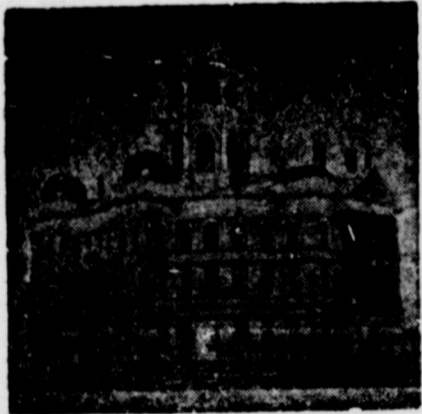

American Ninth Crosses Elbe River

PARIS, April 12 (AP)—The American Ninth crossed the Elbe River today, and began down the last 57 clear miles to Berlin.

The River crossing was forced by the Second Armored Division, blazing more than 50 miles to Magdengurg in twelve hours. The crossing site was not disclosed. The established bridgehead is 115 miles from the Russian lines

PETTENGILL "The Gentleman from Indiana" Inside our Congress

Henry Wallace says that "great oaks from little acorns grow" is now impossible in the field of business. Its growth is choked by taxes.

Let us see how the tax jungle nas grown from 1913 to 1943, a period of thirty years.

In 1913, a married man without children paid no normal tax what:ever if his net income was under \$4,000. On the excess the tax was only 1%. In 1943 he paid 6% on his earning over \$1200, and a Victory Tax of 5% on earning over \$624.

In 1913, the same man paid no surtax whatever if his income was under \$20,000. On the excess the rate began at 1% and was only 6% in the highest bracket. In 1943, he paid 13% on income over \$1200, and then up to 82%. (The rates now run from 20% to 91%)

In 1913 the normal tax on corporation was 1%. In 1943, it was 15% on the first \$5,000 of taxable income, running up to 24% on the excess over \$30,000

In 1913, there was no surtax or excess profits tax on corporations. They began in 1917 during World War I. Starting at 20% the rate runs up to 90% (now 95%).

Except for the war, would you gamble \$100 on the chance of winning \$5?

Henry Ford started to make automobiles with only \$27,000.

But as government did not tax his earnings away, he used them to build up his great enterprise.

You can't erect a factory with a tax receipt.

Few businesses are as large as Ford's, but most of them started as small, and grew by plowing earnings back into the business.

Could a young man, with nothing but an idea and elbow grease build up a great business today? He could not. Even Wallace agrees to that.

Your mind may run to Henry Kaiser, the ship-builder. But Kaiser is not a true example. His shipyards were built by the government loans under the stress of war

So where do we go in post-war America?

It is plain that if federal taxes stay up, free enterprise (and especially little business) is on its last legs, except for a few giants so well heeled they do not need to grow or attract new investment

But wiat the planners have a plan. They always do. Recognizing that taxes blight future growth in competitive post-war industry, they plan to loan "government" money to business—billions and billions of it. This is the Wallace solution. Don't reduce taxes. Loan more money. Go into debt some more.

But where does "government" get its money to loan to business? There are only three places it can get it. tax more, sell more bonds, or print it.

If by more taxes, this aggravates the disease. Bonds then. But will people buy still more bonds when the war is over? If they do they have just that much less to put into their own business, to build houses, to hire men, to make jobs. The last desperate gamble is to print the beautiful crisp paper—greenbacks—the watering down of every dollar the melting away of insurance and savings—the rocketing of prices inflation with a capital I.

We have already inflation, the OPA to the contrary. The black market is the true index to inflation.

There is an alternative, but a government which has lived on the cuff for twelve years will not take it That is drastic lowering of federal taxes an dspending, and stop going into debt. It means that hundreds of thousands of payroll:ers must urge a policy that will kill their present jobs

And so the slap-happy crowds through the streets Mardi Gras forever.
