

Here's a letter direct from Tokyo your songbooks and well filled with us Sunday, Oct. 7, at both from G. W. Derrick, Gm-3-c who morning and evening services. Bro. is aboard the USS Hancock over there, and he writes in part as follows

"Well we went over on liberty yesterday to Yokasuki, that's about 20 miles from Tokyo with Yokohoma in between.

The city we went in isn't large. the populaton, I'd guess to be about 8 or 10 thousand. We could tell the people were a conquered race but they were friendly enough. They were really hard up for food and cigarettes, etc. I took over a carton of cigarettes and sold them one cigarette at a time on the streets. Boy! those men and boys would almost mob you trying to get to you to buy cigarettes. They all seemed to have plenty of money. I Phone 130 came back with quite a lot of it and I am sending you some. The standard is the Yen. We get 15 yen for one of our dollars. The small bills are less than one yen and the larger ones are one yen and up. The people there really lived dirty. The men are small, much smaller than any of us.

Here and there you could see where bombs had hit, whole blocks would be level where everything had burned off. There were air raid shelters everywhere, but I'd be afraid to go in most of themafraid they'd fall in.

The people all looked crummy, a few of htem could mumble English. They'd never speak out loud. and they all had that everlasting grin on, especially when they saw we had cigarettes or candy. A package of cigarettes or a bar of candy sold for 10 yen. That's about 70 cents in our money. Sometimes, you could get more.

There were a lot of stores there, but in none of them did I see any food for sale of any type. I don't know what they eat.

I saw three movie houses. Didn't the former Miss Nellie Rutherford. will be returned to the states in a Jap movie.

I came back with about all the

junk I could carry. I'll send some brnig it.

All in all, it was a great day, a big experience. Wish I could go Stanford conducting.

Electrical Safety Tips FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Permanent wiring, installed according to the National Electrical Code and properly fused, is safe from fire hazards, although frequently fires are blamed on "defective wiring" simply because no other origin is apparent. When a fire is traceable to electrical causes, it is usually due to an improper installation and subsequent neglect or to misuse of electricity or electrical equipment.

Follow These Safety Suggestions

- Have your wiring inspected to see that it conforms with the National Electrical Code, your local code or other recognized safety standard. Correct any hazardous conditions.
- Specify code requirements when making additions, alterations or repairs to your wiring.
- Deal only with a capable, experienced electrician. Do not entrust wiring to an inexperienced "handyman" or the safety of the job may be impaired.
- Never use a penny as a substitute for a fuse. Fuses are current limiting devices, designed to cut off current before damage can result if a short circuit or overload causes wires to overheat. Pennies or fuses that are too large may allow wires to become hot enough to ignite insulation, possibly causing a fire. The right size fuse for most household branch circuits is 15 amperes.
- Use only appliance cords bearing label of the Underwriters Laboratory, which signifies compliance with rigid safety standards. Do not drive nails or tacks through cords, place them under rugs or in contact with radiators or other heat sources.
- Use only asbestos-covered cords with heating appliances.
- Always disconnect an iron (especially a non-automatic) if you leave it standing on ironing board while answer phone or doorbell.
- R Never put away an iron or other heating appliance until cool.
