Noted Judge Dies In Houston: Was **Born Here**

Editorials commemorating the life of Judge Norman Atkinson in both The Houston Chronicle and The Houston Post, attest to the esteem in which Judge Norman Atkinson, who died there Monday, is held in Texas' greatest city, as a public servant, both in and out of public office.

Quoting The Chronicle Editorial, 'Judge Norman Atkinson, who died suddenly Monday, left behind him a splendid record of public service, both in and out of public office.


"As a private citizen he gave freely of his time and talents to civic affairs. As a public official he simplified procedure and won the confidence and respect of the people who dealt with his office.

"Judge Atkinson was born in Gatesville, September 24, 1885. He moved to Houston in 1904 and was admitted to the bar in 1907. He was a member of the law firm of Boyles, Scott, Fahey and Atkinson for many years. Since 1926 he had continuously held public

"It was in 1926 that he was elected county judge, an office he held for three terms. He served the Harris County School for Boys Independent School District in 1931 and 1932, and as a mem-School District from 1932 to 1936 when he resigned.

"When the late District Judge Charles E. Ashe resigned in 1936, Judge Atkinson ran for the office and won it. He held that office until his death.

"Judge Atkinson was dignified, courageous. If he knew of anyone aid was forthcoming without fanfare or ostentation".

Kitchen Truck Hits Marchers: 7 Soldiers Die

A six-wheel truck struck and killed 7 enlisted men and injured fifteen others when the driver was blinded by dust late Friday, the Public Relations Office of Camp Hood said Saturday.

A group of men were walking down the Copperas Cove road inside the reservation about 5 p. m. Tank destroyers and other vehicles were moving down a dusty, parallel road. So much dust was raised that the driver of a kitchen truck coming in from the field was blinded and could not see the group of men. They did not see the truck.

The fifteen men injured were






