**LONDON, April 5 (AP).—SOVIET RUSSIA TODAY DENOUNCED ITS NEUTRALITY PACT WITH JAPAN, ACCUSING TOKYO OF HELPING GERMANY TO WAR AGAINST RUSSIA.**

## TODAY'S EVENTS By Associated Press

### Ingolstadt And Grafenwohr Hit By 1800

LONDON, April 5, (AP)—More than 1,800 American warplanes attacked two German ordnance depots at Ingolstadt and Grafenwohr, rail targets at Nuernberg today.

The RAF hit Berlin for the 48th time in 44 nights with two ton bombs.

### Four Divisions Smash To Weser River

PARIS, April (AP).—Four American and British Divisions smashed to the Weser River and within 23 miles of Hanover today on a solid forty-mile front north of Minden to Hamelin.

Armored spearheads of the American Third is 55 miles from Plauen. Patton's tanks sheared toward Erfurt, eleven miles beyond captured Gotha, 130 miles from Berlin.

The British fought into the outskirts of Minden, and were 47 miles South of Bremen.

During the year, March 12, 1944, to March 11, 1945, you received 832 pages of news, advertising, pictures, Classifieds, publicity, baloney, gooney, etc. etc., and promotion for local events, state events, national events, your events, and our events.

Eight into 832, equals 104, which was the number of issues you received, and by press runs, that made 208 press runs, which means with our latest ABC audit of 2500 would make 52,000 impressions by the old Babcock flat-bed press, all of which means, Mrs. Jones ran the old crate (at about 1,000 an hr. for about 520 hours, which is some time.

And, as to the newsprint, this amount consumed 260,000 sheets of newsprint, which is 130 bundles of newsprint, as there are 2,000 sheets to the bundle, 4 reams.

Now as to columns of type, advs. pictures, etc. that would be 532,480 inches of type, if it was all the regular "reading" size type, which was set in the year.

Two balls of binder twine were used to tie out the "single wraps" and 720 U. S. Mail sacks were used to carry it to the post office. Brown wrapping paper, 2 reams 24 x 36 inches were used to wrap out the papers going to the county and statepost offices where there were several going.

Each single newspaper published was handled possibly a dozen times from the time the first impression was made on the edition until the post office took over or we hurled them out the window of the old "60" into your yard, bush, telephone post, or tree, and or, the North Wind.

During the year, something around 800 pictures of our boys who are in action in every area of the Globe were printed, and many of them many times. Only 800 out of the more than 3,000 (est). which we expect to get. These bought and paid for by the News at no cost to the boy or his relatives. They've gone up almost 95 per cent but we're still buyin'

them, and will continue to buy as many each month as finances will permit. If you don't bring us teh picture of your boy don't blame us Gosh, we could go on with these figgers for weeks and weeks, but, we've got something else to do, and we're certain you may have, too. It's just a rough idea.

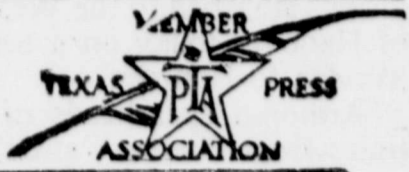

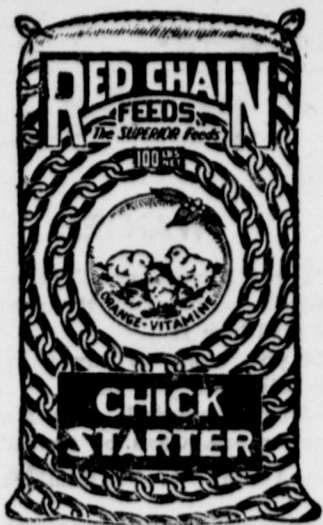

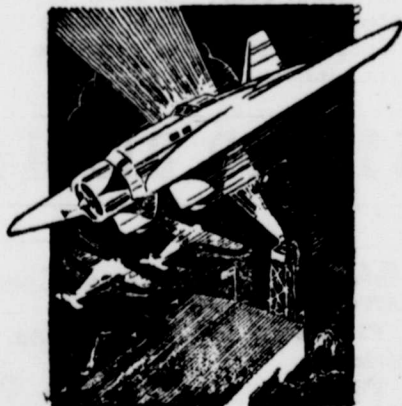

**GREATER DEMAND FOR MEAT CHICKENS**

The nation needs more meat chickens as quickly as possible. Red meat in 1945 will not be greater than 126 lbs. per person, as against 147 lbs. of last year. This is due to the military demands for meats of all kinds. The civilian supply of chickens for 1945 at the present is forecast at 20 lbs. per person as against 24 lbs. of last year. The over-all meat shortage picture can be improved if growers will raise more meat chickens. The government is asking that each chicken raiser grow at least one or two extra broods starting right away or greatly increase the size of the brood already in prospect.

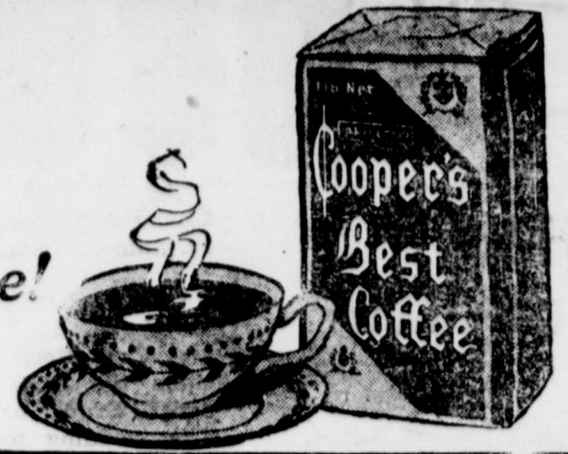

**NEWS of MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM**

Pfc. Ernest G. Barrington, Rt. 2 Gatesville is with the 6th Army Group in France with the 85th Engineer Battalion, supporting the U. S. 7th Army, and it provides the pilots, driving outboard-motor storm boats, which carry them across. They rig medium tanks and light artillery on pontoon, rafts and erect heavy pontoon bridges to bring heavy artillery and armor into battle. They spanned the Voltorno River in Italy, a 290 ft. structure, which carried a load of 2,400 to 2,800 vehicles daily. A smaller bridge over the Garigliano River was built in four hours under a smoke screen while German shells fell nearby.

Sgt. James S. Beverly of Gatesville, also with the Army Group, France is with the 343rd Engineer Regiment which is following the advance of the 6th Army main taining 600 miles of supply lines from the Riviera to the Rhine, and then some.

They've built 26 highway and 23 railroad bridges, all large semi-permanent structures. They opened the Marseilles to Lyons rail-

roads in 10 days. It's the oldest engineer unit in combat overseas. They build harbors, repair roads, clear out blown-up tunnels and operate rock quarries. They removed 10,000 mines north of the Girigliano River, and have had 32 months overseas service, and wear 7 campaign stars, including Oran, Tunisia, North Africa, Sicily and Italy.

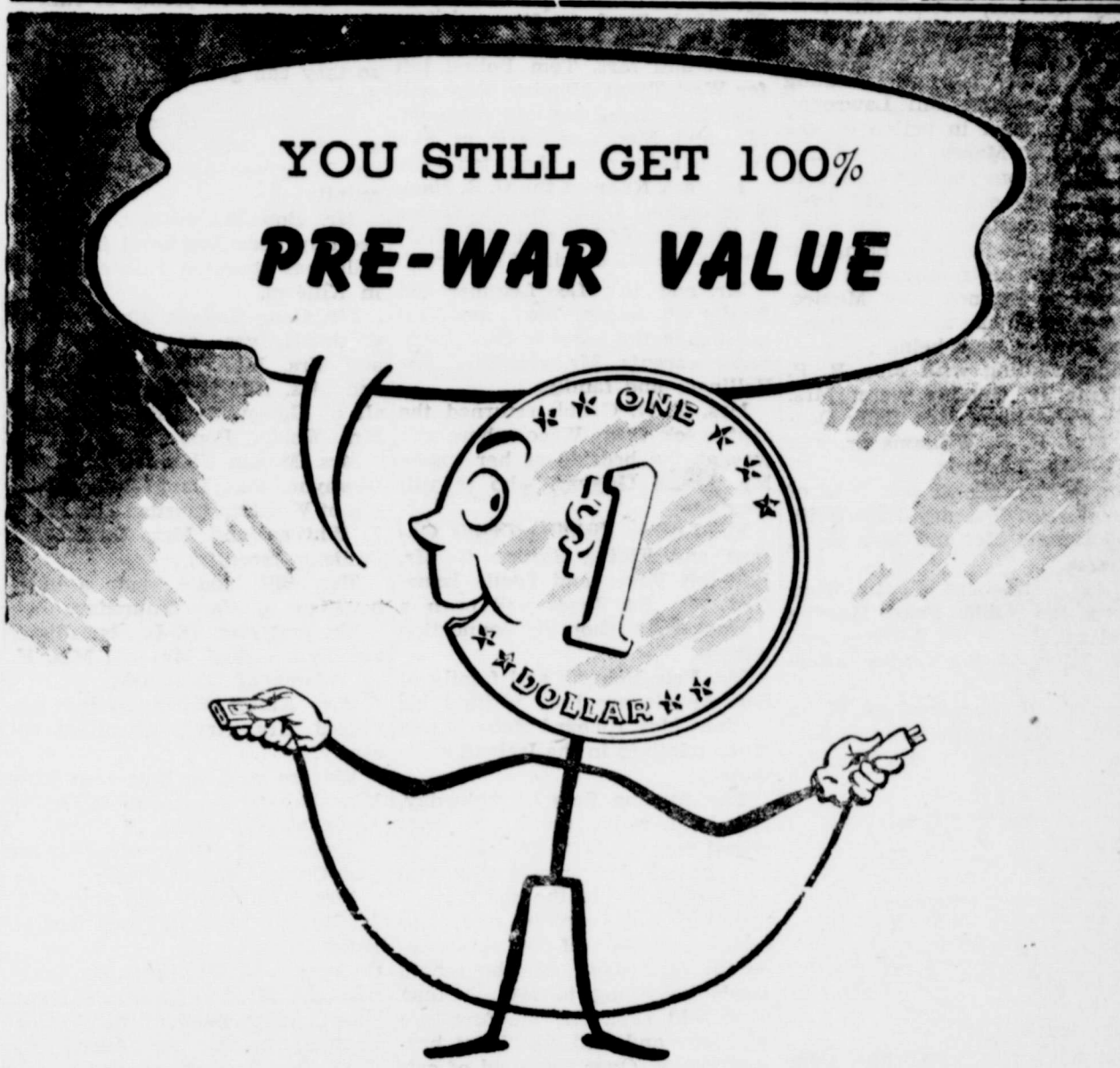
