### RAT EXPERT PROVES PIED PIPER, BUT WAS NOT "DEE-SCENTER"

He'll have to go back to A&M and take a post graduate course in "de-centing".

The "expert" rat killer with the gigantic title of "Junior District Field Assistant, U. S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wild Life Service, got the rats, but, not the scent.

Some places the customers, or the workmen couldn't stay in after he and his poison got thru.

But, here's the report of what he said he did 79 business establishments were baited using 1238 sheets, each sheet having 4 baits consisting of meats, vegetables, fruits, etc., with a total cost of \$13.83. "Who furnished the ration stamps?"

Two men were employed to assist the director, R. E. Aday, at a local cost of \$35.00. Cost of the very potent poison used was \$25.

The rats, so they say, got 50 per cent of the baits, or some 600 baits. Only 4 places lost no bait. Dead rats reported ranged from 2 to 36, and an average was 8 to 12.

Bothering with some kind of statistics, the claim is they saved us \$8,000 and we don't believe it.

A SUMMARY OF WORLD, NATIONAL AND STATE NEWS

### WITHIN 15 MILES OF CATANIA

N. Africa, July 14 (AP).—Britain's victorious 8th Army was within 15 miles of Catania Wednesday night in the swift time table surge up the eastern Sicilian coasts, while to the southwest American troops plunged onward another fifteen miles and overran two key enemy airdromes.

### NAZI BASES SOFTENED UP

London, July 14 (AP).—Flying Fortresses and swarms of lesser American and British planes darkened the French skies Wednesday with bombing attacks on an aircraft factory and park at the Le-Bourget airport in the Paris suburbs and four other German installations.

### INFO CHIEF QUITS OPA

Washington, July 14 (AP).—Lou R. Maxon, deputy administrator of the OPA in charge information, resigned Wednesday with a declaration that the agency is bound up in legalistic red tape that Houdini himself couldn't untangle.

### THEY HIRE A HI-POWERED CHEF

Washington, July 14 (AP).—A French chef of renown has been hired by Uncle Sam to turn 35c government cafeteria lunches into something ultra. They've got to find another way to "throw it away".

### YANKS HAVE INITIATIVE

Pearl Harbor, July 14 (UP).—Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Pacific commander-in-chief, said today that the Japs at Kiska had been isolated and neutralized, that south Pacific operations were highly successful and that ships, planes and troops were reaching the Pacific in numbers which ensured the retention of the initiative by the United States.

### OPA TO "GIVE" WITH THE MEAT

Washington, July 14 (AP).—D. C. Speaker disclosed today that the OPA is developing a plan designed to bring about a major increase in civilian meat rations.

S.W. Pacific, July 15 (AP).—America's offensive in the Central Solomon Islands, which was started to clear the enemy from the sea and air lanes of the South Pacific, has resulted in whittling down the Jap navy.

### AMERICA SAVES BRITAIN TWICE

London, July 14 (AP).—Replying to an assertion by laborite Emanuel Shinwell in Commons that the United States was wresting control of the seas from Great Britain, Sir Arthur Salter, parliamentary secretary of the ministry of transport declared today that twice during the present war the United States has saved Britain from imminent famine. But they won't pay their war I debt.

# Farm News

## DAIRY FARMING

Dairy farming year in and year out is one of the best paying types of farming. Coryell county has a large number of dairy cattle and a convenient market for whole milk. The successful dairy farmer is one who looks ahead and plans to have a supply of roughage and grain for his cows during the months when the pastures are poor and barns should be filled with hay and silos with ensilage for the dry months and winter months.

Fortunately dry months prevents making a silage crop. The corn crop this year developed sufficient for use in the silo. Farmers not having pit silos or above ground silos should put up stack silos. The stack silo is a good and economical way of preserving the succulent quality of roughage. The whole stalk of corn or grain sor-

ghum can be stacked above the ground applying water constantly during the stacking. The stacks are stacked with butts outward. The same method such as packing and watering are used on stacks as on pit silos. After the stack is built to 10 or 12 feet high a layer of dirt 6 to 12 inches thick should be placed on top. A layer of oat straw may be placed over green feed before dirt is added. The County Agent's office can furnish the methods used at the Temple experiment station for stacking green feed.

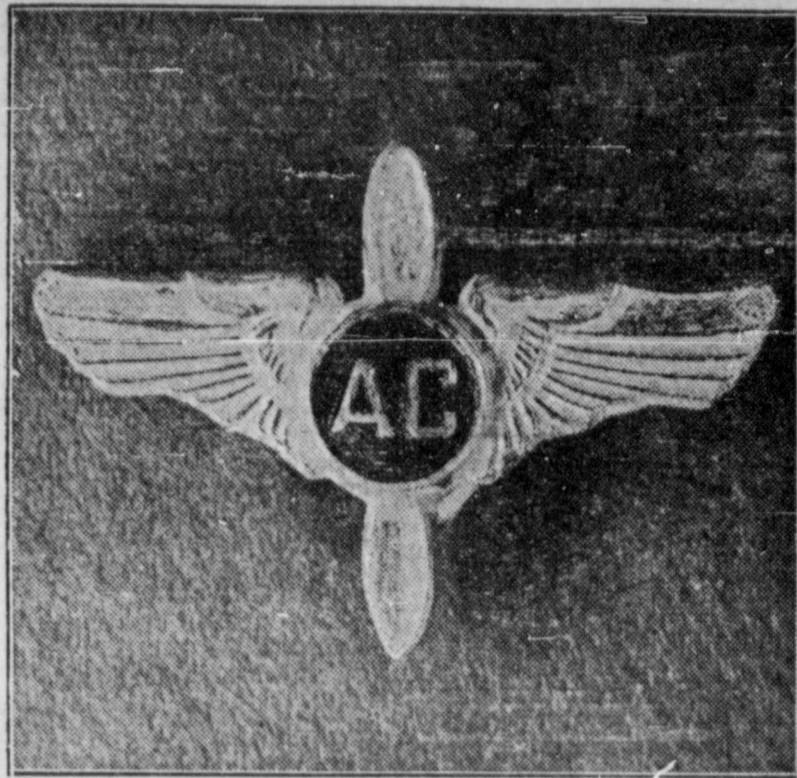
The more ensilage or succulent feed a cow gets the lower the protein content required in the grain ration. Since protein is scarce this is important.

Since every farm can produce hay and ensilage and these combined with good pasture the dairy farmer has largely solved the feed problem. From the sale of milk he has a cash income. A simple system of book-keeping tells him where and why he is making money or failing to make

money. A cash income eliminates interest on borrowed money. HE is growing bigger each day with the development of the offsprings from his cows. The barnyard fertilizer from his lots will enrich his land. A poultry flock and a few hogs are easily supplemented with dairying—thus contributing two additional cash incomes.

Milk is one of the foods badly needed in the war program and promises to be a good price for several years. A depletion of the dairy herds in the other countries of the world means a high price for dairy cattle for several years to come. Dairy farmers should start to cutting corners and analyze their business and if it is not paying — make it pay by a change in methods.

The County Agent has been a dairy farmer and would like to assist milk producers in this county in making the business pay.

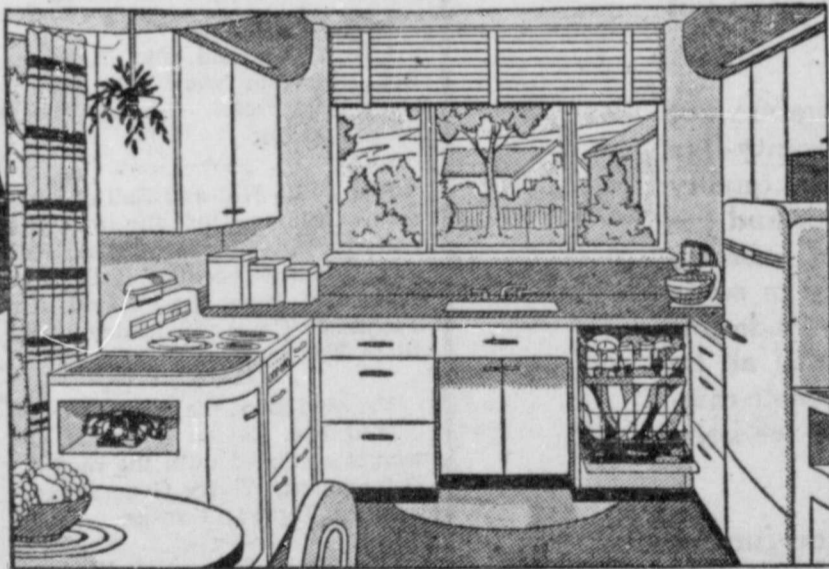

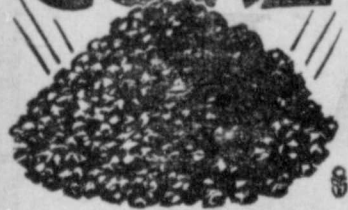

In '40 he was sold to the Pittsburgh Pirates of the National League, but before he could report he was inducted into the Army, on April 10, 1941. Mettler played with the biggest league of them all for 7 months, when he won his release on the "over 28" clause. Shortly after Pearl Harbor, he was called back into active service, and now he supervises all athletic equipment and cooperates with the battalion recreational officers in adjusting schedules for intra-battalion games and in organizing an All-North-Camp basket ball team made up of high school and college amateurs, er-collegiate and professional athletes.

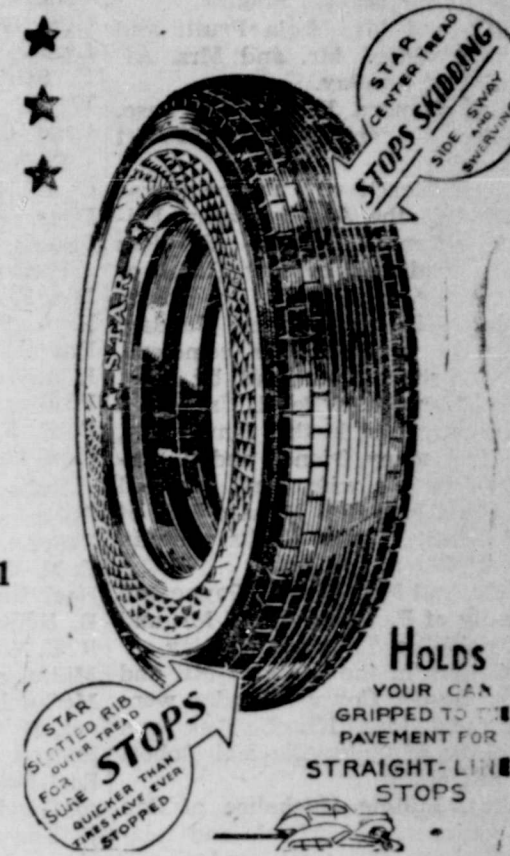

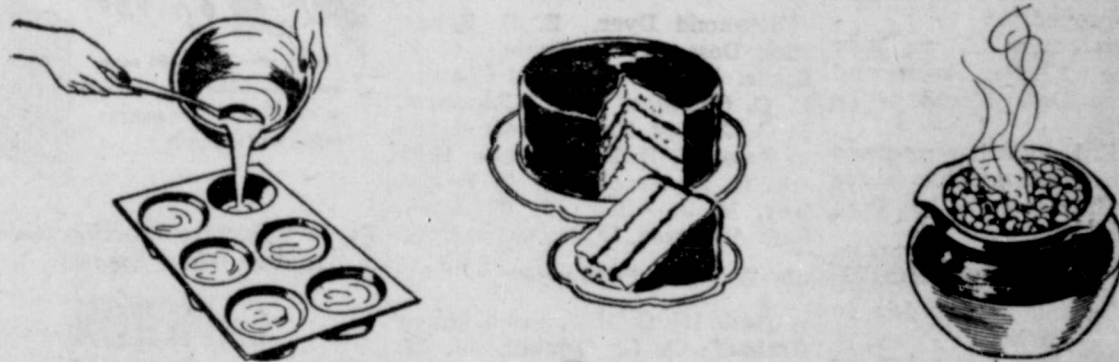
