

Labor, at mid-afternoon had 361 of 640 Commons seats. Churchill, and Eden were returned to their seats, but dozens of their colleagues were defeated.

Atlee presumably will return to the Big Three de-Libera ions which were interrupted for the election returns. The election was held July 5.
