## Explainer Of Income Tax "Guess" Comin'

He'll be a busy man, because nobody, and we almost mean nobody knows about the "filing of declaratory returns estimating income and victory tax liability for the year 1943 under the pay-as-you-go income tax law.

He'll be here September 3, 4, and 5 at the National Bank of Gatesville. No, there'll be two of them. They'll help you, and you are requested to have the following information to submit at this time.

1. A statement of estimated income for the year 1943 (entire calendar year).
2. The retained copy of their 1943 income tax return filed last spring.
3. A statement of Victory tax withheld from January 1, 1943 thru June 30, 1943.
4. Estimated income tax withheld from July 1, 1943 thru December 31, 1943.
5. An itemized statement on ordinary and necessary business expenses.
6. The amount of money paid on 1942 income tax last March 15, 1943 and June 15, 1943.

### CIANO TAKES A POWDER

London, Aug. 29 (AP).—Count Galeazzo Ciano, former Italian foreign minister and son-in-law of Benito Mussolini, escaped from Rome Saturday with his wife and three children, the German Overseas Radio reported Sunday. Another super man gone.

### TO AVENGE POLES

Washington, Aug. 29 (AP). — The U. S. Government reaffirmed Sunday "its resolve to punish the instigators and actual perpetrators" of German atrocities against the people of Poland.

### "ARB" PARLEY TALKED

London, Aug. 29 (AP).—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden returned to England from Quebec by air today and the event immediately set off speculation over the likelihood of an imminent war conference of Britain, the USA and Soviet Russia. Reckon Joe'll talk!

### ATLANTIC SINKING 3 A WEEK

(By Associated Press)  
Announced sinking of U. N. and neutral shipping in the western Atlantic in the first 35 weeks of 1943 were slightly more than 3 a week, in contrast to the average of 10 weekly in the first year of the war. 686 ships, their cargoes, time spent on them, and the money cost of both ship and cargo have gone down since Pearl Harbor. Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 29 (AP).—Nineteen coal miners, including at least four members of volunteer rescue crews, were killed and 25 others injured Saturday night and early Sunday when two terrific gas explosions blasted the Republic Steel Corporation's Sayreton No. 2 slope here.

### 6000 NAZIS DIE

London, Aug. 30 (AP).—Russia's southern armies plunging toward the Dnieper river have killed 6000 Germans and captured nearly 100 villages yesterday in gains of four to nine miles, Moscow announced early today, amid strong indications that axis lines were cracking in the huge Donets basin.

### ROCKDALE BLOWN & BURNED

Rockdale, Texas, Aug. 29 (AP).—Fire and storm by turn swept this central Texas town today, the largest fire in Rockdale's history destroying an entire business block early today and a tornado damaging a residential district late this afternoon.

### DANES SCUTTLE FLEET

Stockholm, Sweden, Aug. 29, (AP). Germany clamped down a military dictatorship over Denmark Sunday, but the effort to

crush the revolting Danes met violent resistance immediately as Danish naval forces scuttled most of their fleet in a battle with German troops.

### BALKANS BLAZE

London, Aug. 29 (AP). Amid scramble for power sufficient to set the Balkans ablaze following the mysterious death of King Boris of Bulgaria was predicted Sunday by London morning newspapers as Germany faced collaboration problems 1,100 miles apart across subjugated Europe.

### READY FOR KILL, SALAMAUA

S. Pacific, Aug. 29 (AP).—Gen Sir Thomas Blamey, commanding the Allied land forces in New Guinea, is in the field for the kill at Salamaua, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters disclosed Sunday.

### ITALY'S TOE UNCOVERED

N. Africa Aug. 29 (AP).—Allied air units increased the intensity of their round-the-clock blows against southern and Central Italy Saturday with bombing raids extending to the north of Rome and returning fliers said the Italian toe appeared to have been deserted by the enemy.

### WAGE RAISES OUTSTRIP HCL

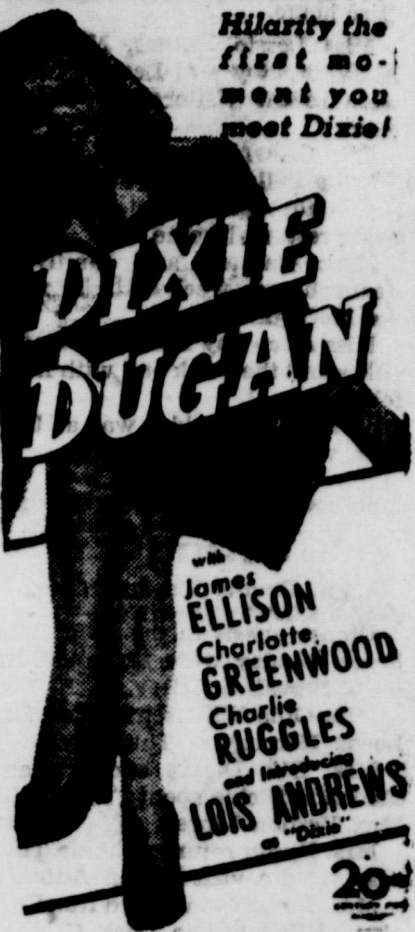
