### FEWER RATION BOARDS PLANNED

DALLAS, Sept. 26 (AP)—A plan to reduce the 55 ration boards in the Dallas District of the OPA to 21 by Oct. 1, was announced by Gus Thomasson, district OPA chief, here Tuesday.

In the cutback program, ration boards will be closed at Glade-water, Kilgore, Athens, Ennis, Fairfield, Terrell, Quitman, Canton, Jefferson, Carthage, Pittsburg, Linden, Daingerfield, Naples, Mt. Pleasant, Mt. Vernon, Emory, Rockwall, Cooper, Clarksville, Denison, Bonham, Meridian and Gatesville.

In Dallas county all boards will be consolidated into the Fair Park Ration Board, Harold Pavy, vice-chairman of the Dallas County boards under the new setup explained.

#### MARSHAL GEORGI ZHUKOV INVITED HERE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The White House announced today President Harry S. Truman has invited Marshal Zhukov, of Soviet Russia to the United States. He will arrive in New York City October 4.

#### "LET HIM DOWN" ON JOBLESS PAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—President Harry S. Truman told the House Ways and Means Committee Democrats today that the Senate had "let him down" on the jobless pay liberalization and that he did not expect the house to do so.

#### HIROHITO EXPECTED TO ABDICATE

NEW YORK, Sept. 27 (AP)—The British Broadcasting Company quoted their Tokyo correspondent, Douglas Willis, saying today it was "strongly believed Emperor Hirohito has expressed his will to abdicate" during the meeting with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and that a "re-drafting of the Japanese constitution was already taking place".

#### DOOLITTLE FLIERS ASHES RECEIVED

SHANGHAI, Sept. 27 (AP)—The ashes of three Doolittle fliers who were executed by the Japanese were recovered today, the U. S. War Crimes Commission disclosed, and several eyewitnesses told fresh stories of the shooting October 15, 1942.

#### U. S. RECOGNIZES MIKLAS GOVERNMENT

BUDAPEST, Sept. 27 (AP)—Premier Bela Miklas late yesterday accepted a United States tender of recognition of his government in the form of an offer to negotiate a peace treaty, it was learned from a reliable source.

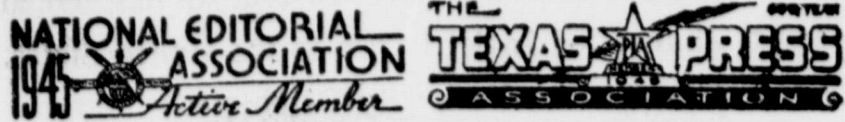

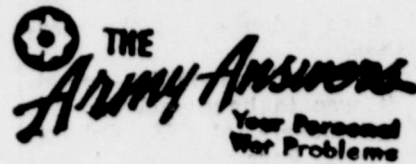

Dear Friends:

Everyone has undoubtedly read General Marshall's promises to Congress relative to the release of men in the service. I need not repeat his lengthy statement, which was made to the Members of the House and Senate at a special meeting in the auditorium of the Library of Congress. This meeting came as a result of continued pressure from members of Congress for a more liberal discharge policy. It was the first time that the Army has made a definite statement that it would reduce the requisites for discharge. General Marshall stated flatly that on October 1st the critical point score for enlisted men would be cut to 70 and on November 1st to 60 points. He also said that "Within four weeks men for whom no useful task in the Army can be found will be released."

In addition, the Chief of Staff stated that "there has been no relation whatsoever between the rate of demobilization and War Department consideration of the needs of a peacetime army". He explained that it will be late next spring before it will be necessary to make this decision because even with the greatly accelerated program of discharges which he promised would shortly exceed 1000 per hour around the clock or about 800,000 per month, it will take all winter to complete this tremendous job. The General explained the difficulties that have confronted the War Department in establishing and carrying out a fair program of demobilization. He emphasized the fact that this was the first time in history that any nation ever attempted to demobilize an

army on the basis of individual rights of the man rather than on the basis of military organizations—that is by companies or divisions. Of course, this makes the undertaking much more difficult.

I was encouraged by his promise that the release of men who apply for "hardship" discharges would be liberalized. He would not agree, however, as I feel he should, that ALL fathers should be discharged at once, nor did he seem sympathetic with proposal to give young boys a chance to resume their education. Congress may yet have to pass legislation, but taken as a whole his statement was the greatest single step yet taken in the movement to get our men home.

Early this week the house went on record as to its desires in this respect by passing by a unanimous vote a bill to encourage volunteer enlistments in the army. I did not feel that the bill went as far as it should, but it will undoubtedly help.

I think that we are making a sad mess of the disposition of surplus property now held by the government. I predicted the present results a year ago when I voted against the present surplus property disposal law. I am convinced that the entire system must be revised so as to give both veterans and ordinary citizens a better chance to buy. I fear that the present law only protects the speculator. I believe that he can take care of himself. I have been especially interested in getting surplus soil conservation machinery for our soil conservation districts. The House Committee on Agriculture has approved my bill on this subject, but the Rules Committee of the House has held up consideration of this measure. I, therefore, went to the Senate for help. Senator McKeller agreed to introduce an exact copy of my bill with the omission of two words. The Senate Committee on Agriculture considered the bill this morning and put the two words back in the bill and favorably reported it. The Senate has no rules committee to delay consideration of a bill; so I am very hopeful that we will soon get some action on this important measure.

Incidentally, we have recently been able to get a number of publications that have been very scarce during the war. I now have a substantial number of "Aunt Sammy's Cook Book", "Infant Care", "The Child From One to Six" as well as many agriculture yearbooks issued at various times in the past. As long as my supply lasts, I would be glad to send them to anyone who can use them.

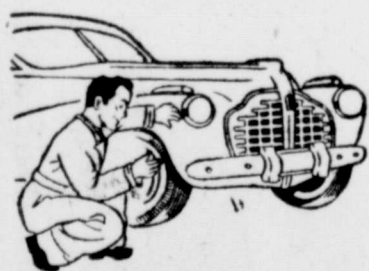

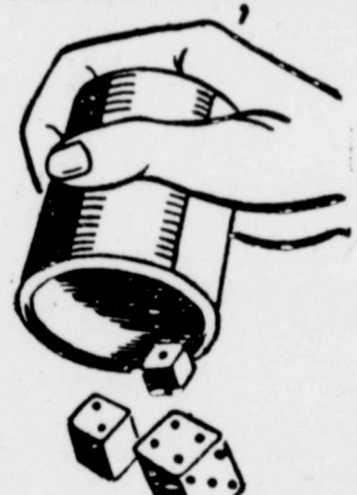

### British Coal

England is a coal country; 70% of the island's export tonnage is coal and it goes all over the world. England's 706,000 miners produce 200 million tons of coal a year. These are big figures until you compare England and America. We have only 393,000 miners in the United States but they produce 586 million tons of coal a year; more than five times as much per man as in England.

Coal miners in England draw \$25 a week. American coal miners get \$52 a week and they earn it. Don't let anybody tell you that American workers are super-men who hit harder and work more hours a day, because it's not true. Don't let anybody tell you that coal veins in the western hemisphere are richer and better and easier to work, because that's not true either.

### Modern Machinery

In America miners use power cutters. Automatic loaders put the coal in cars and electric locomotives pull them away. In England men dig coal out with picks and pitch it in cars with shovels. The power that pulls the car to daylight is a scrub mule with a rag over his eyes. That's how they used to mine coal in America when grandpa was a boy.

Getting a ton of English coal to the top of the ground costs \$4.20 for labor alone; \$1.40 in America. The manpower shortage, incidental to war, ran the price of British coal to \$6.50 a ton—twice its pre-war price. American coal advanced only 60¢ a ton. Hand work is what commands the premium when men are scarce. This economic fact has worked a hardship on the English.

### Food and Clothing

England does not raise enough food for her people, nor enough fibre to clothe them. Such necessities are imported by the shipload. In a practical sense, they are bought with coal. Plain to see, with coal costs doubled, things to eat and wear became very dear in England. People blamed the war, of course, but the real trouble was lack of modern coal mining machinery.

With a nation so dependent on coal, why didn't the mine owners equip their properties with modern machinery, get out more coal per man and pay better wages? Answer: Government interference! Tax laws discouraged replacing old machinery. Regulations placed a penalty on efficient methods. The results were three: High prices, low wages, and a ruined export trade.

### Might Have Been

Workers in British mines blamed the mine owners. The squeeze that pinched their wages to half the American scale was a political vice. Government regulations and taxes retarded production and choked prosperity. This was so craftily hid from the workers that they shouted loud for nationalization—government ownership. It will come now, with Churchill out and Attlee in.

With most admirable fortitude the English came through fiendish abuse to victory. Peace might have brought England prosperity; ability to pay her 12 billion dollars of war debts. With business men free to compete and produce, earn profits and raise wages, it might have been. But socializing all industry will start a long detour off the road to a better England.

Q. Is it possible for a veteran and his wife who was a WAC to go into business as partners and both receive the maximum loan guaranty with which to purchase a business?

A. Yes, subject to the requirements of law they are eligible to participate in loan guaranties, to the extent which such entitles separately, under no circumstances, however, may a guaranty exceed \$4000.00 or \$2000.00 for each.

Q. If a widow of World War I veteran, who died having no service-connected disability, was denied a pension because her income was greater than \$1,000.00 per year, is she permanently barred from receiving a pension.

A. No, when the widows income meets the requirements of the law she will be eligible to receive pension upon reapplication.

Q. May a pension be paid for a

scar that is disfiguring?  
A. Yes, a scar that is disfiguring or one that would interfere with employment or success in any line of endeavor may be determined to be a compensable disability, if held to exist to a degree of 10 per cent or more.

Q. Are there travel or occupational restrictions in a National Service Life Insurance policy?

A. There are no restrictions whatsoever as to travel, occupational or residence.

Q. Will a veteran who is discharged to a Veterans Administration Hospital lose his right to his old position because he is in the hospital and is not able to apply for it within the prescribed 90 days?

A. The law provides protection for the veteran who entered a hospital immediately upon discharge and who is hospitalized for not more than one year. In such cases a veteran has 90 days after he gets out of the hospital to apply for his own job.

Q. May a veteran receive readjustment allowance and go to school under the provisions of the G. I. Bill at the same time?

A. While receiving subsistence allowance under the G. I. Bill a veteran is ineligible to receive readjustment allowance.

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
