### MCCLOSKEY TO MARK MEDICAL CORPS ORGANIZATION

Celebrating the 170th anniversary of the founding of the Army Medical Department, the public is invited to attend an open house Friday, July 27, at the McCloskey Waco Annex, according to Major Milton A. Honigman commanding officer.

Officers and enlisted men assigned to the Annex and the patients themselves will be host to the people of Waco and surrounding communities between the hours of 10 and 11 in the morning and from 2 to 5 in the afternoon of the 27th.

Visitors will be shown through the entire units which carries on a retraining and reconditioning program. Convalescent hospital patients are reconditioned into physically fit men able to return to military duty or civilian life.

Located on a 32-acre site southeast of Waco, the 12 modernistic buildings were turned over to the Army nearly two years ago by the National Youth Administration.

Although physical fitness is strongly stressed, the education of the men is not neglected and the most impressive buildings are the ones housing the carpenter, radio, machine and ordnance shops.

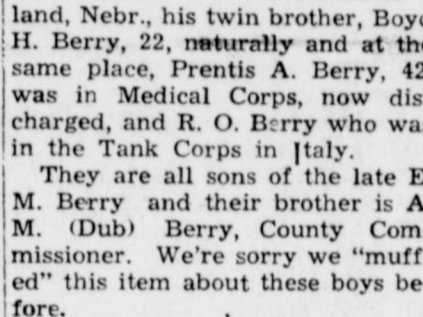

### "DIFFERENCES ARE NATURAL: AGREE MENTS RARE: MISS FOX

Lions, 72 of them, and about a dozen visitors Wednesday noon were delighted to hear Miss Mary Elizabeth Fox, who was a San Francisco World Security Conference representative of some Texas newspapers, give her impressions and sidelights of the conference. She is a professor of government and journalism at Southwestern University, Georgetown.

The gist of Miss Fox's observations were summed up in these words: "Differences are natural; agreements, rare."

She gave more of the sidelights, like getting herself in a Fox box, "seeing George" which meant in San Francisco language, give me a steak," and many other incidents, including meeting many, many famous personages, of the press, radio, conference, etc.

After the talk, she stated, Senator Tom Connally's release to newspapers and wire services was taken by a reporter as fact, when it was only a prediction.

She also described the building's interior where the conferences were held, but "laid off" the stuff which was released by the wire services because she knew these had been thoroly read by the public.

Miss Fox, is a sister of H. B. Fox, formerly publisher of The Madisonville Meteor, who has made a name for himself in an editorial capacity while editor of the paper.

### CHURCHILL UNEMPLOYED: BRITISH DID IT!

LONDON, July 26, (AP).—Britain threw out Prime Minister Winston Churchill and the government he represents according to election returns counted today. The British called the Labor Party and its leader Clement Atlee.

Labor, at mid-afternoon had 361 of 640 Commons seats. Churchill, and Eden were returned to their seats, but dozens of their colleagues were defeated.

Atlee presumably will return to the Big Three deliberations which were interrupted for the election returns. The election was held July 5.

### AR 2/c CLYDE R. BOYD KILLED IN KAMIKAZE ATTACK ON ST. LOUIS

In The Dallas Morning News, 25th, pictures of the Kamikazed USS St. Louis a US Crusier were shown. The ship had just been hit by a Jap suicide pilot.

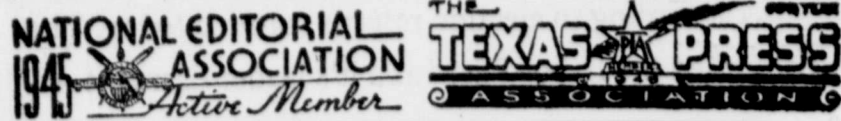

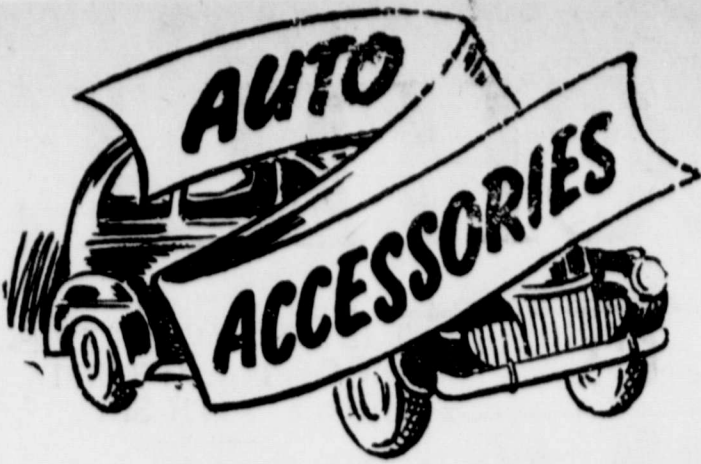

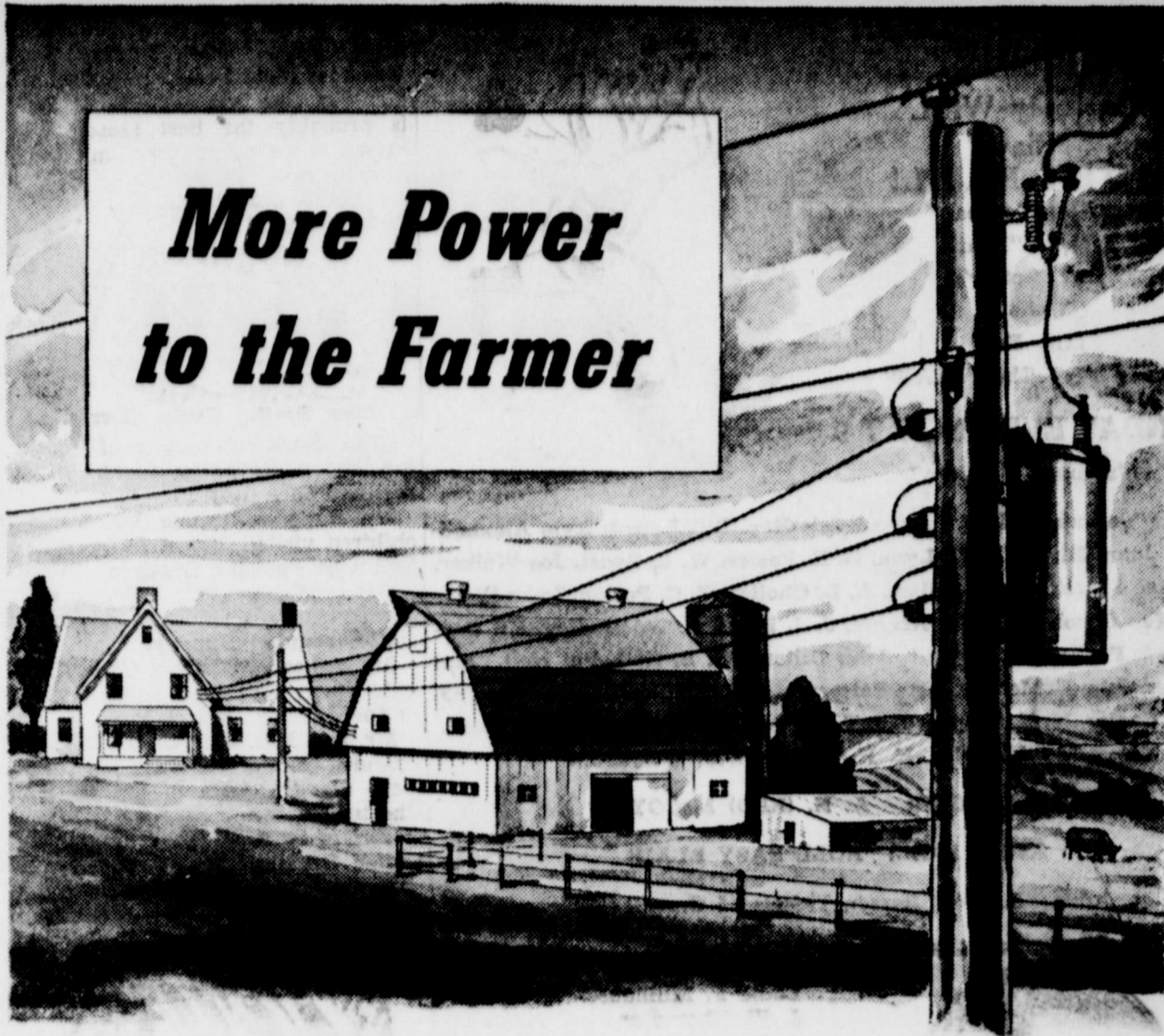
