## NEWS OF OUR MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Here's a letter from Pvt. Norris H. Waddill of Camp Crowder, Mo. which we think will interest, as do all letters from the men in the services; girls too, if any.

"Dear Folks: Can you realize that I have not done a thing to help Uncle Sam since the war started. All this training, driving over hills, camouflage, black-outs and everything will go up in smoke unless we get a chance to use what we have learned.

"They call it war. I am driving a Colonel and a few Lieutenants over camp every day, sometimes 50 miles and yet they said Uncle Sam needed me. A WAC could do what I am doing and until I ship APO soon all this will be a blank space in my life. It took a good job and left me with a rugged face. Yet, Uncle Sam needed more men. What can he do with them? And, to think I spent the war in Missouri. I want action.

Will write again in a few days. Love, Norris.

Note: Note: A lot of jobs look insignificant, and a lot of times they look foolish. The leaders are supposed to be in the "know" and that 50 miles Norris drives everyday, might be very important, and too, do you think a WAC could repair the car if something happened—probably not.

### WHERE TO. NEXT?

N. Africa, Aug. 18 (AP).—Two superb armies in Sicily — the American Seventh and the British Eighth—are ready to go at any minute on bold new offensives. Ben. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared on Wednesday, reporting that the Axis lost more than 167,000 men killed, wounded and captured on the island up to Aug. 10. Sicily is already ours.

### FDR. CHURCHILL WORK

Quebec, Canada, Aug. 18 (UP).—President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill Wednesday worked with military leaders over a detailed master plan for forcing and taking the fortress Europe while Anthony Eden, British Foreign Secretary, arrived to work on the political problems likely to follow victory.

### FR. WIELDS CLUB! WHAT?

Washington, Aug. 18 (AP).—President Roosevelt handed the War Labor Board a financial club Wednesday with which to enforce its orders against defiant unions. The orders gives WLB power to punish a recalcitrant union by withholding checkoff dues until it comes into line, or knock out other contract benefits.

### ZMYEV FALL THREATEN KHARKOV

London, Aug. 18 (AP).—Russian troops plunged across the Donets river below Kharkov captured Zmyev (and it's not misspelled) 20 miles south of the city. Tuesday, in a quick thrust that threatened to cut off the last escape railways leading out of the besieged city, Moscow disclosed Wednesday nite.

### WHAT'S WRONG AT A&M

Austin, Texas, Aug. 18—An investigation of the charges made in connection with changes in personnel at Texas A&M College will be made by the Senate general investigating committee starting Thursday with all directors and certain other witnesses summoned to testify, the committee decided Wednesday.

### SICILY RETURN IMPLIED

Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 18 (AP).—Admitting Allied might had forced Axis abandonment of Sicily Italian Premier Marshal Pietro Badoglio Wednesday implied future return of the war-torn isle to Italy and brought the nation's World War leader, Vittorio Orlando out of his anti-Fascist retirement to cheer his fellow Sicilians.

### RAF HITS SCHWEINFURT

London, Aug. 18 (AP).—In a smashing climax to nearly 3,000 American and British warplane

sorties in 24 hours, the RAF's big bombers switched with smooth and tremendous power from the Italian to the German theatre Tuesday night and crushed one of the Nazi's vital war plants so thoroughly that officials estimated it hardly could be re-established within a year.

### LOCAL BOARDS CAN RESTORE CUTS

Washington, Aug. 18 (AP).—The change in the value of gasoline rationing coupons will not affect essential driving in Texas, and local boards have authority to ministrations assured all members of the Texas congressional delegation.

Australia, Aug. 19 (UP).—Destruction of the Jap air force at Wewak, New Guinea, where 170 planes were blasted, was completed Wednesday a communique announced today. A total of 215 Jap planes is the total.

### ANTI-STRIKE LAW OK IN PITTSBURGH

Pittsburgh, Aug. 18 (AP).—The Smith-Cannally anti-strike law cleared its first legal hurdle today when federal court Judge F. P. Schoonmaker overruled motions to quash indictments against 30 miners on grounds and measures is unconstitutional.

## Farm News

### PLANTING FALL POTATOES

When you plant your fall Irish potatoes you may select seed from those harvested in the spring. The small potatoes may be planted whole, but the larger ones should be cut into pieces half the size of a hen's egg just before planting. If the potatoes have been kept in cold storage at a temperature of 40 degrees for 30 days before planting sprouting will be hastened.

In preparing the soil, clean off all weeds and grass. Weeds turned under at this time of year will heat and cause the soil to dry out. Trampled barnyard manure will not burn plants. If a supply is available, spread a coating over the soil and plow it under five to six inches deep. Summer manure adds plant food and increases the water holding capacity of the soil.

Five hundred pounds of seed potatoes will plant an acre, and five to six pounds will plant one hundred feet of row. But don't plant in dry soil. If necessary irrigate a day or two before planting. In planting, open furrows 4 to 5 inches deep and drop the seed fourteen inches apart. Cover as soon as possible after dropping, and when they come up, work them every seven to ten days.

### Wisconsin Turkey Man Visits Gatesville

A. H. Trask of Black River Falls, Wisconsin was a visitor in the County Agent's office Tuesday. The object of Mr. Trask's visit was to make a new contract for turkey eggs. During the past season he purchased over 1400 eggs from Mrs. Stewart Williams and Mrs. Charles Copeland. He visited the ranch homes of these ladies and entered in a contract to buy 30,000 eggs next spring from these two parties. Mr. Trask spoke favorably of Texas as a turkey egg producing state. Our early season here places the eggs on the

market in advance of Washington, Oregon and other egg producing states. He also saw the broad breasted bronze turkey. He says he will start next week to sealing around 1000 birds per month.

The Williams and Copeland egg ranches were first among all eggs he received in the county.

### COTTON PICKERS NEEDED

One thousand acres of cotton in the Oglesby community is ready for picking. The County will need extra labor to gather the cotton crop. The County Agent's Office will receive a weekly report from each community as to its labor needs. Any one wanting to pick cotton may obtain there, the location of fields in the county ready to pick. The Chairman of each community committee will phone or write in the communities needs each Monday. Woodrow Wilson is contacting prospective cotton pickers and directing them to fields ready for harvest.

### Starve Your Garbage Pail

Last year a "garbage survey" showed that the waste of food per person in the United States probably averaged around 235 lbs. per year. Since there is a very definite shortage and a limit to the amount of food that we can produce, we must cut down on such a huge waste.

Food can be saved by proper preparation and cooking. You can cut your peeling thinner or cook vegetables with the peeling on. You can save the outer leaves of cabbage and lettuce. You can use the tops of beets and other root vegetables tops which are more nutritious than the bottoms. Be sure you thoroughly scrape batters and dough out of mixing bowls, and watch carefully to see that food doesn't burn. A great deal of food is lost that way. Poor cooking and tasteless, monotonous meals are the reason lots of food is left uneaten on our plates. You can help guard against cooking failures by measuring ingredients carefully.

A burned piece of toast and a shrivled carrot may not mean much to you but multiply those by 34 million homes. That means a waste that is tremendous. Not only the waste of amounts of food stuffs but of food values vitamins and minerals. You can help eliminate this tragic waste by guarding your food carefully from the garden or market basket to the table, and by selling your family on the policy of the clean plate

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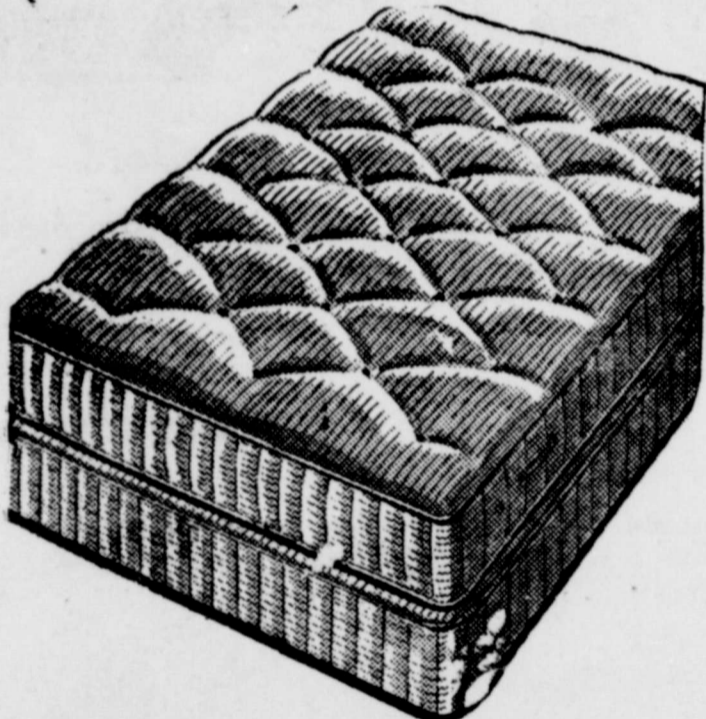

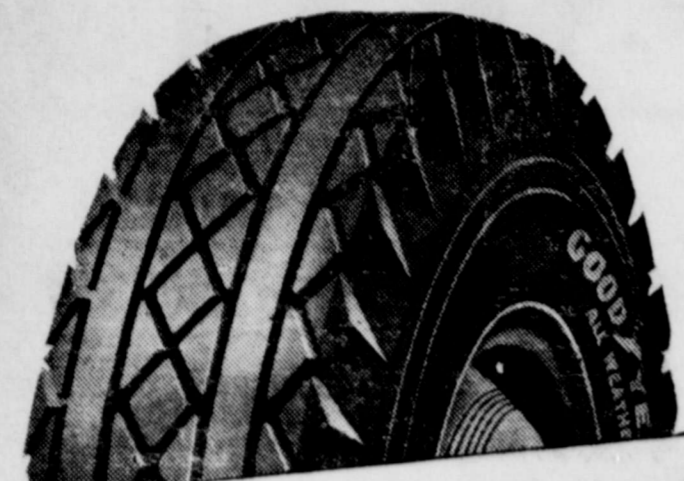

An interesting picture of American soldiers and sailors stationed at Western Hemisphere bases was recently given by William E. Leigh, director of the USO Overseas Division, upon return to New York from an inspection tour of USO overseas operations from Alaska to Brazil.

He found that wherever our men go they take America with them. They like to do things they used to do in this country—play American games, roller skate, read American periodicals. They like to eat ice cream sodas and hot dogs. At the USO Club in Trinidad, for example, where orchids grow near by, 700 gallons of ice cream and some 5,000 hot dogs a week are consumed by our men. All these things, Mr. Leigh says, make the men feel at home.

Americans with relatives and friends stationed in Western Hemisphere bases may find comfort in the knowledge that USO is providing our men with opportunities to do just the things mentioned by Mr. Leigh. USO has followed the Army and Navy at bases strung out from Alaska and Newfoundland down through the Canal Zone and the Cribben, all the way to Brazil. This service was undertaken at the request of the War and Navy Departments, which determine where USO shall operate, and which have not assigned USO to combat areas.

In establishing 160 clubs and mobile units, the USO Overseas Division has had to overcome many difficulties in priorities and transportation. More than one million men a month are now served by this USO division. Mr. Leigh and his fellow workers have done a fine job in providing "little Americas"—USO clubs—for these men

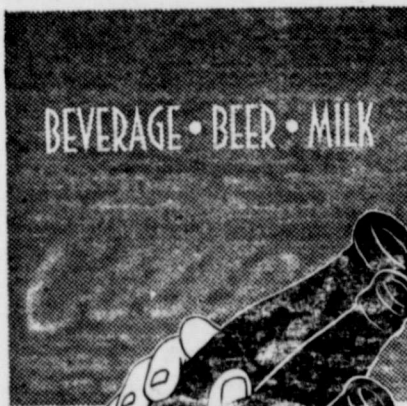
