ALLIES GAIN 30 MILES

N. Africa, Sept. 26 (AP).—American tanks and infantry have smashed their way 30 miles deep into German defenses northeast of Salerno, front line dispatches disclosed Sunday night as the Allies registered important gains all the way across Italy from the Tyrrhenian to the Adriatic.

REDS CROSS RIVER

London, Sept. 26 (AP).—The Red Army raced thru 825 more villages Sunday to reach the eastern bank of the 1,400-foot wide Dnieper river opposite the glittering prize of Kiev, Ukraine capital Moscow announced, while Berlin officially declared that some Russian units already had leaped that natural defense barrier.

Government Says Advertising Major Necessity

Washington, Sept. 26 (AP).—America's advertising was praised by the Commerce Department Sunday as a major weapon of the home front with vital wartime information its ammunition.

Summarizing what it termed the official attitude of the government as a whole, the department issued a 96-page booklet declaring that advertising scheduled in all media should be maintained as a constructive contribution to the war effort.

At the same time, the Department of Commerce sensed the danger of a gradual decrease or cessation of advertising either by companies that had converted wholly to war production or by those whose civilian output had been curtailed.

Charlottesville, Va., Sept. 26 (AP).—A passenger train carrying Nazi prisoners of war from a port of debarkation to an inland prison camp was wrecked here Sunday, killing the fireman and engineer and injuring a number of the U. S. military guard and prisoners.

NAZIS MOVE INTO BULGARIA

Istanbul, Sept. 26 (AP).—Germany is moving swiftly to occupy all of Bulgaria in force and is feverishly preparing that kingdom as major Balkan battleground the first trustworthy news to seep thru Gestapo since King Boris' death said Saturday.

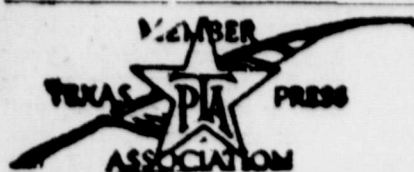

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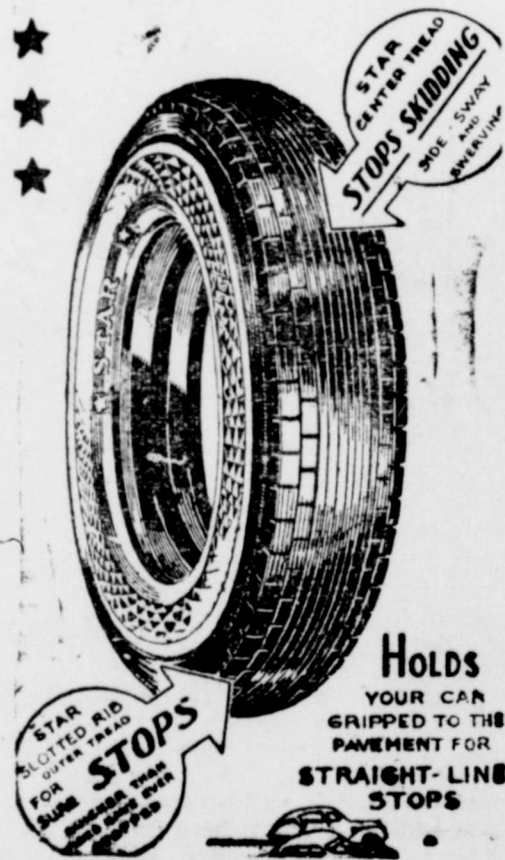
