Miramar, Calif.—How he miraculously escaped injury when blown thru the fuselage of a transport plane was related by Marine Pfc. Calvin E. Smith, 18 of Ft. Worth, who has returned to the Marine Air Depot here for furlough and reassignment.

Smith, a flying mechanic on a big Curtiss Commando, was readying his plane to take off from an Okinawa airstrip when four Jap bombers landed nearby and unloaded troops who carried demolition charges.

"One Jap set off a demolition charge under my plane," Smith related, "and I found myself lying on the ground several feet away. Somehow I was blown right thru the plane and didn't receive a scratch."

Smith's mother, Mrs. Alice K. Smith, lives in Ft. Worth. He attended Gatesville high school two years before enlisting.

With the 7th Inf. Div. Okinawa,—Pfc. Dawson B. Preston, 32 of Gatesville will never forget the first load of 10-in-1 rations he hauled on Okinawa.

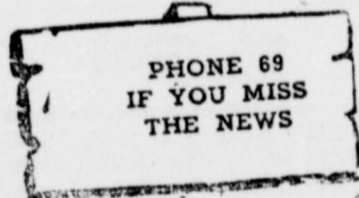
A truck driver with the 184th Infantry's 3rd Battalion, Preston had pulled his truck into the ration dump and had started loading on a supply for his outfit when Jap artillery opened up on the dump.

The first shell landed only a few yards beyond Preston, but behind a pile of rations. Other shells which followed in rapid succession came closer, but none wounded the Texan.

A counter battery from Yank guns silenced the gun, and Preston got his rations to the outfit without further incident.

He is a son of Mr and Mrs. Henry E. Preston of Gatesville and entered the army Feb. '42. As a member of the 7th Division, he has taken part in the battles for Attu, Kwajalein, Leyte and the more recent campaign for Okinawa.

Miami, Fla.—S/Sgt. Aubrey E. Lawrence, 26, Infantry, 19 months overseas service completed in Italy, three battles stars has just arrived in Miami Fla., after taking off in an Air Transport Plane in Casablanca, North Africa. The trip was 7,300 miles. He was sent to Camp Blanding, Fla., first and then to Ft. Sam Houston, after which he will be discharged or furloughed.



FIVE MEN NAMED ON COMMITTEE TO NAME COMMITTEE

On the committee are Robert W. Brown, Chairman, Evant T. Brooks, Evant, Hurl McClellan E. L. Cummings, and P. M. Browning. Chairman Floyd Zeigler named these men.

Frank C. Higginbotham manager of the local Chamber of Commerce outlined what could, or might be expected to happen to the county and town after the war, and also outlined some possible steps, if the community wanted to undertake them, that would possibly better the situation here in the post-war Coryell county.

Jack Roach, speaking of "money matters" in relation to this and future meetings "laid it on the line," and aided and abetted by Bill Ament, told us they were on the committee to get the money, and when they came around for it, don't take pot-shots at them, but, just dig, B-other, dig! It was one of the highlights of the evening.

A number of others, including the Chairman of the new committee Robert W. Brown, made interesting and timely comments.

The crowd, to us was larger than we expected, and the seriousness of the situation, should have filled the courthouse, both with "labor, capital, and management." They're ALL going to be vitally affected.

There is plenty of room for the present committee, and any others to work, not talk. Windjamming won't get the job done! It'll take action and dough!

North Camp Hood



NEWS

Camp Hood's bakery is now rated the highest of any bakery in the Eighth Service Command, it was announced Monday by Col. B. F. Delamater, Jr., Camp Commander.

"This grading score is decided at the school for cooks and bakers at Fort Sam Houston, Texas," stated Lt. Col. Ralph C. Bauer, Camp Quartermaster. "We send one loaf of our bread every month to Fort Sam Houston to stand competition against loaves from every army installation in the Command," he stated.

Camp Hood's bakery has rated higher than that of any of the other installations for several consecutive months.

"The method of grading is quite interesting," said Colonel Bauer. "The color of the crust is given a score of eight points; the volume is graded at ten; the evenness in bake is three; the break and shred is graded at three points; the aroma is graded at 15 and the taste is 20. In all of these points our bread scored 100%. Symmetry of form is graded at three points, and we lost one-half point on that and one-half point on the character of the crust. We lost some points on the grain, color of the crumb and the texture but our total score of 91 points is considered very high."

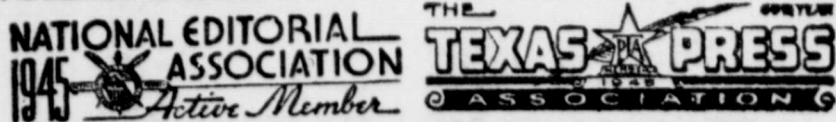

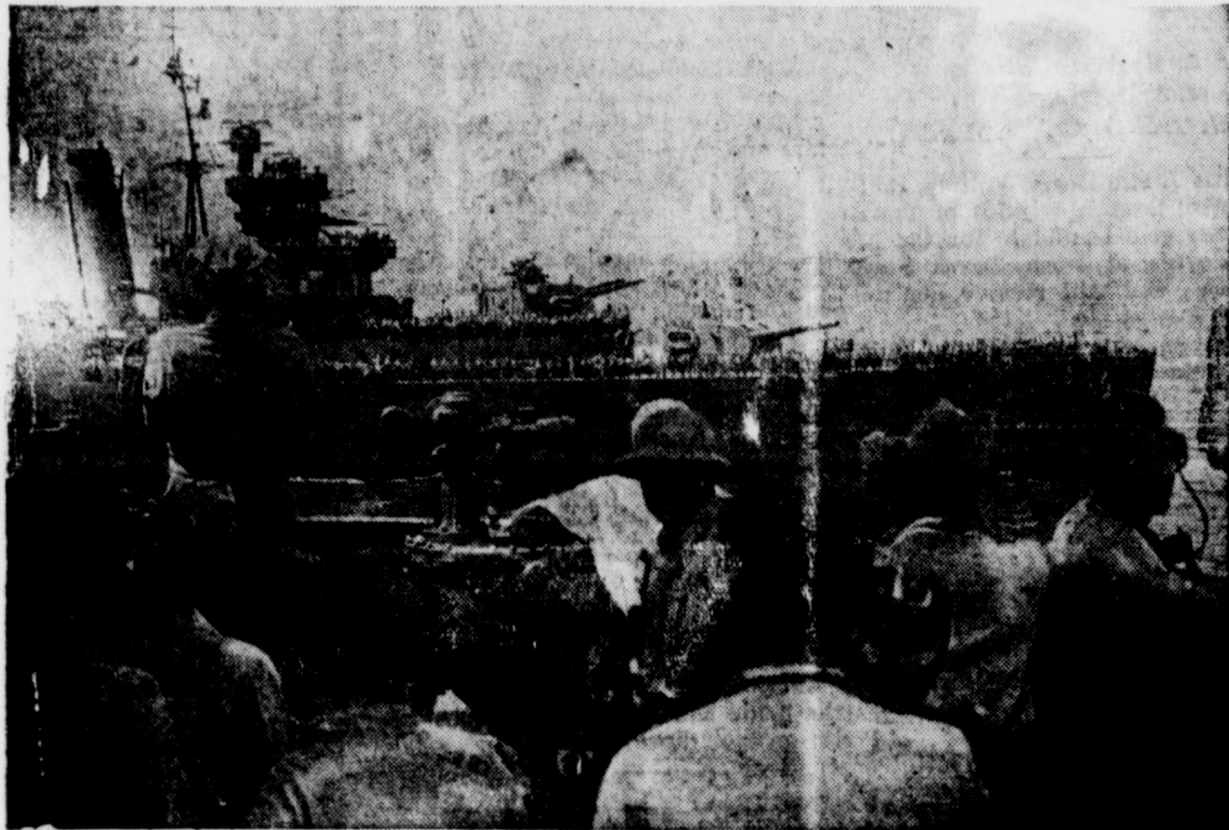

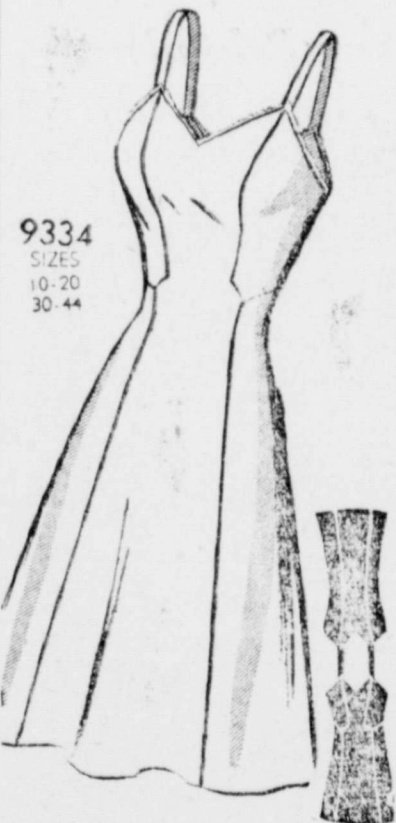
