RALLY AT 2:00 THURSDAY CLOSES DRIVE WITH MORE THAN \$63,000 TO SPARE; MORE FROM OTHER COMMUNITIES IN COUNTY

Coryell County Dood It! Dood it, to the tune of \$1,136,118.00 at the close of a rally staged in the City Hall at Gatesville, Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. All businesses in town closed with the exception of 24.

Chairman J. A. Painter first opened the meeting, telling the 1,000 people assembled that the approximate total raised on the \$973,000 was \$525,000 and that we had \$450,000 to raise, and then turned the meeting over to Publicity Chairman C. E. Alvis, Sr., who with a stirring talk, said, we are going to do it, and do it be-

fore we leave this building. It was done, and HOW!

First, calling off amounts to be purchased was from the right side of the house. There were calls of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$200, \$500, \$1,000, \$2,000, \$3,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, \$50,000 and one or more \$100,000, and, adding up the contributions from the three sides of the house, the grand total of \$1,010,118.00 was raised in about an hour and a half.

Mr. Alvis had shown how bonds could be purchased with a very little down, and at a very unusual rate of interest, the balance could

be borrowed from the local banks, and figuring off the percents the bonds paid, would only cost the borrower a few cents a day for the bond, no matter what size. High School Rally showed that \$16,349 dollars worth of bonds and stamps had been bought there. Arnett added another \$5,000 to their purchase of \$28,000 or more than \$100 per capita, and Turnersville had that much or more, too.

LEADS ATTACK ON NAPLES

Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark, commander of the American 5th Army in the invasion of Italy, a captain in the 11th Infantry in the World War, was wounded during the German advance toward Paris in June, 1918. He was deputy commander-in-chief of the forces landing in Africa and was the hero of a submarine adventure in establishing contact with the Free French in Algiers preparatory to the landing of Allied troops in November, 1942.

FIVE FARM OWNERSHIP LOANS ALLOTTED FOR CORYELL COUNTY

Coryell county has been allotted funds for purchase of five farms by tenant farmers under the Farm Ownership Program of the FSA.

Tenants who want this type of loan can make application to the FSA office in Gatesville. If they have previously made application they should make another. Application since July 1, 1942 will still be accepted.

Applicants with children and own farm equipment and livestock are given preference. Interest is 3 percent and 40 years to pay.

"Amendment No. 40 to Ration Order 17, issued September 24, 1943, effective Sept. 27, 1943, amends Sec. 1.16 to remove expiration date for stamp 18 and to announce November 1, 1943 as opening validity date for airplane stamp No. 1 in War Ration Book Three. No expiration date specified for latter stamp."

Clyde Galloway Is Charged In Death Of Joe Henson

Clyde Galloway was returned to McLennan county by Sheriff Homer Casey, and charged with failing to stop and render aid in connection with the death of Joe Henson, farmer, of Oglesby on the outskirts of McGregor 13 days ago.

Sheriff Casey said Galloway signed a statement admitting he was driving a car which struck a man, who, Casey quoted him as saying, "either stumbled or ran" into the road ahead of him. Casey said Galloway told him that he was unable to stop before hitting the man and when he did stop and go back, he saw a man lying beside the road. He said he did not attempt to give him any aid, simply drove away with his brother-in-law, Houston Jacques of Crawford. Casey said he handed the signed statement over to Assistant District Attorney Roy Chambers for filing.

The tragedy happened the night of Sept. 16, just west of the under pass on U.S. 84 at the outskirts of McGregor. Next morning the body was found lying by the roadside. Henson had apparently been instantly killed.

Galloway was arrested in Houston by Sheriff Homer Casey and Constable Billy Wheat of McGregor, after Jacques had made a statement to Casey and State High

2 GALS PER COUPON?

Washington, Sept. 29—The value of a gasoline ration coupon in the Midwest and Southwest will be reduced from their present 3 gallons each to 2 gallons, Rep. Clarence J. Brown of Ohio told a group of Midwest members of Congress Wednesday. He said his information was based on rather well established reports.

NAPLES ANY MOMENT

N. Africa, Sept. 29 (AP)—The American 5th Army raced Wednesday to within a few miles of ravaged Naples and was expected to enter the terrorized city at any moment after driving the Germans into full flight across the coastal plains near Mount Vesuvius with strong armored forces.

NAZIS LOSE KREMENCHUG & RUDNYA

London, Sept. 29 (AP)—The Red army rolled to within 110 miles of both the old Polish border in the north and the Rumanian frontier in the south Wednesday in widely separated blows which captured Rudnya, midway between Smolensk and Vitebsk, and Kremenchug, on the east bank of the Dnieper River between Kiev and Dnepropetrovsk.

SOLONS WANT TO DRAFT DADS UNDER 30

Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—Congressional strength built up steadily Wednesday behind moves for induction of childless government employees and the under 30 age group in large numbers so as to cushion the general impact of the draft on older men with children. BILLION-DOLLAR FARM SUBSIDY FIGHT

Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—The administration opened a campaign Wednesday for congressional support of its 1944 food production program which would guarantee farmers somewhat higher prices on essential items while protecting customers against corresponding price advances thru the use of subsidies.

BIG NAVY TRANSPORT SUNK

Guadalcanal (AP). (Delayed)—The large Navy transport, John Penn, was torpedoed and sunk in a smartly executed new-style Jap torpedo plane attack on supply ships off Guadalcanal.

MORE DEPENDENCY PAY FOR CHILDREN

Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—The army and navy backed higher government payments to children of service men today, but opposed a boost for childless wives.

SENATORS SAY WAR TIL 1945

Washington, Sept. 29 (AP)—Three senators just back from an inspection trip of world battlefronts said today they believed that the war in the Pacific would not end before 1945 but that a collapse of Germany may come any time. They're just half-right.

OPA PENALTY VIOLATIONS ILLEGAL

Dallas, Sept. 29 (AP)—The OPA suspension or shutdown order system, employed against business firms and individuals found by a hearing officer to be violating rationing regulations, was ruled unconstitutional today in an order issued by Federal Judge W. H. Atwell. The judge called it "a modern instance of pure dictatorship". Hooray, Judge, but some ex-senator-rep.'s liable to get your job.

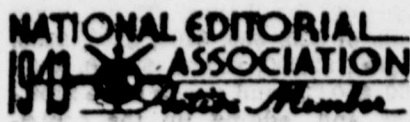
D.A.O. AHYEAMPONG IS ONANHENE OF AKIM ABUAKWA

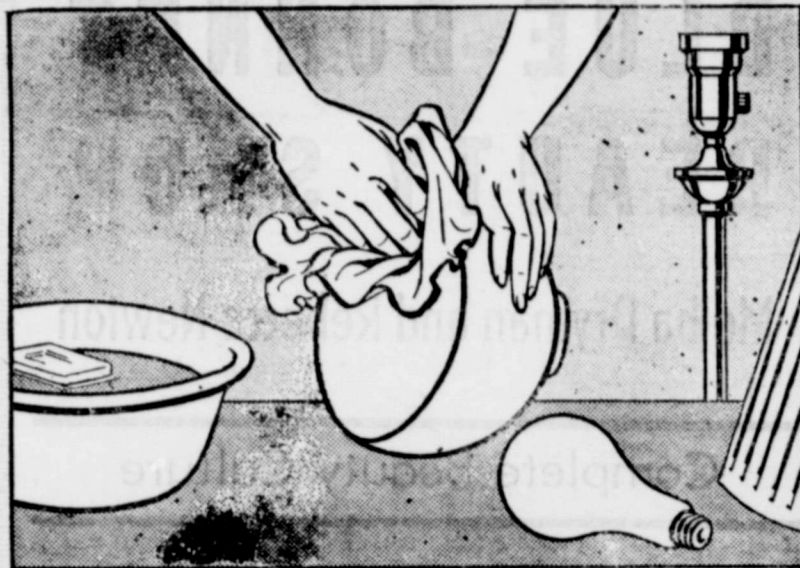

Wartime Lighting Suggestions

HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT FROM YOUR PRESENT EQUIPMENT



Keep Bulbs, Diffusing Bowls and Enclosing Globes Clean

You're paying for light you're not getting when dust and dirt accumulate on lighting equipment. Light meter tests show that simply by cleaning bulbs, diffusing bowls and enclosing globes you can increase light output as much as 30 to 50 per cent. Unscrew bulbs and wipe them off with a damp cloth. Remove diffusing bowls, enclosing globes and other lighting glassware and wash in warm, soapy water. Be sure to dry all lighting equipment thoroughly before using again.

OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE LIGHT

1. Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-colored paper or parchment shades.
2. Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes.
3. Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs by using shades deep enough and wide enough.
4. Arrange furniture so one lamp can serve two people. But be sure lamp is not too far away from either person.
5. Have eyes examined regularly by a competent eyesight specialist.
6. Turn off lamps not in use. Lamp bulbs use critical materials. Make them last longer.

Electricity is vital to war production. Use all you need but don't waste it just because it's cheap and isn't rationed.

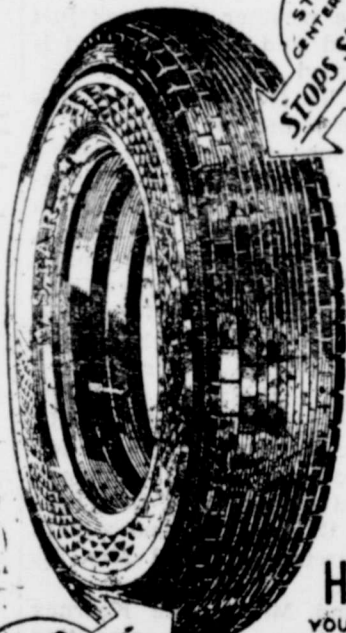

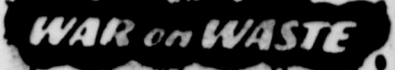

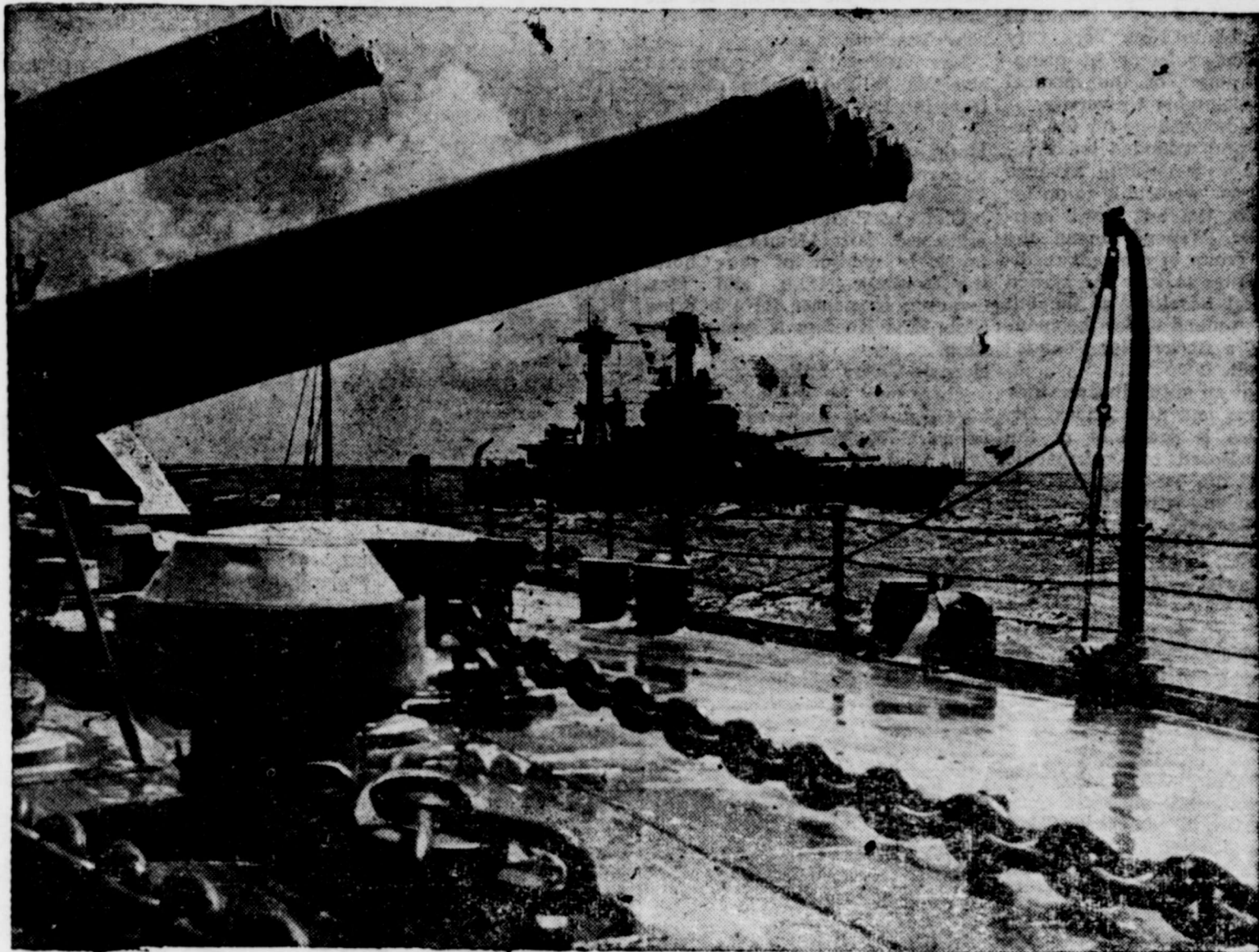

FROM Camp Hood

An inspection of the Camp Hood Station hospital, where he praised the physical equipment and personnel skilled to handle any condition arising from injuries or disease, was made last week by Dr. Phillip D. Wilson surgeon-in-chief of the Hospital for the Ruptured and Crippled in New York City and clinician professor of orthopaedic surgery of the medical school of Columbia University.

"What is being done for the Army's sick and wounded today represents a very definite advance over what we were able to do for our men in the last war," commented Dr. Wilson, among the first of a group of eminent medical authorities to tour the station and general hospitals of the 8th Service Command under the sponsorship of a Rockefeller Foundation project.

Writer of an authoritative work on fractures and dislocations, Dr. Wilson also is president of the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery of the American Medical Association and a member of the National Research Council. He is being accompanied by Col. Bradley L. Coley, surgical consultant for the Eighth Service Command.

News-caster Earl Godwin, whose pertinent comments on world affairs are heard nightly from coast-to-coast, thinks the Tank Destroyers may revolutionize this war.

Speaking at graduation exercises of the Tank Destroyer School 47th officer candidate class conducted Friday, he remarked: "You are part of the finest army the world has ever seen, at a time when we need it badly. This is likely to be the beginning of a new age or the ending of an old age. You younger men are on the threshold of tremendous things. It is in your power to come into a new, clean world. Elder statesmen have laid a mess on your doorstep. You will have to clean it up, and I know you will."

Brig. Gen. H. T. Mayberry, who extended invitation to the commentator to address the class, presented commissions to the new officers, including Godwin's son, Lt. Harry E. Godwin.

Major Ross H. Boas, holder of the Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star with oak leaf, the Purple Heart and the Croix de Guerre with palm, and an overseas veteran of 26 months in World War I, is the new camp engineer. He succeeds Col. Homer G. Olmstead, camp engineer since June 16, 1942, who retires from active Army service, Sept. 30.

Capt. Nina E. V. Donahue of Quincy, Mass., has reported at Camp Hood to assume the duties of commanding officer of the WAC Detachment, 1848 Unit. She is a graduate of the first Officer Candidate School class at Fort Des Moines, Iowa. Before coming to Camp Hood, she was in charge of statistics in the prisoner of war branch, 8th Service Command, headquarters, Dallas.
