### TODAY'S EVENTS By Associated Press

#### MACARTHUR ENTERS TOKYO TODAY

YOKOHOMA, Sept. 6. (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur, announcing he would enter Tokyo Saturday (Friday afternoon Texas Time) with the first occupation forces, said today by Mid-October 7,000,000 Japanese would have been disarmed, the greatest force ever to capitulate in the history of warfare.

He added approximately 3,000,000 of these were in the home islands and the balance in outlying Pacific areas.

MacArthur will raise Saturday over the American embassy, his Tokyo headquarters, the flag that flew in Washington, December 7, 1941, later over Casablanca, Rome, Berlin and the Battleship Missouri at surrender.

#### TRUMAN ASKS RETENTION OF WAR POWERS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6. (AP)—President Harry S. Truman called upon Congress today to allow him to keep his war powers in force for reconversion "emergency" as he laid down a 21-point legislative program. It included "limited" tax cuts next year, and proposals to achieve full employment.

Mr. Truman told Legislators the war will not be over on the home front until economic impacts have been eased. He said proposals to abolish war-time controls would lead to "great confusion, chaos in government".

### NEWS of MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM

With the 5th army, Italy—Cpl. Alvin Franks, who's wife Sarah lives on Rt. 2, is a cook with the 361st infantry regiment's 3rd battalion which was recently awarded the Distinguished Unit Citation for gallantry.

It is a unit of the 91st "Powder River" division and the citation covered fighting near Livergnano in Italy.

In the 7 day battle, the battalion captured Livergnano, took 70 prisoners, and killed or wounded 350 Germans, destroyed a self-propelled gun, an anti-tank gun, captured 10 machine guns, two trucks and small arms, mortar and artillery ammunition.

The yanks suffered 271 casualties.

"Unable to use supporting armor because of terrain and enemy demolitions on the highway, the battalion successfully repelled several strong enemy attacks, inflicting heavy losses, and advanced continuously through the heaviest type of enemy mortar and artillery fire.

One company knifed 1700 yards through enemy lines, cutting the main line of communication and forcing the withdrawal of 300 enemy and 6 tanks, which had been counterattacking the other elements of the battalion. This small force of only 80 men gallantly repelled fanatical, tank-supported enemy counterattacks for 8 hours, even after every machinegun had been destroyed by the terrific ene-

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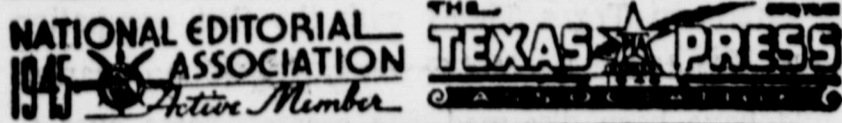

**THE Army Answers**  
Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters Insurance, legal problems or other Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. I know that gold stars, blue service stars and honorable discharge emblems may be placed on the service flag I have in my place of business. Is there any special order in which these are to be placed on the flag?

A. Yes. Gold stars are placed above the blue when the flag is displayed in a vertical position, and to the left when the flag is horizontal. Discharge emblems are placed below the blue stars when the flag is vertical and to the right when it is horizontal.

Q. My husband is to be discharged from the army soon. We would like to buy a certain piece of land on which to build a home. Can we buy the land under a G. I. Bill of Rights loan?

A. No unless the property is for a farm or for business purposes. If your husband acquires a clear title to the land, however, then he may apply for a loan to build the house, at any time after his discharge.

Q. My son married an English girl while he was overseas. He is back in the states and soon will be discharged. Will the Government transport his wife here from England?

A. Yes but not immediately. If he was on duty overseas at any time since September 8, 1939 the Government will furnish her transportation to her new home in the United States as soon as transportation is available.



**Waiting Contest**

Hard as it may be to get a died-in-the-wool bureaucrat thinking about winter problems in the summer time, unless something unusual happens, cold weather will come again. One of these days a school bell will ring, a boy will come down the street bouncing a football and after that it won't be long. Moreover winter calls for a lot of things that are scarce now.

Let's take shoes as a down-to-earth illustration. Which is better for keeping a boy's feet off the frosty ground, a 1942 price ceiling or a pair of good heavy brogues with wool socks in them? That's the problem before the American people, with school bells only a few days away. Getting into production on civilian goods is what the OPA is currently bungling.

**Hold That Price**

The OPA's war job was to keep prices of needful things from skyrocketing — a noble work requiring some stiff rules. But today, with the war won and war business slack, OPA is still making rules. One of them says: Manufacturers may make things for civilians provided they sell at 1942 prices. There's the rub, for factory owners now ready to start reconverting, making jobs safe for their employees.

The 1942 price rule stops them; nothing else. Workers want their jobs to last. Most civilians have saved some money and want to buy new things. Industry is anxious to serve them but very few factories can operate at 1942 prices. Materials cost more now and labor costs more also. There is only one thing a manufacturer can do, namely, beg OPA for special permission to price-up and go to work.

**Mail Bags Full**

The OPA, if you remember, is famous for leaving no stone unturned, and all that sort of thing. It is rumored that some men in the bureau have their own private opinions about business people anyhow. Before they grant any firm special leave to change a price, they investigate. That's all right, but applications to reconvert are coming in fast, more than 500 a day.

The bureau will never wind up its red tape in time. The only possible way out of trouble is to make a reasonable rule for all industry to follow, let whistles blow at 6:00 a. m. and ask questions later. Will they do it? Who knows? Employees and customers would probably cheer loudly for any employer who kept his payroll alive and said "Ph-f-v-u!" to the OPA, but it's dangerous.

**Formula for Panic**

Most business men are conservative. They are likely to wait exactly as long as the OPA says wait. Unable to do business on 1942 prices, they may pull fires from under their boilers and lay off the crew. Then the waiting contest starts. Bureaus will wait on investigations; employers will wait on bureaus; workers will wait on employers and you and I will wait for everything.

Idle workers in the soup-line; farmers without markets let crops rot in the field. An ugly picture. The way to avoid it is to let industry convert, sell its products to people with money and pay the men who work. Inflation can be prevented without starting a panic, if OPA will adopt a workable rule soon enough. But bureaus are usually more interested in rules than in reasons—warts on the nose of progress; bunions on the toe of time.

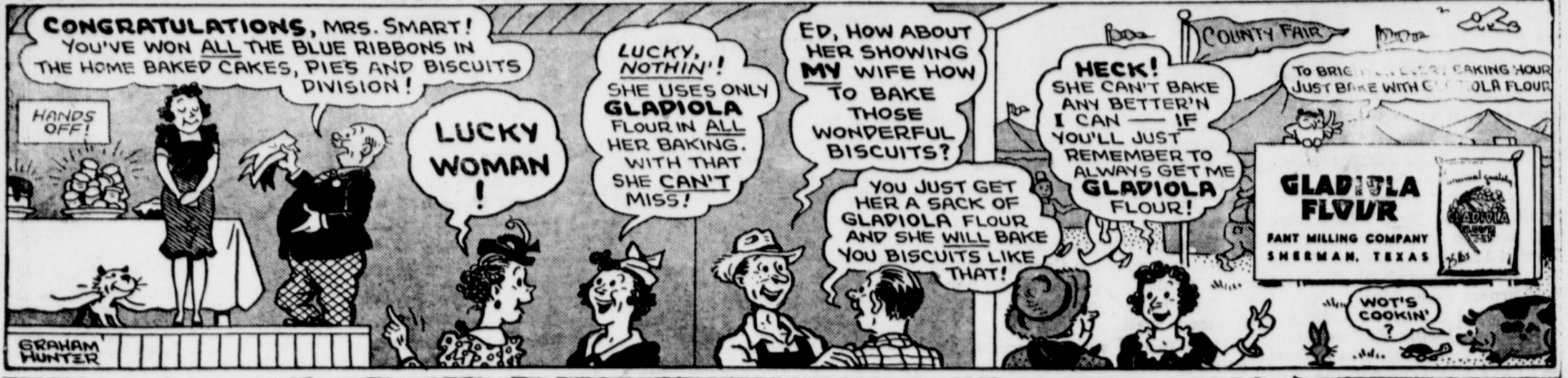

**RED CROSS ACTIVITY MUST GON ON DESPITE WAR'S END—CHAIRMAN**

Calling upon all Red Cross volunteers to continue on the job, Jack Roach, chairman of the Coryell County Red Cross chapter said that the end of hostilities with Japan means no let-up in local Red

Cross activities. This outline of Red Cross policy means no relaxing of the local chapter's efforts. In fact many of the organization's services will gradually expand.

"In the years which lie ahead, veterans' claims upon the government will increase," Mr. Roach said and the Red Cross is one of the agencies authorized by the government to handle such claims for hospitalization, pensions, and other legal benefits. Assistance to families of veterans, as well as those of servicemen, will also claim a large share of Red Cross effort.

"At present the Red Cross is calling for 3,000 medical social and hospital recreation workers to carry on its program among the wounded and hospitalized. And until our boys are brought home from abroad, the American Red Cross will be active in many foreign lands."

The blood donor program under which Red Cross chapters may recruit volunteer blood donors for recognized local and regional medical agencies gives promise of the same far-reaching benefits as the program conducted for the armed forces, while instruction in nutrition, first aid, water safety, accident prevention, and home nursing offers other outlets of service that are of extreme importance.

A special committee, composed of doctors and others prominent in the field of public health had recently completed a study of possible post-war activities in which the Red Cross might engage. The civilian blood donor service is an outgrowth of this study and other recommendations to the committee are now under consideration.

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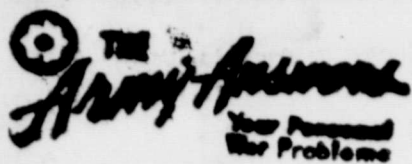

Your questions on allotments, matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters insurance, legal problems or other Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My son is an Air Corps officer. His father just died and I am now dependent on him for support. He has no other dependents. Would it be possible for me to get a family allowance?

A. Dependents of officers are not entitled to family allowance. However, since your son is now head of a household, he is entitled to receive rental and ration allowances, which can be used to house and feed his dependents. Proceeds from these allowances would be paid directly to him, but he could allot a portion of his salary to you, in which case you would receive the money by check.

Q. I am a veteran. I want to buy

some surplus army equipment to help me get started in business. What branch of the army sells the surplus material?

A. Surplus army property is NOT sold by the army. Other government agencies sell it for the army. Veterans may buy on priority up to \$2500 worth of surplus army property to establish or maintain their own small business by applying to the office of the Smaller War Plants Corporation in their locality. If the business is farming apply through the Agriculture Adjustment Administration.

Q. Is there any date established this year when Christmas presents are supposed to be sent overseas?

A. Yes. To make certain that overseas packages will reach their destination by Christmas, you should mail them between September 15 and October 15.

Q. My husband was inducted in Massachusetts and is now stationed in the Eighth service command. We were married after he entered the service. He will soon be discharged and we would like to make our home here. Will he have to go back east for his discharge, or can he get it here?

A. Ordinarily, a soldier is dis-

charged at the separation center nearest the place where he was inducted. However, if he can prove to his Commanding Officer that he has a new permanent residence or an offer of employment near where he is now stationed, he may be discharged at a separation center in the Eighth Service Command.

Q. If a young girl's husband gets killed in action, can she get a pension for the rest of her life?

A. Widows of soldiers killed in action are entitled to a pension which they will continue to receive if they do not remarry. However, to make certain that you fulfill all the requirements for receiving a pension, you should consult the nearest office of the Veterans Administration.

Q. Our son is in the Navy. We are listed as "Class B" dependents, and draw \$37 per month family allowance. Can you tell me through your column how much of this amount is taken from his salary?

A. Class B dependents—those who are dependent on an enlisted member of any of the armed forces for a substantial, but not the chief, portion of their support—receive \$37 per month, \$32 of

which is from the serviceman's pay.

Q. My husband is in the army. He likes it and wants to stay in after the war. Is it possible for men who are drafted to enlist in the regular army? If so will he have to wait until he is discharged to enlist.

A. Your husband may enlist now in the regular army. He must first be discharged, but the discharge will be accomplished as soon as he applies for enlistment.

Q. Is it true that soldiers are now being discharged because they are over 38?

A. Yes. Soldiers who have reached the age of 38 may apply for and receive a discharge within 90 days at the most.
