He was a Radio Operator on a Bomber patrolling the Northern waters, being killed in a crash in Newfoundland, shortly after Pearl Harbor.

LT. WM. G. WALLEY HAS 'EM SALUTIN' 'THE EYES-' & TEXAS FLAG

How Texas was "established" as an "ally of the U.S.A.", at Camp Lee, Va., was told in a recent letter from Lt. Wm. Gall Walley, son of W. G. Walley of Gatesville and Jonesboro.

"Shortly after being assigned here with the Texas Lone Star flag flying above my platoon down in K Company, I had the drum and bugle corps learn to play "The Eyes of Texas".

"Shortly after guard mount, when I was officer of the guard and the band was outside its hall, it struck up the grand old tune. Capt. Joe Nash, formerly of Waco, a Baylor University student marching his company by, hailed them, faced the music and had them present arms. The sentinels on adjacent posts, seeing the example of the officer of the day and the commander of a company, halted and presented arms.

"The whole thing was cleared up for the colonel, when I told him it was the theme song and national anthem of the most valuable ally of the United States".

NAZIS PUSH REDS BACK

London, Nov. 17 (AP)—The Russians announced on Tuesday night that the Germans had forced them to abandon a few populated places in the Zhitomir-Korostyshev region of the northern Ukraine, indicating the Germans had launched a new counter-offensive against the underside of the Red army's salient in the west.

JAPS BLASTED IN GILBERTS

Pearl Harbor, Nov. 17 (UP)—Heavy Liberator bombers of the United States Seventh Army Air Force struck at the Marshall and Gilbert Islands for the third time in less than 48 hours Monday, wrecking enemy ships and installations, a United States Pacific fleet communique announced.

BRITISH LOSE LEROS

Cairo, Nov. 17 (AP)—The tiny but strategic island of Leros has been captured by the Germans in five days of heavy fighting despite a most determined resistance put up by its British and Italian defenders, the British Middle East

Command announced Wednesday.

BOMBERS STRIKE AT FRENCH AIR PORTS

Algiers, Nov. 17 (AP)—Attacking on a front of more than 100 miles, bombers of the N.W. African Air Force struck their heaviest blow of recent weeks at the Nazi air force Tuesday when they smashed enemy airdromes near Marseille in southern France and in the Athens area in Greece.

BREOD SUBSIDY HITS SNAG

Washington, Nov. 17 (AP)—The broadest food price subsidy program yet, a \$9,000,000-a-month plan to hold down the cost of bread, ran headon into specific opposition on Capitol Hill Wednesday, while the storm of congressional and farm protest against food subsidies in general rose to new fury.

Washington, Nov. 17 (AP)—Chairman Walter F. George of the Senate finance committee torpedoed Wednesday any Treasury hopes for tax increases substan-

tially above the \$2,142,000,000 (billions they say) voted by the House ways and means committee.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 17 (AP)—Wage increases for 160,000 employees of the Ford Motor Company thruout the nation, with a consequent scrapping of the Little Steel formula, were asked by the UAW. There it goes!

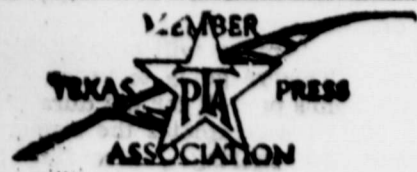
GUERRILLAS LAUNCH COUNTER-OFFENSIVE

FROM Camp Hood

The Soldier's Medal for heroism in removing live artillery shells from a burning tank destroyer was awarded to three Camp Hood soldiers by Major General John H. Hester, commanding general of the Tank Destroyer Center, during a parade Thursday afternoon. Those decorated were Sgt. Leslie C. Ingeman, Owingsville, Ky., Cpl. Kahn T. Whitley, Chesapeake, Ohio; and Pvt. Glenn W. Bailey, New Boston, Ohio.

These men on October 15, 1943 while enroute to the firing range in a destroyer, discovered fire in the engine compartment. They tried to extinguish the blaze, but when it became evident the fire was spreading they removed valuable property and 10 rounds of service ammunition. This action,

made without regard to personal safety, won for the crew the Soldier's Medal.

The trio are members of the 655th Tank Destroyer Battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. George R. Poole.

GOOD WORD ON EGGS

If you like eggs—fried, scrambled, or Easter—this may interest you.

The high price of eggs will soon come tumbling down. This Humpty-Dumpty event will be brought about by the sale of five million cases of government eggs.

War Food administration, responding to the prodding of critics, admits that it was putting too many eggs in one basket, for military and Lend-Lease requirements, at the expense of civilian requirements.

Release of this tremendous quantity of eggs won't alarm the housewife, but worries War Food experts because it might discourage production for next year.

Meantime, War Food and OPA are rowing over the price to be paid for these five million cans of cold storage eggs. WFA officials, protecting the producers, want a higher price for cold storage eggs than fresh eggs.

OPA, thinking of the housewife, says: "This is the first time we ever heard that eggs become more valuable as they get older!"

But War Food stands firm on the principle that the old eggs should bring more money. Their reason is that the old eggs were stored by dealers who were playing the usual seasonal game of holding for a rise in price, without realizing that the government was going to step in and take over at the fixed price.

In other words, War Food experts are trying to hand dealers some of the speculative profit they might have gotten, while OPA—trying to protect the consumer—wants to hold the price down.

The inside government egg debate is still raging.

COLD WINTER AHEAD

Whatever you burn this winter—oil or coal—it is still going to be cold.

The public has the impression that it is only coal which is short now. Actually, oil is even shorter, rations for this winter being based on a 34 per cent cut below pre-war consumption.

The fuel situation is so bad that OPA experts several months ago recommended coupon rationing of coal. A warm debate followed between OPA and the Solid Fuel Coordinator, in which Ickes, supported by the coal industry, opposed rationing.

But OPA experts believed coal would be short this winter and, during the summer, laid plans for coupon rationing. In August, they were all ready to go to press with millions of coupon books.

Finally, however, the coal coordinator vetoed the plan. Now it is too late to impose coupon rationing—partly because there is not sufficient time to print the coupons and give out instructions to local boards; also because some coal is already supposed to be distributed—inequitably—to consumers.

Thus we shall have to rely on "dealer rationing." This does not limit consumption—only strings out the supply in dribbles, making a greater delivery task without decreasing consumption.

The public believes that oil is bountiful compared with coal, and OPA is now besieged with applications for reconversion from coal to oil. These applications are being resisted, since the impression of abundance of oil is merely an illusion.

FEWER TIRES FOR ALLIES

One thing not discussed at the Moscow conference was rubber tires. If the question had been raised, Russia would have been told that tires on Lend-Lease will have to be reduced sharply.

Reason is that U. S. trucks and buses are wearing their tires down to the fabric, and Jesse Jones' long ballyhooed synthetic tires are falling behind schedule. There is plenty of new rubber, but a dire lag in tire production.

Meanwhile, bus and truck transportation has never been more vital. Last year inter-city buses carried more passengers than the railroads (680 million compared with 669 million), though they travelled fewer miles.

Electric Range Economy Tips

- When you're roasting meat in the oven, bake potatoes, a pudding and a casserole dish of vegetables, too. Saves using top units.
- If you have sectional pans, cook two or more vegetables on one unit at same time.
- Switch the top units to low heat promptly when food comes to steam.
- Cook more one-dish meals, such as hash, Irish stew, etc.
- Use only enough water to prevent food from scorching. Some vegetables, like greens, need no water.
- Don't toast one or two slices of bread in oven. Broiler is economical only for toasting in quantity.
- Use well cooker for long, slow cooking operations, such as cooking dried beans. Plan more cooker meals.
- Use covered, flat-bottomed utensils that fit unit. Pans that are warped or too small waste electricity.
- Switch off surface units when food is nearly done and finish cooking on stored heat.
- Avoid excessive oven peeking.

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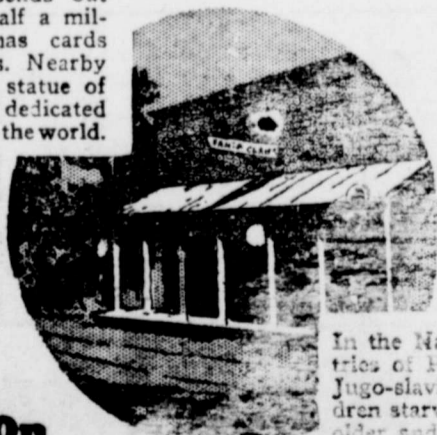
