CHINESE IN 28 MILES OF LUICNOW

CHUNGKING, June 4. (AP).—The Chinese drove last night to within 28 miles of strategic Luichow, the former American air base and Kwangsi Province rail junction, the high command announced tonight. It said the Chinese were pursuing the fleeing enemy toward Luichow, which the Japanese appear to be about to evacuate.

YANKS SPLASH FOR BIG ONE-DAY DRIVE

GUAM, June 4. (AP).—In their greatest one day advance in the Okinawa campaign, the Yanks splashed two miles yesterday to the Southeastern shore of the Island, and sealed off the Chinese Peninsula which forms the southern arm of the finest fleet anchorage in the southern approaches to Japan.

CHURCHILL EXPLAIN SYRIAN SITUATION

LONDON, June 4. (AP).—The London Daily Mail said today that Prime Minister Winston Churchill would make a statement in the House of Commons this week "defining in clearest terms" the attitude of the British government in the Syrian situation. Damascus dispatches indicated Levantian affairs are still in a critical state; British troops are constantly on the alert.

PAN-AM CLIPPER CRASHES, TRINIDAD

MIAMI, June 4. (AP).—The Rio De Janeiro-bound Pan American Clipper crashed at the Port of Spain, Trinidad, today; minor injuries were sustained by the passengers and crew.

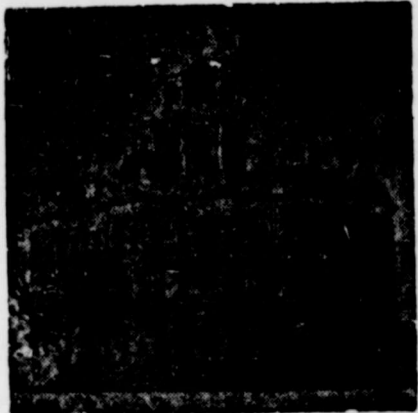

"85, OR BETTER"

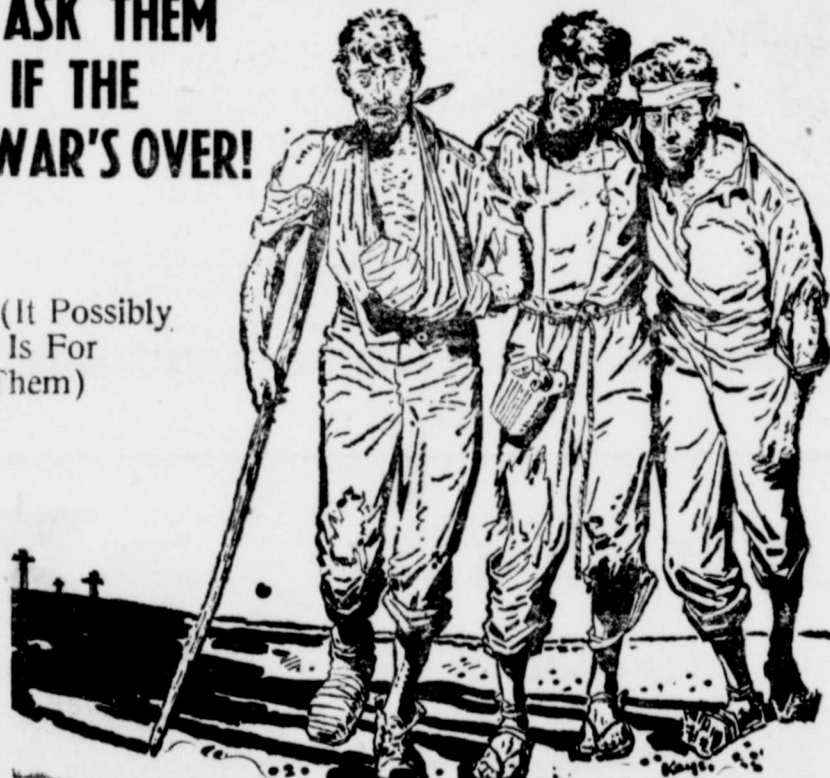

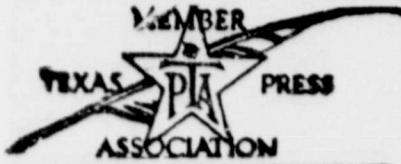

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas

as providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Forces Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any

election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations: and intaking an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"Section 2a. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state, during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"Provided, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; and provided further, that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by reason of any provision of sub-section "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:—

"For the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

Those opposed to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:—

"AGAINST the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States

Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 4. There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not other-

wise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertising said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

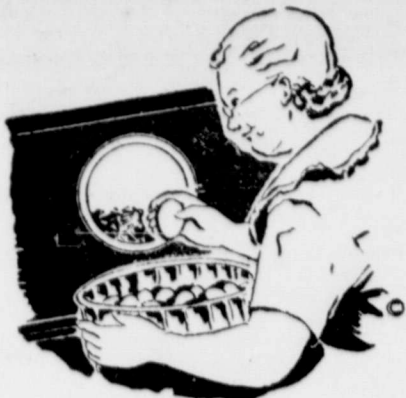

The danger in the San Francisco Conference is that the world expects too much from it. A recent poll shows that a majority of even the American people (who read more newspapers and hear more radios than perhaps the whole of Europe) do not know that the meeting is not a peace conference. It is not to settle the differences that caused the present war. It is to create the machinery, if possible, to maintain peace after the peace terms are hereafter agreed upon.

It is to guarantee contracts not yet made.

It is a disservice to the cause of world peace to oversell San Francisco. The difficulties are enormous. Many nations are unwilling to guarantee contracts they have not yet seen. Moreover, the guarantee can be no better than the contracts. If the contracts are fraudulent and unjust, the guarantee will not be honored, and should not.

For this reason, Senator Vandenberg is clearly right when he insists that the San Francisco guarantee must provide for reconsideration from time to time of the future peace treaties to eliminate whatever injustice time and experience may show they contain.

Until Mr. Roosevelt's death it was plain that under Russian concepts of naked force, our policy was moving toward a three-power world imperialism. Mr. Truman is trying to check this evil course. He said to the Conference, "The responsibility of the great states is to serve and not dominate the people of the world." These were indeed "apples of gold

National Income

How well a man lives is a matter that depends largely upon his income and how he divides it. If he earns \$40 a week (\$2,000 a year) and spends every bit of it on himself, he can live about as well as anybody until some unforeseen calamity hits him. If he has a wife and child and an aged parent to support, each individual must subsist on about \$10 a week.

How well the people of any nation live is a similar matter. It depends upon the national income and how it is divided. Just like family income, national income changes from year to year and it is not always divided the same way. National income is the grand total of what everybody in the nation earns. It includes all wages, salaries, farm yields, interest, rents, profits and dividends.

How About Now?

The United States Department of Commerce keeps track of our national income figures pretty well, year by year. Already we know that the income of all Americans totaled 160.8 billion dollars in 1944 and that workers got 72% of it, or 116 billion dollars. By "workers," I mean people who draw wages and small clerical salaries. Corporation profits that year ran just under ten billion dollars or 6%.

There is a popular notion that people who work don't get very much of the fruits of their toil. Not long ago somebody repeated a 40-year-old piece of political propaganda to me, believing it every word. He said, "Here in America 2% of the people have 90% of the wealth." There is not much to say about this statement: It is not true. It has never been nearly true.

Official Figures

Last year the national-income dollar went like this: 72c to American workers, 6c to corporations, 8c to small businesses in the form of profit, 7c to farmers as return on what they produced, and another 7c to landowners and stockholders in the form of rents and dividends, and to money lenders in the form of interest. Of course all years aren't alike but they vary less than you might think.

National income bobs up and down but people who work always get most of it. Back in 1939, which was a typical pre-war year, our national income was not half as high as last year's; 70.8 billion dollars to be exact. Then, workers got 68% of it, and 6% was corporation profit; not much change in how the income was divided, but less than half as much actual money for everybody.

Ancient History

Back in 1929, the year Hoover succeeded Coolidge as President, national income was 83.3 billion dollars; bigger then, than in 1939. Corporation profits were higher—9% as against 6% in recent years. But wage earners and office help were getting 64% of national income, even then. In 1932 (the depression) when corporations generally earned 9% less than nothing, wages climbed to 97% and still some working people went hungry.

Any fair analysis of national income figures over a period of years leads to this observation: workers, laborers and clerical people, get more money with the slightly smaller percentage of a big national income than with the bigger percentage of a small national income. The moral is perfectly clear. We will all fare better working together for a big national income than by wrangling about who gets most of it, and then having a small one.

He is with the crack 126th Infantry Regiment, which is entering its fourth year of combat against the enemy.

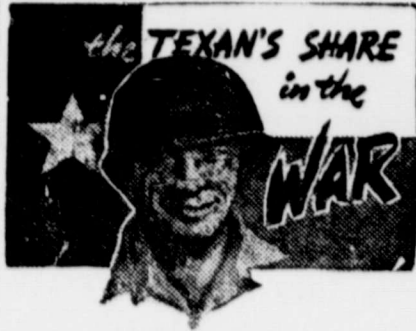

This column usually tells the stories of many Texans each week. Today, however, it will be devoted to just one man... a lanky, homespun hero from Farmersville whose courage has won him every existing American medal for valor.

He is 1st Lt. Audie L. Murphy, who won last decoration... the Congressional Medal of Honor... by beating off 250 attacking Nazi infantrymen and six tanks, almost single-handedly, during the battle of the Colmar pocket.

Murphy, a boyish-looking 20-year-old, is one of only two Americans who holds every battle hon-

or given by his country. Only five feet three inches tall, the Texas fighting lad who is described by his sister, Mrs. Corrine Burns, as a boy who "always got things done."

"I guess it's because he's so small that he gets around so fast," Mrs. Burns said this week. "He just weighs 135 pounds."

Audie, born on a farm in Hunt county, enlisted in the Army at Greenville, where he attended high school. He went overseas 30 months ago and served in heavy fighting in Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany.

The action that brought the young Texan the nation's highest honor began in a foxhole where Murphy was directing artillery fire.

A tank destroyer 10 yards to his rear was hit and abandoned. Murphy clambered onto the machine while it was still burning, took hold of the 50 caliber machine guns, and started spraying German tanks and infantry.

Enemy fire began to center on the Texan silhouetted against the skyline. But Murphy continued to swing his guns until the enemy infantry began to withdraw. The German tanks then started lumbering back.

Murphy was wounded, but refused medical aid, organized his company and pursued the retreating Nazis.

When addressed to points where micro-film equipment is operated, a miniature photographic negative of the message will be made and sent by the most expeditious transportation available for reproduction and delivery. The original message will be destroyed after the reproduction has been delivered. Messages addressed to or from points where micro-film equipment is not operated will be transmitted in their original form by the most expeditious means available.

INSTRUCTIONS

- (1) Write the entire message plainly on the other side within the marginal lines.
- (2) PRINT the name and address in the two panels provided. Addresses to members of the Armed Forces should include rank or rating of the addressee, unit to which attached, and APO or Naval address.
- (3) Fold, seal, and deposit in any post office letter drop or street letter box.
- (4) Enclosures must not be placed in this envelope and a separate V-Mail letter must be sent if you desire to write more than one sheet.
- (5) V-Mail letters may be sent free of postage by members of the Armed Forces. When sent by others postage must be prepaid at domestic rates (3c ordinary mail, 6c if air mail is desired).
