In a recent letter from Virgil Freeman, who is stationed somewhere in Australia in the Infantry, to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Freeman of near Pearl, shows he has been promoted to Staff-Sergeant.

Robert L. Gilmore, 22, son of Mr. J. D. Gilmore of Gatesville won his Navy "Wings of Gold" and was commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Reserve this week following his completion of the prescribed flight training course at the Naval Air Training Center, Pensacola, Fla., the "Annapolis of the Air". FROM North Camp Hood

Col. Donald R. Dunkle, executive officer of North Camp Hood, Texas, said today that the Honorable Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of War, has directed that service awards be conferred upon eligible civilian employees of the War Department throughout the United States in acknowledgement of faithful and meritorious performance of duty. In the official directive, Sec. Stimson states that civilian employees of the War Department are contributing significantly to the successful prosecution of the war.

Col. Dunkle stated that the records of more than 800 civilian employees of the War Department now on duty at North Camp are being studied to determine their qualifications for the awards. Tentative plans are now being made to present the first of these awards to civilian workers with appropriate ceremonies early in December.

The decorations are being established, according to Secretary Stimson's order, "furtherance of the Department's policy to encourage the continuance of the highest individual effort and to recognize those civilians who have served faithfully, meritoriously and exceptionally." Arrangement for the bestowal are under the direction of the Secretary of War's Council on Personnel. The awards are authorized under an act of the 78th Congress granting non-monetary rewards in recognition of such services.

The Secretary's directive provides that three different classes of awards shall be presented to eligible civilian employees of the following agencies within the War Department: Office of the Secretary of War; Office of the Chief of Staff; Army Air Forces; Army Ground Forces, and Army Service Forces, into which latter category the majority of North Camp's civilian employees fall.

"The decorations will be in the form of lapel ribbons, suitable for wear on the coat or dress, and will bear the emblem in colors of the unit issuing the citation," the Colonel said. "The ribbon is woven in blue and silver colors. Additional strands of braid at each end of the ribbon will be used to denote the two higher (Continued from page 2)

Vanoy Powell And 2 NCH Officers Die In Wreck

Vanoy Powell, 50, of Gatesville, Major Gideon H. Bigham of 3601 E. Lancaster, Ft. Worth, and 1st Lt. Leo David Wardlow of Fillmore, Mo., were killed in an automobile accident 8 miles east of Gatesville on U. S. 84, Friday evening at 6:30. Three other civilians, Jeff Harvison, Jonesboro, Mrs. A. H. Way and Mrs. Tom Rogers of Gatesville were injured. Another officer, Capt. Wm. L. Zivell, 5712 Saida Ave., Kansas City, Mo., is in a serious condition at the Army hospital.

Major Bigham, Capt. Zivell and Lt. Wardlow were going east on the highway enroute to Waco, it is reported, and the other car was returning to Gatesville. They met practically head-on, and both cars were badly damaged. One, a Buick the officers', and the civilians was a Ford.

Harvison is still in North Camp Hood hospital in a serious condition, with chest injuries and other complications. Mrs. Rogers and Mrs. Way according to State Highway Patrolman reports, were not seriously injured, receiving only cuts, lacerations and bruises. Mrs. Way has a possible fractured ankle. Capt. Zivell has a brain injury and is in a serious condition at the Army Hospital.

The cars hit nearly head-on, the Buick being damaged on the right side, Patrolman said, and the other car had its front end stove in, and was badly damaged.

The officers were all from the 659th TD B'n., and Major Bigham was executive officer. He had been Major only about two weeks.

The three classes of awards and the basis on which each is to be conferred are:

1. Emblem for Civilian Service, the basic pattern for all three decorations, to be conferred on all employees of the Department having a record of six consecutive months of satisfactory service, or who are granted one of the higher awards prior to completion of six months service.

2. Emblem for Meritorious Civilian Service will be granted automatically to all employees of the War Department who have completed ten years of faithful and satisfactory service within the department, provision having been made to the effect that time absent from civilian duty occasioned

ALLIES DRIVE CENTRAL NAZI STRONGHOLD

Algiers, Oct. 31 (AP).—The Allied Fifth and 8th armies edged forward along the whole ninety-mile length of the Italian front gaining from yards to a few miles, and spearhead to within 11 miles of Venafro and Isernia, central buttresses of the Nazi mountain line, it was announced Sunday.

NAZIS IN DEATH TRAP

London, Oct. 31 (AP).—The Red army hurled the Germans into a death trap at the northeastern entry into the Crimea Sunday, got within striking distance of the Germans' last land escape route at Perekop on the other side of the peninsula, and freed 200 more villages in a sweep which has virtually reconquered the Nogaik Steppes.

by military service will not constitute a break in consecutive service, but will be credited towards the required ten years service.

Other eligible include employees who have been responsible for suggesting or developing new methods or procedures; achieved outstanding records of satisfactory and faithful service and devotion to duty; shown initiative in developing the skills of employees, or those who have made important contributions to morale-building activities.

The award of the Emblem for Meritorious Civilian Service while it does not automatically provide for a meritorious in-grade promotion will be given added weight by the reviewing committee if the recipient is recommended for such promotion.

3. Emblems for Exceptional Civilian Service will be conferred by the Secretary of War himself or his personal representative and will be accompanied by a letter of commendation or certificate with a specific citation signed by the Secretary. This award will in itself be considered justification for a meritorious in-grade promotion, and will be in recognition of exceptionally meritorious service either within or beyond the call of duty.

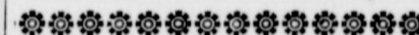

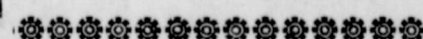

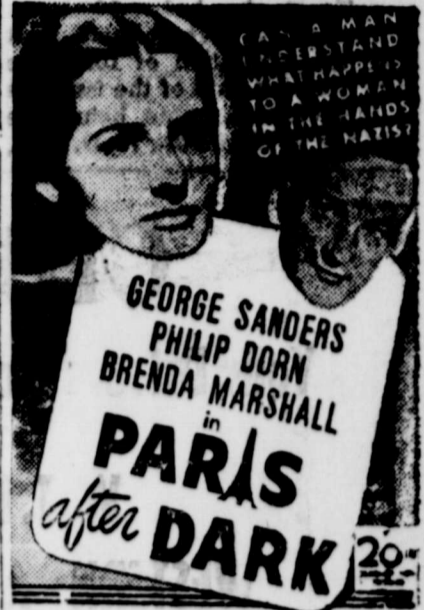
