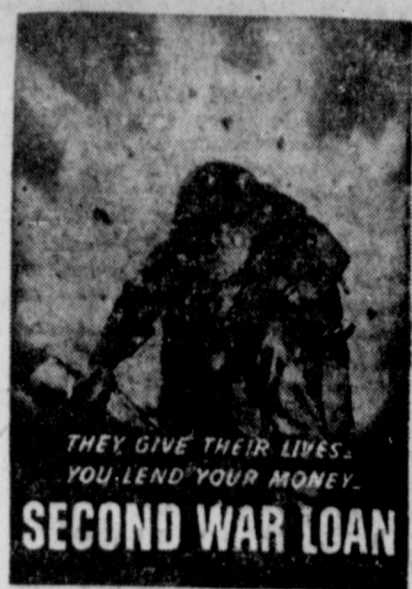
