HOOD SOLDIER TO SWING, IS VERDICT OF ARMY JUDGES

Found guilty of killing a guard at the Camp Hood prisoner stockade, Pvt. Roy A. Prentiss of Winstaed, Conn., has been sentenced to hang, camp officials announced Friday.

Prentiss was being taken to the stockade by Cpl. Loyd W. Knapp of Norwalk, Conn., when he seized Knapp's pistol and shot Knapp one time.

Camp officials said that when Prentiss discovered that he had killed Knapp he turned the pistol on himself, firing a bullet into his head.

He recovered from the self-inflicted wound and was tried by court-martial Thursday.

According to Chief of Police, Bob Jones of Gatesville, 3 men escaped a guard at the dump Monday morning, and were loose. They were soldier prisoners, too.

GASOLINE IRON BLOWS UP; BURNS TRAILOR HOUSE, LADY

About 2:30, Saturday afternoon, firemen were called to Allen Williams, better known as "I Fix 'em" Williams' trailer house which was set afire by a gasoline iron explosion.

Mrs. Williams, in getting out of the house, had to run thru the flames and was badly burned on her feet and hands.

The trailer house was practically destroyed with its contents.

LOUIS HACKNEY IS ELECTROCUTED IN WACO ACCIDENT

Louis A. Hackney, 53, of Waco was electrocuted early Sunday morning at the state highway department warehouse when an electric extension cord was short-circuited by a sickle blade which Hackney was preparing to sharpen.

L. V. Lunson, night watchman at the warehouse discovered the body about 1 o'clock, about 30 minutes after the accident occurred state highway officials believed. The Waco fire department tried to revive Hackney by artificial respiration for two hours, but in vain. A doctor was summoned who pronounced Hackney dead after a brief examination.

He was removing the sickle from a grass mower, preparing to sharpen it, and was working by the light of an extension cord, trailing out of the warehouse window and across the mower. The sickle blade accidentally fell across the extension cord, cutting thru the insulation to the wire, causing a short-circuit.

Funeral services were held yesterday in Funeral Home at 4:00 p. m., conducted by Rev. Brooks Sasse. Internment was in the City Cemetery with Scotts in charge.

ALLIES TAKE MORE SICILY

N. Africa, July 11 (UP)—Tough American and British air-borne troops spearheaded by Allied invasion of Sicily, swooped out of a black sky Friday night with such rapidity that axis anti-aircraft guns couldn't begin to fire on all of them it was disclosed today.

Glider troops of both sides struck precisely at 10:00 p. m. in the first operation by that type of Allied forces. At 11:20 p. m. parachute troops began dropping. Heavy skirmishing six to eight miles southeast of Gela, the southern port where U.S. troops had landed Saturday was reported.

SOVIETS' DEFENSE HOLDS

London, July 12 (AP)—A 400-tank German assault, perhaps the greatest of the war, failed to budge the red army from its positions on the Orel-Kursk front Sunday and the Russians were able to throw the disorganized mechanized masses from two populated places in that sector to climax the first week of the great summer offensive.

52 TONS OF BOMBS ON MUNDA

S. Pacific, Hdqs. July 12 (AP).—Fifty-two tons of bombs were dropped Sunday on the Jap Airbase at Munda, New Georgia, according to reports from headquarters.

SICILIAN FRONT WIDENED 150 MILES

London, July 11 (UP)—The London Daily Mail reported Sunday the front in Sicily had been widened to 150 miles when Canadian troops established an important beach-head near Porto Empedocle on the southwest coast.

STIMSON TRAVELS

London, July 11 (UP)—U. S. Sec. of War Henry L. Stimson, arrived in Britain by airplane today less than 2 days after the first allied penetration of the European fortress, and military officials said that "great importance" was attached to his first visit to an American theatre of war operations. What could he possibly do that the generals could not?

DUCE URGES ITALY'S KING TO SPEAK

London, July 11 (UP)—Sec. Gen. Carlo Scorza called an urgent meeting of the Italian fascist party directorate Sunday night and Benito Mussolini appealed to King Victor Emmanuel to address the nation, Zurich dispatches reported as the Axis asserted that Italian and German troops were counterattacking in Sicily.

UNION SEAMEN DEMAND RAISE

New York, July 11 (AP)—The National Maritime Union (CIO) at its fourth convention here Sunday voted to demand a sea risk war bonus of \$250 per month for all ratings on merchant ships and a flat \$25 monthly wage increase for all ratings.

GREATEST ARMADA

London, July 11 (UP)—More than 2,000 vessels, described as the greatest fleet ever put to sea, took part in the invasion of Sicily, it was revealed tonight in dispatches from British Correspondents.

Well Known Artist At NCH

Little do the men of the BUTC realize when they walk thru a door bearing a sign reading "Enlisted Men", that the sign was painted by one of Texas' outstanding artists.

Yet, that is the case, for Charles S. Normann, better known professionally as Charles Berkeley Normann, is a T/4 at BUTC, wielding his paint brush in a slightly different manner than he did when he painted the well known "Declaration of the Independence of Texas" and "The President", paintings which are known thru-out the United States.

Many of Normann's portraits and landscape paintings hang in the galleries of Europe and America.

He began painting in his native Norway at the age of 5, and by the time he was 19 he had studied under 16 of Norway's greatest art instructors. He has been a designer, model cabinet maker, woodcarver, stone sculpter, and landscape and portrait painter. Among his famous works are portraits of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, General Douglas MacArthur, Brigadier General Hugh T. Mayberry, commandant of the Tank Destroyer School, Attorney General Gerald C. Mann, and of the late State Supreme Court, Judge Lattimore.

From rags to riches is the old Hora tio Alger formula, but T/4 Normann finds the Army has reversed the process, for from the gains of a career in art to the turpentine soaked rags of the sign painter is the path he has followed in the past 16 months.

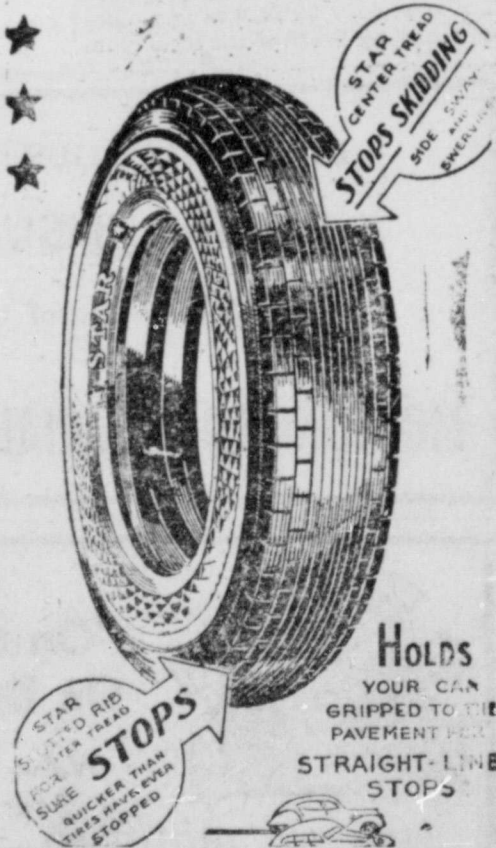
