LONDON, March 22 (AP) .- The Russians redoubled the fury of their onslaught against Stettin, 'Key to Northern Germany", and in Hungary, reinforced attempts on a 50 mile front to batter thru the Danube Gate into Austria, the Germans said today.

PARIS, March 22 (AP) .- The American Third and Seventh Armies stamped out all but a few bewildered pockets of Germans west of the Rhine today, and formed numerous junctions in the Saarland and Palatinate in a mighty conquest probably costing the Germans well over 100,000 men.


