RTC Moves To North Camp

A continuous stream of traffic, 24 hours a day, for 6 days marked the movement of all personal and equipment of the TDRTC from Camp Hood to their new home at North Camp Hood, 23 miles away. Saturday, May 1, when the last contingent arrived, Col. Walter A. Dumas, Commanding Officer of the TDRTC, spoke to all of the RTC officers in a field meeting at which time the Colonel commended them upon their efficiency in the mass movement and discussed future plans. All personnel remained on duty Sunday, May 2, policing the area. Training was resumed Monday at 7:00. A temporary PX has been set up, athletic fields are being marked off and last Saturday a regular competitive athletic program was in session. Theatres and recreation halls are in the process of completion and no movies have been shown, but a Tabloid Blue Circuit USO Camp Show was presented to approximately 1600 May 4 and 5th. The improvised stage consisted of the steps and stoop leading into one of the incomplected Recreation Halls. Lister bags, showering with cold water are now used for drink purposes, without complaints. Latrines are large outside units serving 5 barracks, and the battalion mess halls feed 1,000 men and operate cafeteria style. TDRTC Headquarters is a large "E" shaped building which is roomy and well located. The 164th WAAC Co. is on duty and is due to move to the new camp in the near future.

He'd loaded in Waco, and was picked up as he passed thru here.

Then, there was another case, yes, a case 2 pints and a half pint in the custody of a man, who was the "pick-up". This cost him \$100 fine which was paid. Charges in both cases were transporting liquor without a permit.

50,000 AXIANS TAKEN

N. Africa, May 9 (AP).—Axis forces in Tunisia, shorn of air protection, were collapsing today under allied blows by land, sea and air, and 50,000 enemy troops, including 4 division commanders, have been captured since Friday.

BRITS QUIT BURMA BASE

New Delhi, May 9 (AP).—British troops garrisoning Buthe daung have withdrawn from that western Burmese base to check a threat of encirclement by Japs on the eve of the immobilizing monsoons, a communique disclosed Sunday.

WOPS PUT ON GLOOM

Bern, Switzerland, May 9 (AP).—Millions of Italians suffering from what Mussolini Wednesday described as African sickness, assembled Sunday around monuments of their war dead to observe army and empire day. Nothing remained of their African empire.

HOLLAND UNDER MARTIAL LAW

London, May 9 (AP).—All of Holland has been placed under martial law by German authorities jittery over the prospect of an Allied invasion of Europe, the Netherlands news agency reported Sunday night.

SWEDEN TO DEFEND NEUTRALITY

Stockholm, May 9 (AP).—Sweden's armed forces appear primed and ready for any eventuality as the war swirls around its borders.

GESTAPO CHIEF SLAIN

London, May 9 (AP).—Gen. Wilhelm Kruger, chief of the Gestapo in Poland and principal organizer of the German terror campaign against the Poles was shot fatally at Krakow May 2, Polish circles reported Sunday.

C. W. Brazzil, 80, Coryell county pioneer, who had been ill in his home at The Grove for nearly a year, passed away Friday at 4:15 A. M. April 30, 1943.

Funeral services were held Saturday May 1st, at 3:00 p. m. at Flint cemetery conducted by Rev. George Siler and Rev. O. F. Williams.

Mr. Brazzil was born March 22, 1863 in Marion county, Texas and came to this community at the age of 10 where he lived the remainder of his life.

He was married to Miss Alice Berry October 1, 1885, and had been a member of the Methodist church for 57 years. To this union were born nine children. Three preceded him in death.

Culling Hens

The County Agent was called upon to cull a flock of a hundred and fifty hens about sixty of which were laying. These hens were receiving a high priced laying mash and good yellow corn as a scratch. Something must have been wrong if ninety hens out of a hundred and fifty were not laying.

The combs of these ninety hens looked gray or asher—lacking the bright red luster which characterizes a good layer. Some of the hens were light in weight; some were beefy in confirmation. Invariably every hen culled out was tight skin with pelvic bones close together—indicating a non-layer. All the one hundred and fifty hens should have been laying. The hens were full of lice and many indicated intestinal worms.

This particular situation had been discussed because it is a case of bad management. It is useless to spend good money for mash and grain and then fail to take the necessary precaution to insure the hen's health.

Lice and other insects will completely devitalize a hen and cause them not to produce eggs.

The owner of these hens was advised by the agent to use 1 oz. of sodium Flouride per gallon of water as a dip for lice and to give each hen a worm capsule.

Producers having two hundred or more hens can worm them by using a worm powder in the mash a couple of days. In case this method is used the mash consumed by the hen for two days should have thoroughly mixed with it the worm powder.

The Sears-Roebuck Pig Contest will be conducted again this year. To participate in this contest the club member must write an essay on the subject "Advantages of the Cow-Hog-Hen Plan of Farming". A maximum of five hundred words may be written. This essay must be written with pen and ink—Giving the boy's name, club to which he belongs, and his address.

There will be eight 4-H Club boys in the county eligible to win a registered pig valued a \$20.00. The winners will be chosen by a committee of three, who will judge each boy's essay—giving 40 percent credit to his essay and sixty percent to his ability to handle and care for his animal.

The essay should be in the county agent's office by May 15. The county agent has suggested that teachers in the public schools use the subject for one day's English lesson in order to give the boys some training in writing the essay.
