## R. N. Winship Jr. Dies Of Injury: Buried In Houston

Superintendent R. N. Winship, Jr., of Gatesville State School for Boys, died Friday night about 7:45 in the Coryell Memorial hospital at Gatesville, from complications resulting from a compound fracture of his ankle.

The accident happened a week ago on his ranch near Junction. He was starting a gasoline engine used for pumping water, the engine backfired throwing gasoline on him and setting him afire. He ran to a creek or pond nearby, and in jumping in, received a compound fracture of his ankle. Medical aid was given as soon as possible, and he was brought to the local hospital. Burns received were called only "first-degree".

Wednesday, his injury not improving, a Waco specialist was called in and it was decided to amputate his leg, after building him up with blood plasma, and the amputation was made Friday. He died several hours later.

Funeral services were held at the First Presbyterian church here at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon with Dr. Gaines B. Hall officiating. Immediately after the services the body was conveyed to Houston and interment was in Forrest Park.

Mr. Winship was 41, and was born in Abilene in 1901. He was married to Miss Gladys Holcomb, June 6, 1938, and to this union, three sons were born, Robert Jr., David and Dan. He was also survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Winship, Sr., of Junction, one brother, George Winship, who is in the civil service Aircraft control of Abilene.

Mr. Winship, came to Gatesville two years and 3 days ago to take charge of the Gatesville State School for Boys, and had just recently been renamed by the Texas Board of Control for another term and had been offered a better paying position elsewhere.

He had a great many friends over the entire state, and on a number of occasions, had been asked to speak before law enforcement officers in the periodical FBI schools over the state.

Mr. Winship was a serious minded, conscientious man and had his heart set on improving the conditions and training of the boys of the local school.

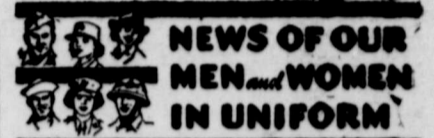
## Coryell's Quota On War Bonds Will Buy 5 Bombers

## ALLIES LAND ON HUON COAST PLANES ATTACK FROM INDIA

S. Pacific Sept. 6 (AP).—Allied troops have landed in force on the coast of Huon Gulf, east of Lae, New Guinea, it was announced Monday. Lae is one of the principal Jap strongholds and is approximately 15 miles N.E. of Salamaua, where American and Australian troops have been closing in on the Jap airdrome.

## ITALO INVASION GETS 40 TOWNS

N. Africa, Sept. 5 (AP).—Allied forces throwing Commando, clawlike pincers over the top of the Italian toe, have seized Bagnara, clamped a firm hold on a 40-mile invasion arc from Melito to Bagnara, and taken more than 2,000 prisoners, and 40 towns.

## ALLIED OFFICERS VISIT GREEKS

London, Sept. 5 (UP).—Staff officers of the Allied Middle East command, completing a mission as daring as Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark's preinvasion trip to Africa have conferred with guerilla leaders in Greece and Yugoslavia, it was learned reliably Sunday nite.

## NEW DELHI, SEPT. 5 (AP).—American Liberator bombers, winging almost 1,000 miles into the Indian Ocean, have opened a new western aerial offensive against the approaches to the Jap-occupied rubber-rich Netherlands E. Indies, a 10th U. S. Air Force headquarters communique disclosed Sunday.

**REDS 15 MILES FROM STALINO**

## OVERSEAS SOLDIERS TO VOTE

Washington, Sept. 5 (UP).—Rep. Adolph J. Sabath, democrat, Illinois, new wheelhorse and one of the original authors of 4-term talk, announced tonight that he would introduce a bill conferring absentee voting privileges to more than 2,000,000 overseas members of the armed forces and some 100,000 civilians who are abroad.

## RAF JABS BELGIUM, DUTCH

London, Sept. 5 (AP).—American and British bombers pounded Belgium railway yards and Dutch airfields in the continued grinding down of axis communications and air bases in potential invasion areas of western Europe today after the RAF Mosquitoes jabbed into the Ruhr and Rhineland by night.

Beginning next Friday night there will be a "Mr. & Mrs. Club" for married soldiers and their wives. This is a social club and will meet each week on Friday nights. Also, plans are being made for a World Affairs Discussion Group for soldiers. Any local citizen who would be willing to lead or participate in a discussion is invited to call the USO office and leave his or her name.

Requests are being made by officials of the Prisoners of War Camp for donations of ladies clothing that would be suitable for costumes to be used in dramatic skits. A great many people are unaware of the fact that regulations regarding the prisoners of war are laid down by the Geneva Conference and require that the same efforts of entertainment, housing and food be given to them as given to the soldiers. Every effort is being made at North Camp Hood to carry out the regulations.

The watermelon cut arranged for Negro soldiers last Saturday night was an outstanding success.

Even though there is not yet a building for this club activities are being carried on and a permanent director for the club is expected to arrive in Gatesville this week.

As the armed forces of the United States have increased in numbers, the USO, a member agency of the National War Fund has matched the government's pace. All in all, USO operators now total 2,356. These include 1,616 clubs, offices, lounges, Travelers Aid, mobile and maneuvers, and overseas services, plus 740 community-conducted operations. National agency operations total 1,462.
