HERE'S THE COTTON SITUATION IN CORYELL COUNTY

Mrs. Myrtle E. Lee, Special Agent, Dept. of Commerce, Bureau of Census in her ginning report shows that 333 bales of cotton were ginned in Coryell county from the 1945 crop prior to Sept. 16, as compared with 213 bales for the crop of 1944.

That report shows a little increase but the season was earlier, probably.

MACARTHUR STARTS POLITICAL REFORMS

TOKYO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur met Premier Shidehara for the first time today and gave him instructions on social and political reforms requiring liberalization of the Japanese government.

He stressed the need of prompt and "vigorous" action by the government to see that the Japanese were clothed and housed this winter.

The meeting at MacArthur's headquarters was initiated by Shidehara.

1,250,000 SOLDIERS HOME BY 6 MONTHS

TOKYO, Oct. 11 (AP)—1,250,000 American Soldiers will be coming home from the Pacific in the next six months, Gen. MacArthur announced today. 250,000 will return monthly.

By the end of March, next year, only 400,000 will be left in the entire Pacific. This includes 200,000 both Japan and Korea.

ATTLEE CALLS CABINET: DOCK STRIKE

LONDON, Oct. 11 (AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee summoned the cabinet in executive session today to consider the dock strike which has spread to Glasgow and threatened Britain with hunger over the week-end. 46,500 strikers are out.

CHINESE COMMUNISTS-NATIONALS AGREE

CHNGKING, Oct. 11 (AP)—Chinese Nationalists and Communists negotiators issued a communique today agreeing on basic principles of political peace.

5 SOLDIERS KILLED, 20 WOUNDED, TYPHOON

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (AP)—A CBS correspondent broadcast from Manila today that 90,000 soldiers are without quarters, 5 killed, and a score wounded in a typhoon which struck Okinawa Tuesday.

4TH ARMY MAROONS TAKE EASY WIN OVER JTAC

The mud's still there, just a little more sticky, blacker and worse. JTAC rooters were on hand in the east and were sounding off.

Szeckley, fakes to Brush and carries over big hole in C after making 9 yards. Papson makes it 1st down. Papson, on a wide end run right is taken by Thetford, dropping 4. as quarter ends. Johnson for Tidwell.

JTAC attempts to pass, passer drops ball, Roffine recovers for 11th and ball is on JTAC 20 yard line. Myers for Minarovic. Szeckley carries for 3 at C. Fabila carries at rt side and they measure. Painter in, Davis out. 1st down.

Hood fumbles Tarleton recovers, and things do change in the mud. Thetford recovering. Ball on 14. Sunderman tries over T, and adds 3 yards. Fumble on hand, off, Tarleton recovers, dropping 2 yds. Davis for Painter. Brush takes JTAC punt on 48, and is stopped by Cowser on the JTAC 46. Hood passes, Sunderman intercepts, and it's JTAC's on the 45 yard line. Johnson carries at end and is credited with four yards. Sunderman hits C, no gain. Henderson carries, as half ends, for no gain.

Third Quarter

Gilbert kicks, Peters holds for Tarleton, ball to 11th at south end,

taken by Brush on the 30, returned to the 47, stopped by Gilbert. Jessup for Gilbert. Meyers plows over C for 8 yards. Fumble in backfield, but recovered by 11th, 2 yard loss. Papson on reverse fails to gain, slipping in muck, Jessup stops. Szeckley punts Henderson, on the 15, returns to the 10, but there's a penalty, offside. Szeckley, gets off a better one to the sideline, taken by Henderson on the 20, where he is knocked out of bounds. Manness in. Sunderman to Henderson, and he loses 2. Wickline in Henderson out. "Siren" blown by GI's as Minarovic in. Punts nicely on the 35 by Minarovic, and he returned to JTAC 47. Davis kicked 58 yards Minarovic takes again, and for 3, stopped by Peters. Szeckley carries and he makes 5, Jessup stopping. Szeckley hits C and it's first down.

DOCTOR RATIONING! DO YOU WANT IT IN AMERICA?



COMMUNISM, FASCISM, NAZISM are not mere matters of terms or definitions. They result from the establishment of centralized controls and the operation of mechanisms of administration. Unfortunately, in the development of these mechanisms the insidious step by step procedure may postpone recognition of their real significance.

We are a trusting people. In some respects we are gullible folk. It is essential in these times that we be ruthlessly realistic.

There have been introduced in the United States Congress, Amendments to the Social Security Act. They are known as the

Wagner-Murray-Dingell Bills. Most Americans favor the expressed objective of some of the proposals. However, almost hidden in the careful verbiage of the Amendments is the cold steel move to place in the hands of appointees of the Federal Government sole and exclusive responsibility for the distribution of health care for one hundred ten million people. This service would consist of general medical, special medical, general dental, special dental, laboratory care, hospitalization and home nursing service. *In no country has machinery been established more sweeping in its provisions to serve the purpose of a Collectivist State.*

A DRAIN ON PRODUCTION — FEWER JOBS FOR WORKERS

In the beginning the tax provisions would create a central fund of more than Eight Billion Dollars annually. It is not anticipated that this amount would even approximate the total cost. It is to be supplemented from "General Revenue." We have fought and won two wars. Now confronted with a national debt approximating Three Hundred Billion Dollars, there is grave doubt whether our economy could sustain this additional drain of from Ten to Fifteen Billion Dollars each year.

The key principle of our Freedom of Enterprise System is more jobs for more men at maximum wages to provide ever greater markets for the products of a constantly expanding industry. Yet, it should be emphasized, the Wagner-Murray-Dingell proposals are a direct tax on employment. There would be a minimum of

Eight Billion Dollars yearly less for consumers to spend for the potential output of our mines and factories and farms. This, of necessity, would create a downward spiral of production and fewer and fewer jobs for workmen. These results, within limits, would be inevitable. They might be disastrous but they are not the really important consideration.

The unparalleled progress and incomparable achievements of the American people are the result of self-respect, individual initiative and self-reliance. When formalized Security is substituted for self-reliance we forfeit the essence of the factor that has been our strength. When the incentive for individual effort and thrift is removed progress, as we have known it, will be shifted into reverse.

BEWARE, — IF DOCTOR RATIONING FAILS

It may be possible that a truly wise and honest administration can reasonably ration the food supply of a nation. Save under truly totalitarian concept and control, is it within reason to expect the effective rationing of physician and hospital services for one hundred ten million people? *A vital difference should be kept in mind. If the food rationing fails, it may mean only that there are no steaks or pork chops on dining room tables. If the doctor*

rationing fails, men and women and children die. Human lives are the issue.

The Wagner-Murray-Dingell Health Services proposals should be recognized for what they are. They are in reality State Medicine. They are instrumentalities and mechanisms of the Collectivist State. If we are to preserve our Freedom of Enterprise System we dare not enact these proposals into law.
