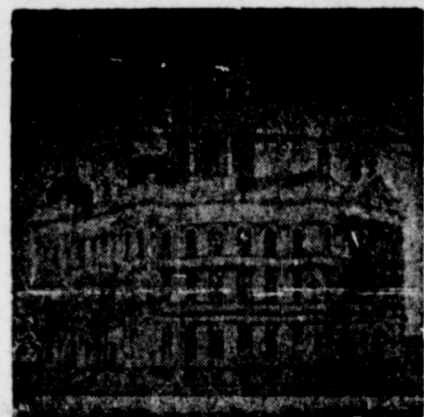

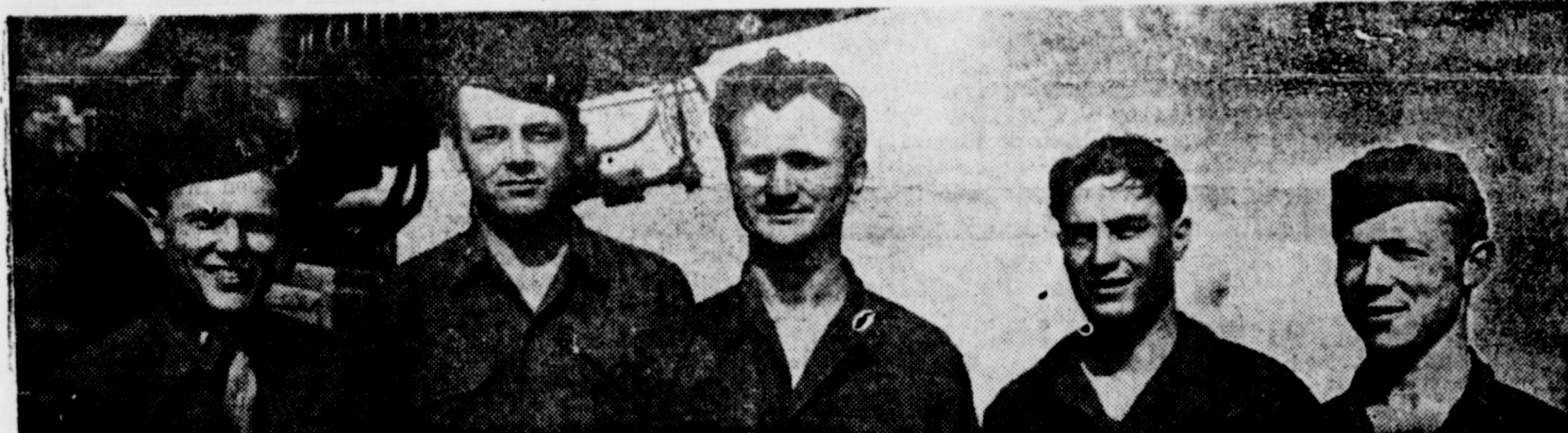

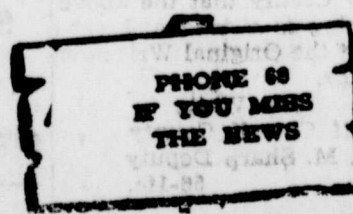

GUAM, Marianas, June 30, (AP).—American Superforts pounded the big Kudumatsu oil refining plant near Tokuyama on the Jap home island of Honshu Friday night in the fourth attack on Nippon within a week.

Here's a part of a letter received by Miss Minnie Fae Williams from Pfc. Pinilda C. Williams of the 36th Division. He is also the grandson of Mrs. M. A. Curry of Gatesville.

"I've seen the snow-capped mountains in Switzerland, and a surprising thing is the real nice homes they have, and the fact that they dress well.

"Well, all of Germany that I have seen, the people dressed pretty good, and especially shoes. They have plenty of excellent leather shoes. The French wear lots of wooden soled shoes.

"On the trip back up in Austria, saw many more German soldiers along the roads than Americans. An in that town that we went to, American and German soldiers were rubbing shoulders in the crowd. Saw dozens of German officers wearing the swastika.

"Also saw Goering's private car. It was a Mercedes, and really a big and massive car. There used to be a few of this make of this car in the states. Of course it was armored enough to turn rifle fire. The glass and windshield was about two inches thick—bullet proof. Our division captured him."

GETS BRONZE STAR MEDAL

With the 76th Inf. Div., Germany.—Cpl. Werner L. Schrank, Bat. A., 778th AAA Bn., has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service during the German campaign by Maj. Gen. Wm. R. Schmidt, Commander.

The citation read: "While at Bastogne, Belgium, Cpl. Schrank performed his duties as Squad leader in an outstanding and inspirational manner. Maintenance of material and equipment of his squad consistently reflected the high standard of efficiency he demanded and in spite of difficult weather conditions, inspecting officers invariably found the condition of equipment and material above reproach. From 3 March to 7 April 1945, Cpl. Schrank further distinguished himself by a display of exceptional initiative in the performance of his assigned mission of Military Government Security Guard. On numerous occasions he utilized his ability to speak fluent German to effect the capture of a number of enemy soldiers. He was always cheerful and cooperative in the performance of his many and varied tasks. His notable character and determined aggressiveness were an inspiration to his comrades and in keeping with the highest traditions of the armed forces of the United States."

Cpl. Schrank is the husband of Mrs. Eula Ernestine Schrank, Rt. 1, Levita. He entered service from Abilene, Texas.

GETS BRONZE STAR MEDAL

Sgt. James B. Wilson, 124th Cavalry, has been awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in action, in China.

Sgt. Wilson, with another sergeant exposed themselves to Jap fire after another man had been shot thru the body, and Wilson braved enemy fire to cut down two trees to make a litter, and taking off their shorts they took the injured man to safety. The citation reads:

"To Sgt. James B. Wilson for heroism in action near Loi-Kang, Burma, on Feb. 2, '45, the Bronze Star is awarded. Under intense enemy small arms, mortar and artillery fire, Sgt. Wilson, seeing his commanding officer fall wounded, crawled forward to aid and recover him, but finding him dead, he continued and brought back his first sergeant, who had been seriously wounded. The courage and bravery of Sgt. Wilson reflects great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States."
