

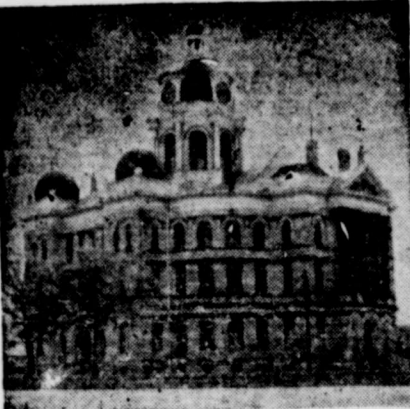

## War Ration Book No. 4 Went Thurs. Goin' Fri. & Sat.

Issue days for War Ration Book No. 4 was Thursday, is today, and will be tomorrow, at your local school. They're to last 2 years, so far.

Each school was supposed to have announced the exact time and date.

Applicant don't have to fill out any form declaring how much on hand, but must bring all their Ration Books III with them. If you don't, you won't get IV.

An application blank will need to be retained by the Board for the record, but this will be filled out by volunteer workers and will need only the signature of the housewife or other member of the family making application. Ollie Little, County Superintendent urges all to some early. 24,000 of the new books will be issued thru the schools, it is estimated.

Green stamps in book IV are valid Nov. 1 for canned and processed foods and Stamp 29 with the word "sugar" printed on them. This was done in the "big shops" and couldn't be stopped after coffee was unrationed. No, coffee isn't rationed, not now.

Every person required to register under the SS Act is to have in his personal possession at all times both his Registration Card and his current Notice of Classification. If they are lost, he should immediately make application to the local board for a duplicate.

The following registrants are delinquent with the Coryell county Local Board; William Ueal Carter (colored) and Kelton Shephen Farmer. The Board urges all registrants to check at the office of the local board immediately and be sure that the files reflect the current address, and occupation. The local board is on floor No. 2 in the court house, Gatesville, and the hours are 8 to 5, Mon. thru Sat.

## New General In Charge At "The Hoods": Hester

Major General John H. Hester assumes command of the Tank Destroyer Center on the departure of Major General Ward to special duty with the War Department.

The change in command will take place after the two generals have completed their inspection of activities of Camp Hood and conferred on future training plans General Hester arrived Tuesday.

General Hester brings a wealth of experience, as troop commander, instructor, tactician, general staff officer, executive, and his breadth of duty assignments covers 35 years of military service. He was graduated from the U. S. Military Academy in 1908, and was assigned as a 2nd lieutenant to the 17th Infantry at Ft. McPherson, Ga. He served in other stations in this country and on duty in the Philippines until 1915.

He participated in the punitive expedition into Mexico and from then to 1917 he acted as military instructor at Georgia Military Academy when he was ordered to Washington.

## FARMER'S INCOME TRIPLES

Farm cash income in the Dallas Ft. Worth agricultural district tripled in August compared to a year ago, soaring to \$27,154.00 from \$10,631,000.

The Dallas-Ft. Worth district includes the following counties: Bell, Bosque, Collin, Cooke, Dallas, CORYELL, Delta, Denton, Ellis, Falls, Fannin, Grayson, Hamilton, Hill, Hunt, Jackson, Kaufman, Lamar, Limestone, McLennan, Milam, Navarro, Rockwall, Tarrant and Williamson.

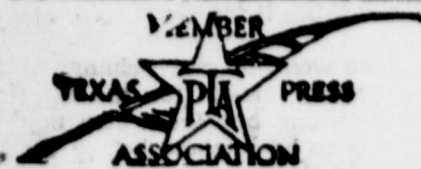

I, Private Enterprise, have brought men of the same countries and men of distant countries closer together in friendly intercourse than all the Socialistic and Communistic doctrines combined.

I am the expression and sustainer of all that is lordly in the human soul—self-reliance, the adventurous spirit, emotional and mental initiative, ambition and inventive resourcefulness.

With my rebirth in the Renaissance the human level of living began to rise.

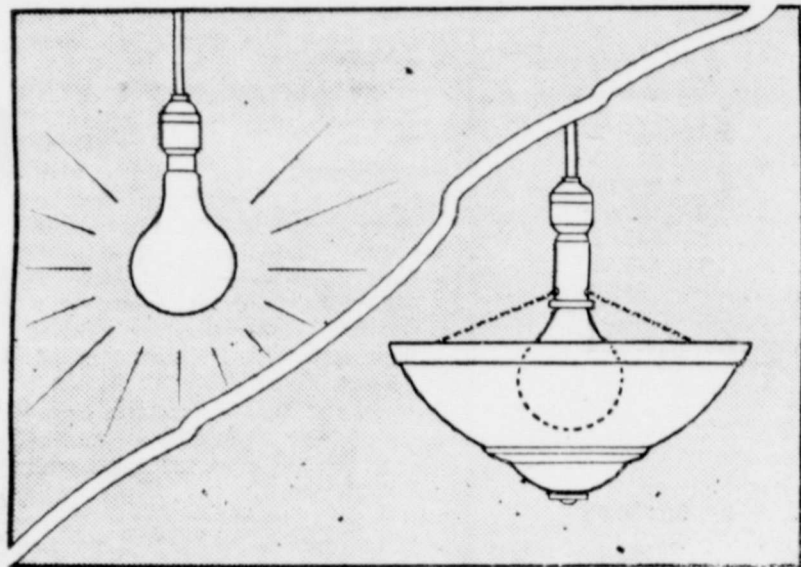

## Wartime Lighting Suggestions

HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT FROM YOUR PRESENT EQUIPMENT



### Shade Bare Bulbs

Glare from bare bulbs wastes light by making the pupils of the eye contract—like facing bright headlights at night. When contracted the pupils admit less light, hence make seeing more difficult. Reflected glare is just as harmful as direct glare, causing squinting and blinking which indicate eyestrain. The cure is to equip bare bulbs with shades or diffusing bowls to break up harsh direct rays of light . . . provide restful, eye-easy illumination.

### OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE LIGHT

1. Remove and clean lamp bulb and lamp bowls regularly. Dry thoroughly before using again.
2. Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-colored paper or parchment shades.
3. Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes.
4. Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs by using shades deep enough and wide enough.
5. Arrange furniture so one lamp can serve two people. But be sure lamp is not too far way from either person.
6. Turn off lamps not in use. Lamp bulbs use critical materials. . . Make them last longer.

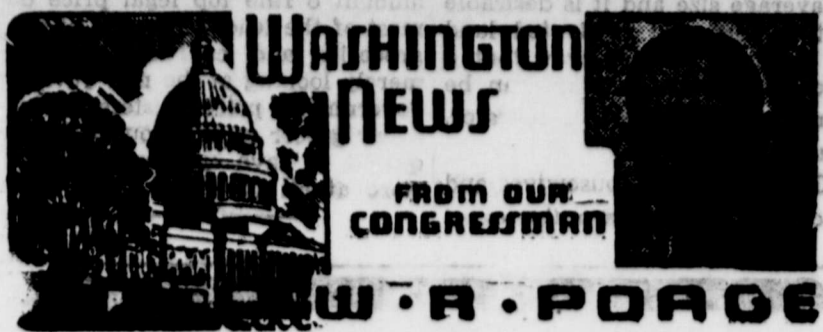

Dear Friends:  
Last week Miss Green, of our office, wrote this column while I was in St. Louis and later in Texas. I went to St. Louis to meet with national officials of the R.E.A. and representatives from local Texas R.E.A. cooperatives to plan for the expansion of electric service to more farm families just as soon as the war is over. We know that our Texas farmers are not going to complain while our boys abroad need the copper and aluminum necessary for the extension of rural lines, but we want to be ready to extend electric service to every farm home in the Eleventh District as soon as the

fighting stops. I hope other industries will perfect their plans now for peace-time development because this nation simply can't afford to let our industrial production come to a stop at the end of the war. If we do we may have great difficulty getting it to rolling again. It is going to take the very best and most thorough planning to shift the millions of people and the thousands of factories that are now making bombers, tanks, explosives, etc. into the production of the things a peaceful people need. So long as our present high employment continues there will be buying power to absorb such civilian production, but if we stop production to re-

tool, we are likely to create unemployment to destroy buying power, and in turn, make the production of civilian goods unprofitable which would of course, lead to still further unemployment and plunge us directly into the depression spiral.

There has been very little action on the Floor of the House for the past month, so when I found that I would have three or four days after completing my business in St. Louis, I went to Texas and attended a farm meeting in Waco where we discussed the serious protein feed situation. I don't have any "quick cure" to offer, and the farmers, dairymen, and feed dealers with whom I talked had none. The problem is more serious than many of our city friends realize. In spite of the efforts of the O.P.A. which limit the price the farmer can get for his cottonseed, the price for protein feed has gone "sky high". The cost of producing milk and of fattening cattle has advanced rapidly; yet there has been no corresponding increase in the price of milk or of meat. Of course, the government is at the moment spending hundreds of millions of dollars on subsidies which are supposed to reduce the cost of milk and beef to the consumer, and at the same time keep the income of the producers up. Unfortunately these subsidies have not worked out as their proponents said they would. Every farmer knows that he is actually getting much less for his cattle than he was when the subsidy was put into effect three months ago, yet I am sure very few consumers have been able to buy beef any cheaper. The only important result has been to enrich the big packers at the expense of the tax payers and in the long run to decrease the amount of food that will be produced in the future. I fear the whole subsidy program. You can't feed a nation by paying all citizens' grocery bill with tax money taken from these same citizens or with money secured through the sale

of bonds. You must increase the production of food. To my mind, this feed shortage shows this very clearly. There simply was not enough cottonseed produced. For instance, this year, Texas grew slightly more than 8,000,000 acres of cotton and will produce about 415,000 tons of cottonseed meal and cake. In 1937, Texas grew more than twelve and one-half millions acres of cotton and produced 751,611 tons of protein feed. Since I have been back in Washington, I have been promised by the Department of Agriculture that they will move some soybean to Central Texas for crushing in the next few days. This will help, but the "great fight" between the idea of a fair price to encourage adequate production of food as against a subsidy that costs billions and so far, has not produced food or reduced prices is yet to come. On yesterday, the House Committee on Banking and Currency reported a bill prohibiting subsidies. When it gets on the Floor, we will see one of the really bitter fights of the year.

For the past few days, the House has discussed a Senate Bill to increase the allotments made to mothers and children of ser-

vice men. This is especially important and needed now that fathers are being called. I think that if we must call fathers to the service, the very least we can do is to provide liberally for their wives and children. I shall, therefore, vote for the bill on next Monday. Those of us who stay at home should not begrudge the payment of the stiffest kind of taxes to make things as easy as we can for the loved ones of those who are doing the actual fighting.
