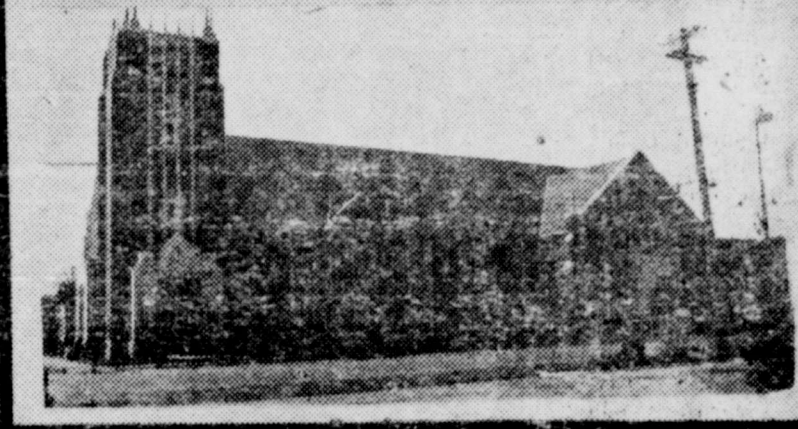

NEWS OF OUR MEN and WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Here's a summary of a story that appeared in the Rising Star Record, some time ago, and it's about a grand nephew of Mrs. J. B. Scott of Rt. 2, Gatesville, a son of Mrs. Janice Young, formerly Miss Mary Scott. It's about Judd Morrow, Jr., who is in the U. S. Navy.

Morrow is wearing 7 stars on his breast, representing 7 major engagements. He entered the service in July, 1941 and was assigned to the Enterprise in July, '42, where he served as a machinist's mate.

The ship was in 140 miles of Pearl Harbor when the Japs hit, and narrowly missed the first action, but arrived on the morning of December 8, and helped to drive the enemy away. On the 9th the Enterprise slipped out of the harbor and disappeared. It was called the "Galloping Ghost" because it appeared out of nowhere to fight the enemy and when the action was over, disappeared again.

During the first year, the ship traveled 96,000 miles, sank 21 ships while alone, brought down 185 airplanes and sank 32 ships with the task force. It was the first ship to take the offensive

In time of action the men are on duty 24 hours and they get their sleep and meals when they can.

Most of the action was in the Pacific Islands around Guadalcanal, Santa Cruz and other points. Asked about the people, Judd said they appeared to be bushy haired negroes. Some were small and

others large. The women were usually small, shriveled creatures carrying heavy loads of coconuts and other native products. The charm of the South Sea Islands exists mostly in story and motion pictures. The only pretty women are those of other countries who have come to the islands.

The natives live on fish and

fresh fruits such as coconuts, oranges, bananas and other tropical fruits, some of which are unknown here.

Nobody works in the islands and no attempt is made to till the rich soil, the natives taking a living from the things that grow wild in the woods. They don't care for

NEW 8TH ASSUALT IN ITALY

Algiers, Oct. 24 (AP).—The British 8th launching a drive against the Trigna River line on the anniversary of El Alamein, speared ahead 5 to 6 miles Saturday and crossed the river it was announced Sunday.

REDS NEAR VITAL KRIVOI ROG

London, Oct. 24 (AP).—The Red army smashed half way across the Nnaieper River loop to within 6 miles of Krivoi Rog Sunday, and lunged 6 miles beyond fallen melitopol in a surge toward the Crimea.

2-WAY BOMBER ATTACK POUND NAZIS

London, Oct. 24 (AP).—Allied bombers, striking from both north and south, bombed France, Austria and Hungray in the heart of Germany's fortress Sunday as the Americans raided new forces for long range penetrations perhaps to Berlin and beyond.

FOREIGN POLICY DEBATE IN SENATE

Washington, Oct. 24 (UP).—The most significant foreign policy debate since the end of World War I opens tomorrow when the se-

nate undertakes consideration of the Connally post-war resolution on international peace machinery.

MENACE OF COAL WALKOUTS

Washington, Oct. 24 (AP).—Expressing deep concern over current coal strikes as dangerous to the war effort, the war production board said today that if the situation is not solved swiftly, steel plants, shipyards and munitions factories may be forced to close for lack of fuel.

23 JAP PLANES; 2 SHIPS AT WEWAK

S. Pac. Oct. 25, (AP)—Allied warplanes lashing heavily at the enemy in the southwest Pacific, destroyed 23 Jap planes, several barges and two ships at Wewak, N. Guinea, and scored direct hits on a ship resembling an aircraft carrier near Buka.

FRANCE, AUSTRIA, HUNGARY BATTERED

London, Oct. 24 (AP)—Gen. Josip (Tito) Borz's guerilla armies, battling German forces along almost the entire length of Yugoslavia, have stormed two strongly defended towns and captured 2000 nazi officers and men in western Boenio, the free Yugoslav radio

announced.

BLAST KILLS 2, 35 HURT

Easton, Pa., Oct. 24 (AP).—A terrific explosion followed by a 6-hour fire destroyed a large portion of the Easton gas works today, killing at least 2 persons, injuring more than 35 others and cutting off gas service to the Easton-Phillipsburg, N.J. war industries area.

CONVOY BATTLING U-BOATS

Lisbon, Oct. 24 (UP)—Allied convoys have been battling German U-boat packs for the past 2 days in the South Atlantic off Cape D'Aroca, on the western coast of Portugal, outside Portuguese territorial waters, maritime sources reported tonight.

U.S. SUB DORADO LOST

Washington, Oct. 24 (AP)—Loss of the U. S. sub "Dorado" launched only last May was reported Sunday. Next of kin have been advised.

88 LOST WHEN TANKERS COLLIDE

Eighty-eight lost their lives off the coast of Florida Wednesday when two tankers collided. One grounded over a freighter sunk by sub action early in the war.

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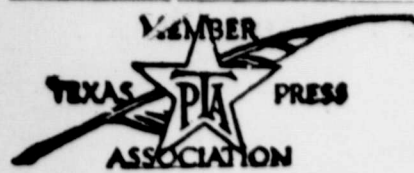
