

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP).-A Senate committee received State Department evidence today that Argentina has failed in the elimination of the Sing case of suspected German economic penetration.

Assistant Secretary of State William Clayton submitted documents which stated the campaign to stamp out Axis spearheads in Latin America revealed 104 such spearheads "in which no action or non-elimination action had been taken to-date," in Argentina.
