

Government Says Advertising Major Necessity

Washington, Sept. 26 (AP). America's advertising was praised by the Commerce Department Sunday as a major weapon of the home front with vital wartime information its ammunition.

Summarizing what it termed the official attitude of the government as a whole, the department issued a 96-page booklet declaring that advertising scheduled in all media should be maintained as a a constructive contribution to the war effort.




