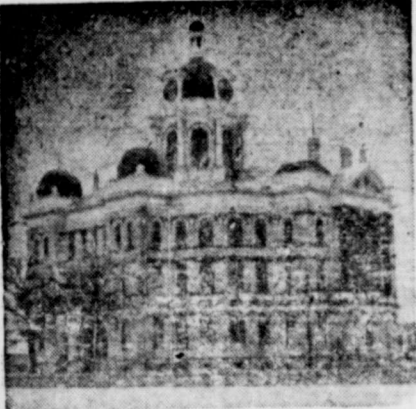

STATE HEALTH DEPT. TO CONDUCT SCHOOL FOR FOOD HANDLERS

A school for food handlers will be held by the State Health Dept. in cooperation with the city of Gatesville and the local health units at the city hall, beginning August 23.

Classes will be held afternoons at 2:30 and nights at 8:00 and will last about an hour and a half.

Films will be shown in this order "Man against Microbe" and "Slings Hash", Monday, Wednesday, "Sand in the Gears", Friday, 27th, "The Housefly" and "Keep 'Em Out", Monday 30th, "Eating Out", Wednesday, Sept. 1, "Twixt the Cup and the Lip", Friday, Sept. 3, "With These Weapons".

There is no charge or obligation, and everyone is invited and space will be reserved for colored.

EARLIEST RENEWAL DATES OF RATIONS

Supplement, Official, Fleet and Non-highway rations will no longer expire on a fixed date. These rations will continue to be issued for definite periods. The ration holder will be permitted to use the ration after the end of the period and until a renewal of the ration becomes valid. Instead of an expiration date, therefore, the ration will bear an "earliest renewal date". The "earliest renewal date" is the earliest date that a renewal may become valid for use.

The Regulations have also been amended to provide for the issuance of all "B" books outside the gasoline shortage area for a period of three months.

Basic, transport and special rations issued for leased vehicles will continue to expire at the end of the period for which the ration is issued. When issuing a "B" or a ration for a leased vehicle, the "C" book as a Special ration or as words "earliest renewal" on the cover of the book should be crossed out and the word "expiration" should be inserted.

The holder of a Supplemental, Official, Fleet or Non-highway ration will not be permitted to apply for a renewal earlier than 15 days (instead of 30 days) before the earlier renewal date. He may apply later in his current ration is sufficient for his needs beyond that period.

Pfc. Sam Clemons Is Killed In Air Accident

Pfc. Samuel Alvie Clemons, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvie B. Clemons of Gatesville, Route one, was killed late Saturday afternoon at the Dodge City Army Air Field, at Dodge City, Kansas, when a B-26 army plane on a routine flight crashed and burned. With him, was Lt. James Beddington, son of Captain and Mrs. J. C. Beddington of Camp Hood, and 3 other crew members.

Clemons was a student engineer in the air corps and had enlisted October 30, 1943, at Blackland Army Air Field at Waco, and was then transferred to Sheppard field at Wichita Falls, and then, after completing his schooling there, was sent to Dodge City, Kansas.

He was born December 29, 1919, and was the husband of the former Miss Josephine Clary of Gatesville, who was living near the field at the time of the accident.

Reports are, that the plane went in a spin, was pulled out by the pilot, and then it no another, and after nosing upward on the second spin, caught fire, and exploded, killing all the occupants.

Before enlisting in the Army Air Force, Clemons was a truck driver for Ray Hollingsworth and others here, and at the time of the Golden Gloves tournaments held in Gatesville, was a contestant in this sport.

Funeral services have not been announced yet, but it is thought by relatives that his body will arrive in Gatesville today from Dodge City and funeral arrangements will be announced at that time.

WFA PLANS ERSATZ FOODS

Washington, Aug. 8 (AP).—Anticipating reduced civilian supplies of such important animal protein foods as meats, dairy products and eggs next year, the War Food Administration is taking steps for a sharp expansion in the substitute foods processed from vegetable products. CLOSE IN ON NAZIS

N. Africa, Aug. 8 (AP).—The British Eighth Army, sweeping three quarters of the way around the western slope of Mount Etna, has captured the Axis strongholds of Adrano and Bronte and is threatening the Troina-Randazzo road, the escape avenue for the German forces confronting the Americans in inland Sicily.

REDS MENACE KHARKOV, BRYANSK

London, Aug. 8 (AP).—The Red army curled a steel finger behind Kharkov, threatening to engulf that bastion, and smashed closer to Bryansk in advances on both fronts of four to nine miles Sunday in which nearly 200 villages toppled from the invaders' grasp, a special communique announced Sunday night.

RAF DAMAGES 150 JAP BOATS

New Delhi, India, Aug. 8 (AP).—Beafighters operating along the Irrawaddy River attacked and damaged 150 Jap river craft Saturday, a British communique announced Sunday. The boats included supply sampans and troop-carrying motorboats.

LAFAYETTE REFLOATED

New York, Aug. 8 (AP).—The U.S.S. Lafayette, formerly the Normandie, was refloated, at least temporarily, at high tide at 4:30 o'clock here Sunday afternoon, after having rested on it's side in the North River since February 9, 1942.

WOP SOCIALISTS WANT STRIKE

London, Aug. 8 (AP).—Royal Air Force bombers poured great weights of explosives into the northern Italian cities of Milan, Turin and Genoa Saturday night to demonstrate to the Italian people the price they must pay for Rome's stalling on the peace issue and effects were being felt Sunday afternoon.

The Socialist party in Italy appealed to workers, farmers and middle class intellectuals to join in a general strike to force an end to Italy's participating in the war, and the abolition of the monarchy, Sunday reports from Chiazzo on the Italian-Swiss border indicated.

MILLION BERLINERS LEAVE

London, Aug. 8 (AP).—The German radio, in a program describing the partial evacuation of Berlin, said Sunday that more than 1,000,000 women and children will

leave the capital.

JUNE SHIP OUTPUT BIG

(By The Associated Press) America's June shipyard production of 158 new vessels, announced last week by the U. S. Maritime commission, was higher than the unofficial tabulation of announced Allied and neutral shipping losses in the western Atlantic in the first 7 months of the year.

Total sunk was 98 Allied and neutral vessels.

DE GAULLE WARNS COLLABORATIONISTS

Casablanca, Aug. 8 (AP).—Charles de Gaulle, in a fiery speech to a cheering crowd in the Casablanca city square, declared today, France would punish as traitors "those so-called governors who rushed headlong into capitulation in June 1940."

OPA CUTS LIQUOR PRICES

Washington, Aug. 8 (AP).—"An average lowering" of retail liquor prices was predicted today by the OPA as it established nation-wide fixed mark-ups for wholesalers and retailers.

PLAN TO ABOLISH INCOME REPORTS

Washington, Aug. 8 (AP).—A partial cure for the annual March 15 epidemic of decimal point jitters may be the first big accomplishment of a new drive to simplify the nation's revenue laws, congressional tax authorities disclosed today.
