"Community House" Is Possibility For Gatesville

Wouldn't that be nice, a \$50,000 to \$100,000 Community House in Gatesville, and all paid for after the war? It'd be something "nice to come home to" for the boys that are in the swamps of Guadalcanal, the sands (if any) of North Africa, and the ice and slush of Alaska and Iceland, not to mention the ones on the rolling ice-coated decks of patrol ships in the cold North Atlantic.
Well, folks, fact is, we've got a chance to get one!
The hitch! Nothing, except that the City must furnish the lot, this lot to be of sufficient size and as near the center of the city as possible, and a site in Raby Park, which is already the city's, or is it?

This building is favored by the Army 100 percent which always helps, and would be financed by the government thru the Federal Security Board.

Now's where we can continue that policy, to our advantage, "that the government's putting out, and we might as well get ours", a policy started in 1933, and, well, why not.

Already, there are two of these Community Houses in Brownwood, 2 in Mineral Wells, 2 in Abilene, and 2 in Lawton, Okla., and one set for Bastrop.

What're we waiting on!
The building is not possible on the outskirts, as a country club, or club, but must be near the center of population where it'll be most convenient to the most people.

It would be operated by the USO during the war, and turned over to the city afterward. Well, why wouldn't that be O. K.? Certainly, it would! And, everybody knows the present facilities of the USO only go about one fifth of where they could.

Now, what do you say? Looks to us like a natural.

This community house, after the war would serve as a meeting place for citizens of the community, all Coryell county, and also would be for recreational advantages for the kids.

These houses are large, wooden structures, with a lobby, two wings, and a big auditorium, kitchen and other necessary rooms.

A SUMMARY OF WORLD, NATIONAL AND STATE NEWS

NO SHOTS, ISLE IS U-NATIONS

N. Africa, June 13 (AP).—Italy lost her 3rd island outpost in the Central Mediterranean in three days when a British destroyer Sunday accepted the bloodless surrender of Linosa, and the fleets of American bombers and fighters began switching their knockout punches to Sicily. Previously Lampedusa had been taken, and Pantelleria. Only 500 were on the last island.

LABOR URGES VETO OF BILL

Washington, June 13 (AP).—Organized labor is expected to make direct demands to President Roosevelt that he veto the bill to outlaw strikes in government-operated war factories and curb walkouts in privately controlled industries. Now, they want the "master's" touch.

HERE IT COMES, TRINITY FLOOD RACKET

Washington, June 13 (AP).—Chairman Whittington of Mississippi of the House Flood Control Committee said Sunday no hearings on the Trinity River, Texas, flood control program will be necessary since his group could review the statement of Army engineers and others who testified previously regarding the program before the House Rivers and Harbors Committee. "Porkbarrel".

CHINESE TAKE SUNKTZE

Chungking, June 13 (AP).—Chinese troops stormed thru the streets strewn with Jap corpses Friday to capture the Yantze port of Sungtze, down river from advanced enemy base at Ichang, the Chinese said Sunday.

26 BOMBERS LOST

London, June 13 (AP).—Two large formations of American heavy bombers smashed down many German fighters and blasted the Nazi U-Boat bases at Bremen and Kiel Sunday in the greatest air battle ever waged by the 8th U.S. Air Force.

REDS BLAST NAZI TRAINS

London, June 14 (AP).—A large force of Russian long range bombers struck behind the German lines on the Russian central front Saturday night, blasting big enemy train concentrations and ammunition dumps at the important rail junction of Gomel and Bryansk and the railway station of Karachev, Moscow announces.

FRENCH TIRED OF ARGUING

Algiers, June 13 (UP).—Twenty-six French communist deputies today protested the 4-day deadlock with the French committee of National Liberation over rejuvenation of the French army, asserting the people "have had

enough . . . of autocracy and tyranny" and demanding action for the good name of France throughout the world".

POPE WARNS STRIKERS

(By The Associated Press)
Pope Pius XII urged Sunday that workers of the world "not aggravate the burden of extraordinary difficulties under which peoples are groaning by representing their claims in this hour of universal and imperious needs in a noisy manner and thru inconsiderate action".

QUAKES IN JAP AREA

Boston, June 13 (AP).—The possibility that Japan may have suffered damage from earthquakes which occurred in that vicinity early Sunday was seen by L. Don Leet, Harvard U. seismologist, who said 2 shocks were recorded on instruments at the university station.

LAST FILIPINO UP, JAPS?

(By The Associated Press)
Radio Tokyo said Sunday that remnants of a Filipino detachment which had been holding out in Nueva Viscaya Province on Luzon Island in the Philippines, surrendered Sunday to the Japanese garrison at Baguie, the summer capital.

Not much of his letter was clipped away by the Censor, so the connection is not good as it would have been.

Dear Mat:

As an exnewsboy I thought I'd drop you a few lines.

Please do not print my address.

Mat, I have been reading the C. C. News and all I can find is where some USO Soldier has been home on a 10 or 15 day leave and here I am over here in this living HELL and working ten hours a day and 7 days a week and very little sleep at night because (Censor got it).

Why don't they send those USO playboys over here and let them get just a little taste of what the war is all about and then maybe they would not try to push the people off the sidewalk back home.

I have never seen home since I got into this Army.

I am lucky to be in this fine outfit. Speaking of rough and tough Marines. Well, the Army makes those guys look sick and I mean sick.

Well, I'll close for this time hoping to see you again someday.

P. S., note to Cloyce. Cloyce, these boys are having a little USO fun right now, and they're ready to "take it" when they get over there. There might be a few pushed off the sidewalk here, but we think, if any, it is entirely unintentional. These boys here (and they don't live in this State, or Town) are as nice as you'll find anywhere. Keep a stiff upper lip, Cloyce. There are a lot of fellows coming your way, and, it won't be long. We're going to be just as glad to see you, as you will be to see us. Good luck, now and always.

And, from another boy, just in the Army, Pvt. Homer Brazzil, of Camp Roberts, Calif. Here's what he says.

"Dear Editor: I arrived at Camp Roberts, California, April 11, and about 2 weeks later, I received my first copy of the Coryell County News. I really do enjoy getting the news from my home town.

There are 5 Coryell County boys in my company. They call us the Texas Longhorns.

I am supposed to finish my basic training July 15. I am hoping then to get a furlough home, but, of course, that would be up to Uncle Sam. Well, anyway, I expect to be at home in a few months and greet my old friends and pals.

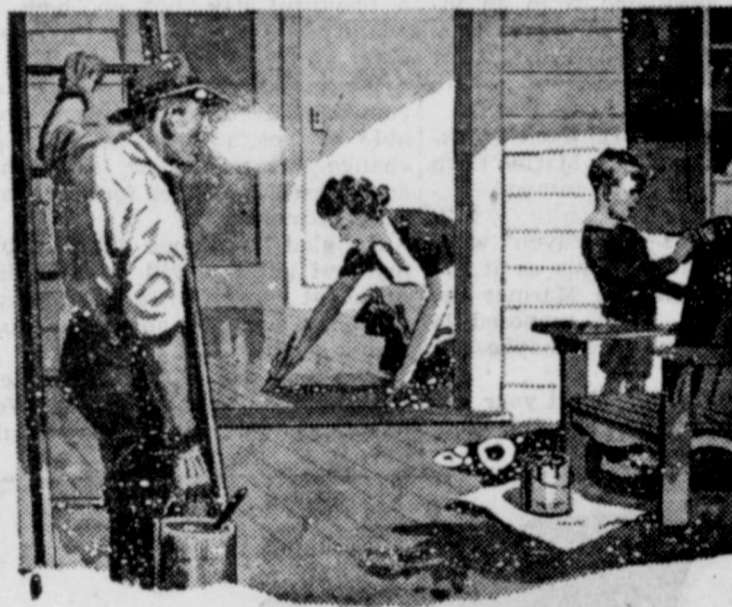
