RECOMMENDED FOR BRIGADIER GENERAL



Col. Harry F. Thompson, commanding officer of the Basic Unit Training Center, North Camp Hood, Tuesday was nominated by President Roosevelt to be a brigadier general.

Colonel Thompson was one of the early officers assigned to the tank destroyer force, assuming command of the 893rd tank destroyer battalion in February, 1942 at Ft. Meade, Md.

He came to Camp Hood in May of last year and became commanding officer of the training regiment, later the training brigade, and assumed command of the BUTC when it was activated by order of the war department, Nov. 28, 1942.

He has just moved to North Camp Hood to direct the removal of the battalions of the BUTC to the new camp.

The BUTC has been stationed temporarily at Camp Bowie, and will occupy the northern half of North Camp Hood.

These battalions will move during May as facilities become available for housing them, with the entire move to be completed this month by the official opening

date, May 29. The move of the Replacement Training Center, to North Camp Hood, was completed last week. The move of more than 16,000 RTC troops was completed over a 5 day period, entirely by motor transport.

Colonel Thompson is a graduate of the infantry school, the command and general staff school, the army war college, and was on the war department general staff from June, 1940 until Feb., 1942. He lives in Temple.

Miss Ernestine Schwalbe, senior was elected War Bond Queen of Jonesboro high school with 293,400 votes, which means \$2,934.00 in stamps and bonds. She was presented with a corsage of defense stamps.

Miss Schwalbe thanked her many friends for the honor she received and said, "I am proud of the fact that I am elected War Bond Queen, but I am more proud of the fact that every penny spent was spent to help our fighting men."

Miss Dorothy Myers, a freshman, was 2nd, and Misses Robbie Whisenhunt and Mary Helen Choats followed closely.

The contest in elementary grades to see which class bought and sold the most stamps and bonds was won by the 8th grade with a total of \$2,418.05. Stamps and bonds bought thru this school during April totaled \$9,262.10. That is more than enough money to buy 10 Jeeps or a total of \$41.10 per school child in Jonesboro. This amount plus what the school pupils had bought April 1 makes a grand total of \$15,024.34 or enough to buy 16 Jeeps.

SENATE PASSES NO STRIKE LAW

By John E. King, Dallas News Correspondent Washington, May 3.—By vote of 63 to 16, the Senate Wednesday approved the antistrike bill by Senator Tom Connally, after adopting several amendments, including one to clothe the WLB with powers to subpoena and compel attendance of witnesses and another to limit the authority conferred on the President under the bill to take over and operate industrial plants, mines or other facilities where production of war materials is being delayed, to those in which delay is caused by strike or labor disturbance.

10 MILES IS A LONG WAY: BIZERTE

N. Africa, May 5 (AP).—American and French troops have reached a point 10 miles from Bizerte while another American column swinging southeast from Mateur was reported Wednesday night to be threatening to turn German positions which have been holding up the British First Army 20 miles west of Tunis.

RAF RAIDS DORTMUND

London, May 5, (AP). — The largest concentration of 4-engined bombers ever sent on a war mission bashed Dortmund, Germany, Tuesday night with a 1,500 ton blockbuster saturation raid, approximating the weight of destruction heaped on Cologne by more than 1,000 planes nearly a year ago.

LIBERATORS STRIKE OFF CHINA

Chungking, May 5 (AP).—The 14th U. S. Army Air Force—strengthened by newly arrived Liberator bombers which can attack Japan itself—struck it's heaviest blow of the war Tuesday by pounding Jap military installations of Hainan Island off the southern tip of China and in the Hanoi-Haiphong area of northern French Indo-China.

JAP SOLOMON BASE RAIDED

Washington, May 5 (AP).—The first report of an American air attack on a new Jap base in Central Solomons indicated Wednesday that the enemy is working feverishly to bolster his outer defenses against the gradually tightening ring of American bases.

SENATORS FAVOR SKIP A YEAR

Washington, May 5 (AP).—With a majority apparently leaning toward some version of the Ruml skip-a-year plan, the Senate finance committee will begin consideration Thursday to the House approved pay-as-you-go tax bill.

12 DIE WITH GEN. & BISHOP

Washington, May 5 (AP).—Fourteen persons were killed in the plane crash in Iceland in which Lieut. Gen. Frank M. Andrews, Commanding General of Army troops in the European theatre, lost his life, the War Department reported Wednesday.

WOPS MIGHT LIKE US, NAZIS

Washington, May 6 (AP).—Axis leaders fear that the Italian people would welcome an Allied invasion, OWI said Wednesday, and are therefore trying to whip up a feeling of hatred for Americans.

LOOK OUT, POP. IN AUGUST

Washington, May 5 (UP).—Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey asserted today induction of fathers would be started in August if not sooner and subsequently selective service headquarters issued instructions under which fathers in the 35 listed essential industries may be given preferential deferment. Still, they're discharging others.

REDS SMASH CAUCASUS MINE

London, May 6 (AP).—The Red army has killed 7,000 Germans, captured the rail junction of Krymskaya, and pushed on 8 miles to occupy Neberdjevskaya, only 9 miles from Novorossisk, last big axis base in the Caucasus, Moscow announces. Those names are equal to winning a war.
