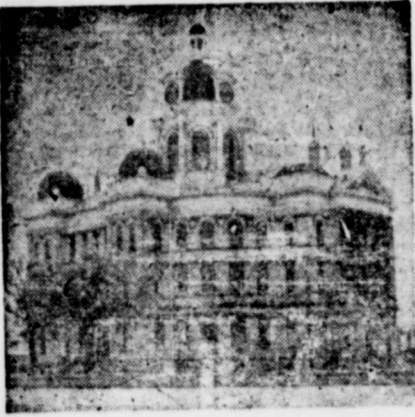

RESTRICTIONS ON FARM SLAUGHTER OF HOGS SUSPENDED

You can kill your own hogs, now, if you do it in 90 days, according to E. L. Upshaw, State Marketing Supervisor of the Food Distribution Administration.

Producers will not be required to have a license or permit during this period and they may kill for their own use or for sale or transfer to others, all hogs they are able to handle.

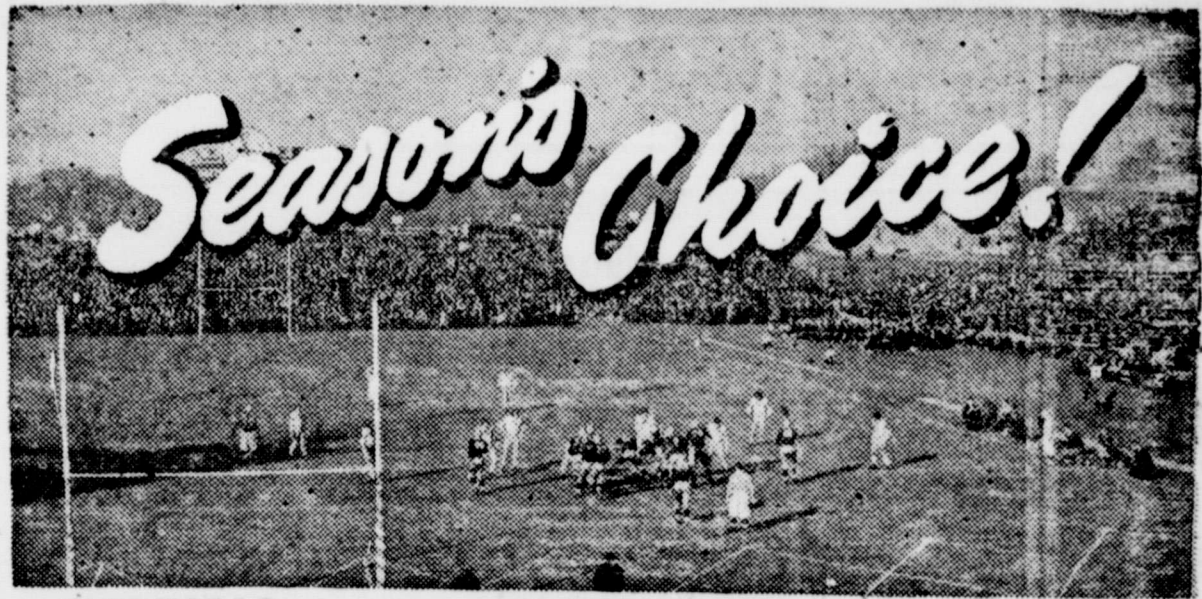

HORNET-BULLDOG CLASH IS HIGHLIGHT FOR TURKEY DAY, 1943



All season, Gatesville High School Hornets have been playing top football, with only a few instances where there were "rest" periods, a throw back from old WPA days. Thursday, there will be NO rest-periods. Its the game of games in "Deep Central", The Gatesville-McGregor Game. It's hoary with history, and hallowed and holy to the fan from either town. Practically always, it's been in the spirit of good, clean sportsmanship, and not the "Jap tactics" which we know more about now.

The game needs no build-up. Boys in India, Iceland, England, North Africa, the Solomons, Guadalcanal, Australia, and the Lord only knows where else are eagerly waiting some word of "how'd the McGregor Game come out." It's an international battle. The McGregor boys in the service also will want to know "How'd the Gatesville Game come out?"

It IS important, and we need not tell you to be at Woods Field, McGregor, Texas. Come Thanksgiving Day. You'll be there. It'll look like a long convoy, when

Gatesville people start leaving for heavy as the Hornets season, this historic battle.

Now as for the boys. They've been "laying off" some since the last game with another bunch of bulldogs here, the Hamiltonians, but you can depend, Coach Madison Pruitt will have them "tapered off" like a race horse, and they'll be in there until the final whistle.

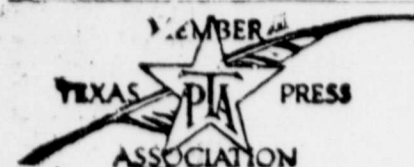

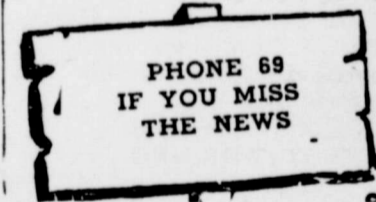

The young people of this community had a singing at the Cold Spring School House Sunday night November 14th. Mrs. Jessie Altum was in charge.

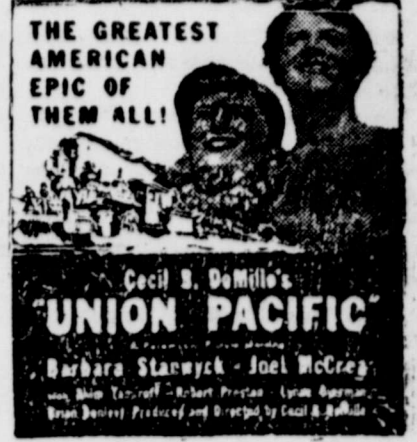
