## LOCAL NEEDS WILL DETERMINE CO.'S FARM LABOR PROGRAM

Local needs will determine Coryell County's participation in a new farm labor program aimed at reducing the manpower shortage which threatens success of the 1943 food production program, County Agricultural Agent, W. P. Graham said following his return from a conference held May 17 and 18 at Houston. Margaret L. Christie, the county home demonstration agent, also attended the meeting.

County plans for registration and placement of farm labor will be worked out by local farm men and women who are members of the County Agricultural Victory Council, Coryell. Members of the council's executive and labor sub-committees likely will be called in to discuss the new program Wednesday, May 26, 1943.

"We realize that farmers and ranchers in Texas will not be able to obtain the quantity and quality of labor to which they are accustomed, but we hope to be able to help them get enough workers to prevent the wasting of crops in the field and the dispersal of livestock," the county agent said. In some counties where the need justifies and it is desired by farmers, town and city boys and girls known as Victory Farm Volunteers will be recruited and trained for emergency work on the farms.

## 11TH DISTRICT WAR FINANCE COMMITTEE PRAISES NEWSPAPER

The persuasive power of a free press in influencing the ideas, attitudes and actions of free Americans has never been more clearly demonstrated than in the 2nd War Loan. The government in this drive raised \$13 Billion of extra money to finance a part of the war and \$8 billion of this was invested by non bank investors.

Non bank investors bought more War Bonds than our government had hoped all investors would buy.

In the 311 counties of the 11th Federal Reserve District, Texas parts of Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma, War Bond sales totaled \$577,228,000, exceeding the \$400 Million goal by more than \$177 Millions, or 44%. Non bank investors bought \$349,025,000.

"A large share of the credit for making Americans aware of the need for putting their money directly to work in War Bonds as a means of combating inflation, must go to our newspapers", Mr. Gilbert, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas and chairman of the 11th District War Finance Committee said.

### "ASHES OF JAPAN" CHURCHILL

Washington, May 19. (AP). — Prime Minister Winston Churchill Wednesday promised that Britain would stick with the United States in an unrelenting campaign to pulverize Japan and disclosed that the Allies are now embarked on the greatest military experiment in history—to determine whether air bombardment can bring Germany and Italy to their knees.

### LEWIS' U.M.U. ASKS FOR AFL

Washington, May 19. (AP). — William Green said Thursday that John L. Lewis' UMW had filed a formal application to return to membership in the AFL.

### JAPS IN POCKET, ATTU

Washington, May 19 (AP).—Advancing U. S. troops appeared Wednesday night to be driving hard pressed Jap forces on Attu Island into a pocket around Chigof Harbor, where they can only surrender or fight to the death.

### USE RED BASES?

Washington, May 19 (AP). — After studying Prime Minister Churchill's speech, diplomatic ob-

servers expressed the opinion Wednesday night that Britain and the U. S. may try to prevail on Joseph Stalin to grant the use of Russian air bases for an assault on Japan.

### FORTS HIT U-BOAT YARDS

London, May 20, (UP).—A powerful fleet of American Flying Fortresses battered the sprawling U-Boat yards at Kiel and Flemsberg yesterday, filling the air with so many high explosive and incendiary bombs that a pilot reported they hindered his vision of the target.

### REDS SHATTER ATTACKS

London, May 20 (AP).—Red army troops shattered 2 more Nazi attacks in the Caucasus Wednesday, killing nearly 350 troops, and blasting 14 boat loads of nazis attempting to retreat over the Kuban river, they announced today.

### 324,000 AXIS TROOPS LOST

N. Africa, May 19 (AP).—The axis gambled—and lost—nearly a third of a million men of its best troops in a vain effort to hold on to Tunisia and prevent its establishment as a base for an allied assault on nazi dominated

Europe.

### OWI ACCUSED OF TAX

Washington, May 19 (AP).—Defeat of the modified Ruml skip-a-year income tax plan reverberated Wednesday in a declaration by Representative Halleck of Indiana that the OWI had spread propaganda against pay-as-you-go proposals. What if they did? They should! Let's pay it, and get it over!

### 15,000 HOMELESS IN MIDWEST

(By The Associated Press) An army of troops and workmen labored yesterday to bulwark levees and protect plants menaced by rampant rivers in a 500 mile wide flood zone in the mid west. About 15,000 persons were homeless.

### FLOOD DAMAGE IN GERMANY

London, May 20 (AP).—Flood waters from the bomb burst Oder and Moehne dams still are rolling destructively forward, crippling transport and halting industries, and both areas "present a most mournful spectacle", the air ministry said. Fields are flooded and roads and railways have disappeared.

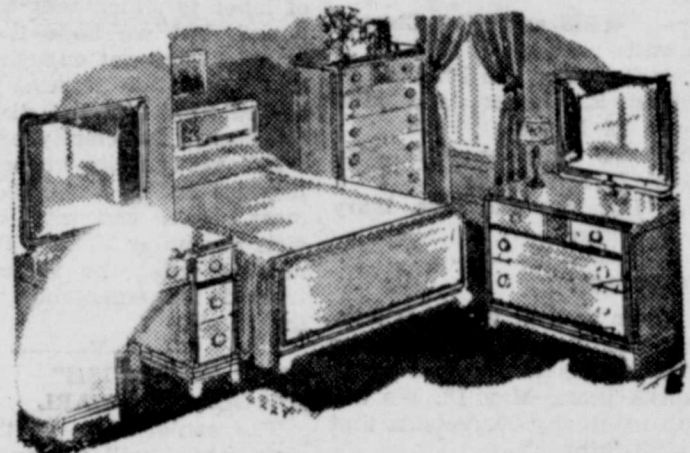

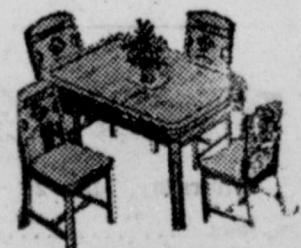

"April 1, 1943  
Dear Otis Otis and Mary:

How are the new couple. Gee, I did not know you were married until I heard from Bessie Earl. Since I've been over here I don't keep up with the news very much. Otis how often did you hear from home when you were over sea? I hear about once or twice a month. So I guess you are old married people by now. Ha. Well, due to the war cause I'll be late to congratulate you but congratulations. May yours be a long and happy life together with just enough dark clouds to make a pretty setting when the day is done.

Well, Otis I can see your point in getting a trained nurse. Only every War Veteran can't be that lucky. There's not enough nurses. So be on the look out for one for ole Jack—because brother, I'll need a nurse when I come home, if not before. Boy this war—I wonder if I'll make it home before I need a nurse. If my nerves keep on I'll save money by putting up my own hospital.

I wish I could be there this year for the Whitt reunion. Tell them all hello for me.

Would you mind sending aunt Alice and Bessie Earl this letter as you probably know by experience Otis how hard stationery is to get over here. I'd like to write all the folks letters but with this limited stationery. It's just impossible. So let this letter go to them also.

I have no idea as to when I'll be home—but I think I'll see more world than a geography book before I get home. But I may be home by Xmas.

Hoping to see you all soon or at least hear from you. I remain your gone but not forgotten "Black Sheep" who strayed from the herd and wandered across the river—down the Valley and then—God only knows where.

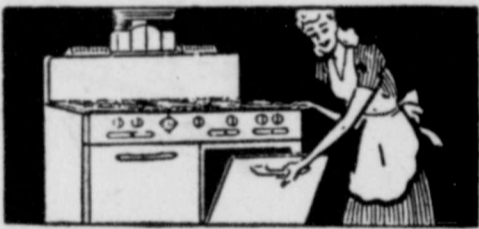

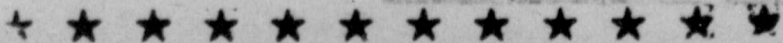

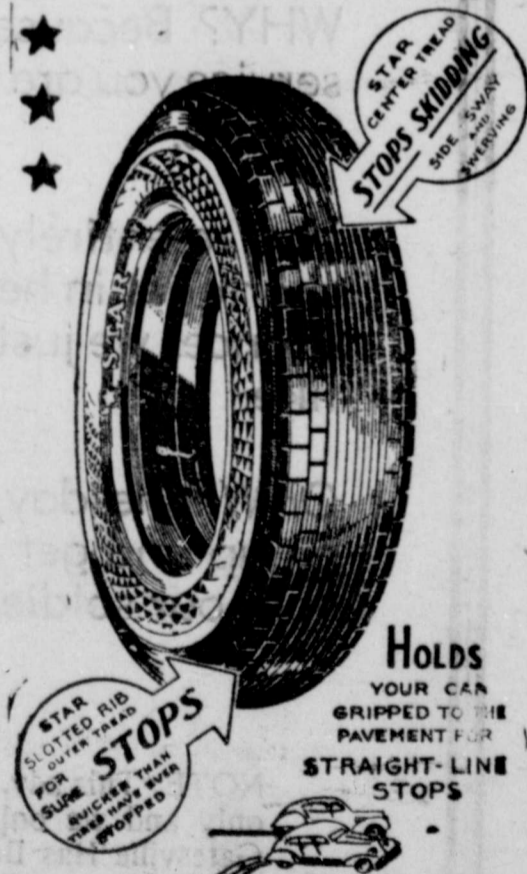
