TRUCE ARRANGED IN JAVA BY SOEKARNO

BATAVIA, Java, October 29. (AP)—Indonesian President Soekarno is reported to have arranged a truce at Soerbaja between native Nationalists and the British Indian Troops after the bloodiest fighting of the Allied occupation of Java.

As a result of the truce, firing and fighting is quieting down. The fighting was in an area of the British 49th Brigade headquarters.

CHINESE COMMUNISTS FIGHT "CENTRALS"

CHUNGKING, Oct. 29, (AP)—Bitter fighting between Chinese Communists and Chinese Central Government troops in North China has resulted in 15,000 casualties for Chiang Kai-Shek's forces. The Communists also lost heavily. It was termed a real, but not official civil war by official Communist spokesmen.

GEN. YAMASHITA'S TRIAL OPENED TODAY

MANILA, P. I., (AP)—The trial opened for Nip General Yamashita. The first witness testified that four Jap sailors bayoneted to death more than 50 women and children in a Red Cross Aid Station last February. She herself was bayoneted nine times and her baby killed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (AP)—President Truman today cancelled all of his scheduled out-of-town trips, this includes the trip to Waco December 5. His decision was attributed to the heavy pressure of business in Washington.

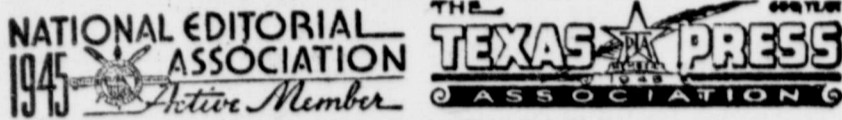

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HORNETS WIN OVER BELTON TIGERS 26-0 THERE

CRIPPLED BELTON CLUB SCRAPS, BUT GAME OVER AT HALF

Gatesville High School's '45 Hornet Machine easily rolled over a scholastically crippled and impotent Belton Tiger eleven at Belton Friday evening 26 to 0, which not nearly shows the relative strength of the teams.

The game was over at the half—at least the scoring—and coach Loyd Mitchell threw in everything he had, trying three combinations.

Outstanding for Belton, was Walker and Jackson, with McGehee next best. Belton was pitifully crippled for the game.

For the Hornets, Whitt shone on the defensive, and Bone, Tatum, and anybody else that wanted to starde offensively.

Here's play by play.

Hornets kick to Walker on the 20, returns to 40. Walker takes at rt end, Tatum stops for 3 yard loss Walker kicks, Patterson takes on 35, returns to 40. Bone takes on long end run for 1st down. Hornets fail. Tatum quick-kicks ball dead on 40. Johnson for Necessary, who's oto weak from flu. Walker tries to pass, run, can't, loses 6 yards. Walker passes over Jackson. Walker kicks to Patterson on 45, returns to 50. Pass to Tatum carries for 15 yards and 1st down, as quarter ends.

Johnson hits C for 3. An end run fails to gain. Parker goes thru stopping Tatum for 7 yd loss, line leaked. Tatum nicely to McGehee, ball dead. Walker quick-kicks, ball dead on Belton 46. Hornets kick to Belton, and return is to 30. Belton penalized, 15, roughing. Graham, Anderson, Pennington in.

Walker carries at rt end for 9, they don't go next. Freddie in. They measure after next play; made it 1st down.

Walker at LT makes 3. Whitt nicks him for no gain Walker at RE takes for another 1st down at LE. Freddie out. Next play Tigers fumble, and Hornets recover, Whitt getting it. Tatum takes for 1st down and 20. Time, Hornets. Davis

in, Pennington out. Patterson takes for none at LE. Tatum carries for 9 at LT. Bone makes it 1st down, but they drop 5, penalty, backfield in motion. Tatum at C makes 6 more. Patterson is stopped at C ball on 1 yard line. Tatum hits C and don't. Tatum takes it over, and then misses extra. Gv. 20. Belton 0.

Hornets kick ball to Walker on 25, returns to 45. Walker carries, fumbles, Tomblin recovers. Tomblin takes from 35 to 3 yard line in a beautiful play, but is overhauled by a Beltonian. Bone carries over on next. Place kick don't go, GV 26, Belton 0.

Here's a letter from Pfc. Webster F. Bundrant, written from Mindanao, P. I., which we received recently. We'll skip the formalities.

"How's things in Coryell county since the war is over. There should be a lot of the old boys returning. In fact there should be a great many more than there are.

The GIs over here are oen and all of the opinion that the high ranking officers are stalling and are not returnng men to civilian life as fast as they should. At the rate of 10,000 men discharged per day it will take two years and 6 months to discharge the 8 million men of the army. At the present rate of induction, at that time, the army will still be 1,500,000.

Everyone knows that this isn't necessary. The reason the generals are stalling is that most of them were colonels, majors, etc., when the war started and as promotions in war are only temporary they would be reduced to those ranks. The people are the ones that can speed up demobilization, if they will get on the right track and get our congressmen busy, their loved ones and friends will be home much sooner. I have been overseas 6 months and only about 60 days of combat, but those men that have been here longer must get home before, and so my time will come. If the soldiers over here were allowed to write officials in Washington things would be buzzing. Well we know too much of the facts so in order to write them we must get permission from higher officers. To get it, we would have to go thru enough red tape to fill the biggest waste basket in Gatesville and then an officer

would have to censor it, word for word, nad by the time htey got thru with that letter it would look like the trimming off a paper doll. Then it would be of no value to us whatever, so it is left up to the civilians of the United States to see that something is done about the deliberate hoding of men in service because of some few men's personal profit and authority.

By the time you read this I will probably be on my way to Japan. I am not a bit sorry to be leaving these islands. If they would give me the whole 7,000 of them I would give them back before I would live here one month.

Well, news is scarce, nothing of interest ever happens over here now, so I will sign "thirty" and crawl in my rock. Tell everyone "hello" for me.

With air group 50 on the USS Cowpens, Yokusuka—Roy M. Prewitt, 19. aviation radioman, 3-c of Gatesville, figured in the first landings of U. S. Navy planes at two points on the Jap homeland follownig the end of hostilities.

The COWPENS had the honor of being the on'y carrier with the advance group of Naval units moying into Tokyo Bay. On August 28, planes from the group were launched to make the initial Navy combat plane landings on Japan at Atsugi airfield, near Tokyo, and on Aug. 30, the COWPENS launched six torpedo planes carrying occupational personnel, escorted by 8 fighters, flew into the Jap base at Yokosuka. and they saw the Stars and Stripes raised at Yokosuka, official opening of the first U. S. Naval Air station on the Jap Homeland.

With the 37th Inf. Div., Luzon—Veteran of 29 months, Sgt. Henry M. Farris, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Farris, Gatesville, will soon be on his way home with the 37th "Buckeye" division.

He holds the combat infantry-Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 2 battle stars and the Philippine Liberation ribbon with one star. He is with the 129th Inf. Regt.

He saw action at Bougainville, Lngayen Gulf, Ft Stoisenburg, Manila and Baguio and finally moved all the Japs out of the Cagayan Valley.

Major Byron Leaird McClellan has arrived home for a visit with his wife, the former Miss Eloise Cook and their young son. Major McClellan is just back from Austria, his second tour of duty overseas. He expects to remain in the AAF.

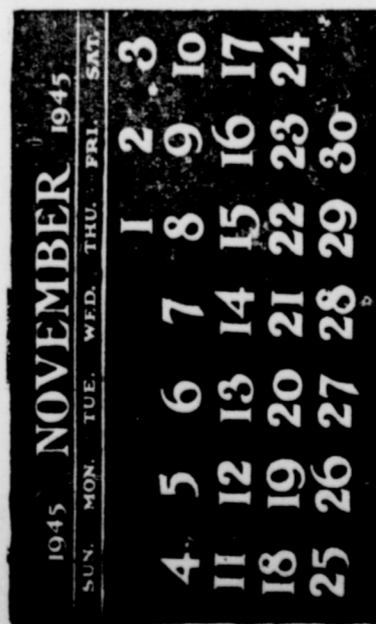

Dear Friends:
The House has just passed a most remarkable piece of legislation. It is an appropriation bill which reduces the appropriations heretofore made by \$52,453,535,278. World War I involved a total expenditure by the United States

of approximately 26 billions of dollars. This bill recaptures from the funds heretofore appropriated for the prosecution of this war an amount twice as great as the total cost of the first World War, but even with this great reduction of appropriations, it seems clear that World War II will cost the United States in money spent well over 340 billions of dollars. Of course none of these staggering figures include the multiplied billions that will be expended for the care of our veterans or the still greater cost in human blood and suffering. It certainly seems that these figures alone should impress us all with the fearful and ever increasing cost of war. Certainly war is a bad investment from a purely financial standpoint.

Financial balance sheets cannot however, measure human suffering, nor can the destruction wrought in this war be used as a measure of the probable destruction of a future war. It has been more than two months since the two atomic bombs were dropped over Japan. I don't think there has been a day since that time that the Washington papers have not discussed this new and terrible weapon, and well they may. If we engage in a third world war, it may well consist of the dropping of not more than two atomic bombs. (I am sure you have all seen the prediction of one scientist who says one bomb might be produced to kill 40,000,000 people.) These bombs might be dropped on us, not by us. I think it is most dangerous to assume that we will long have any monopoly on the production of this weapon. I fear that many of our people are assuming a false sense of security that will be very dangerous to our country. We must realize that the atomic bomb is a threat to America as well as to the rest of civilization.

I will be deeply interested in hearing president Truman's recommendations in regard to military training which he expects to make to Congress next Tuesday (October 23rd). We all know we must prepare, but there is much difference of opinion as to how we can best prepare to meet the weapons of the atomic era. Certainly everyone can agree that we must in the first place strengthen our state department and make our diplomacy as outstanding as our armed forces. Properly directed, diplomacy may be our most effective defense. Surely if we will work as hard trying to avoid the causes of war as we do after war has begun, we will be able to minimize the chances of war. I fear that there is too much disposition to be contemptuous of our diplomats as "Politicians". Certainly they are "politicians", but they often hold in their hands the power of war or peace. We simply cannot ignore this, our first line of defense. Let us help our State Department.

Early this week the House passed a bill providing a program of Federal Aid in the erection and improvements of airports. This program is similar to our Federal Aid for highways except that the Federal Government will deal directly with local agencies rather than through a state department as the highway department. I voted for the bill and also for an amendment, which was defeated, to bring this new program in conformity with the highly successful highway program. I believe that we will shortly see a great development of air transportation, and airports are going to be just as essential as highways were to the great expansion of motor transportation which we saw after World War I.

All week the utility companies have been attacking my bill to establish a three year, well-planned R. E. A. development. The bill is now before the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. I do not feel that the utilities have made any headway, but

they are very anxious to deny the R. E. A. the opportunity to enjoy a sound well-planned expansion program.

After my bill, H. R. 538, providing for the transfer of surplus machinery to soil conservation districts, was tied up by the Rules Committee, Senator McKellar of Tennessee introduced a copy of it in the Senate. Yesterday the Senate passed the bill. I hope this will enable us to get some action here in the House.

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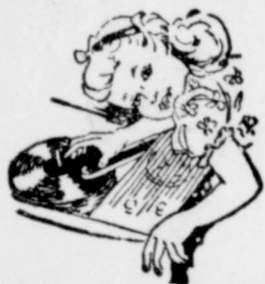
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THE Army Answers
Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. I was discharged from the army four months ago. At that time I stopped paying premiums on my National Service Life Insurance. I now find that it is possible for a veteran to keep the insurance for eight years from the time it was first taken out. I still have five years to go. Would it be possible for me to re-instate the policy?

A. Yes. Write the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., saying you want to re-instate your policy. Include in your letter your full name, serial number, policy number and unit to which you were last assigned. Include also a check or money order for back premiums and a statement that you are in good health. If you wait until six months have elapsed since you paid your last premium, you will have to have a physical examination.

Q. My husband was killed in action a year ago. I am now receiving a monthly pension, but it isn't enough to support me. If I take employment, will this pension be cut off?

A. No. Since your husband's death was due to a service-connected disability, your pension is payable for life or until you remarry, regardless of any other income you may have.

Q. My husband is going to ask for a discharge from the army because of hardship conditions at home. If he gets a discharge for this reason will he be barred from any of the privileges of the GI Bill of Rights?

A. Not if he is otherwise eligible.

J. How long does it take a soldier to be discharged once he reports to a separation center?

A. Normally about two days. But,

if his records are not in shape, or if his personal affairs are not in order, or if he needs some medical or dental attention, it may take longer.

Q. My husband has been in Germany since April, and now is in the army of Occupation. Does this mean that he will have to stay until it is all over, or will he be replaced in a certain length of time by new men?

A. Soldiers in the army of occupation are released from the service as soon as they become eligible for discharge. They are also being replaced by lower point men and those who are now enlisting or being inducted into the service.

Q. Is a soldier still eligible for a furlough home after serving overseas for a certain period of time?

A. The army has not resumed the furlough rotation policy it once had in effect. However, soldiers with long periods of service overseas will be released from that duty when replacements are available.

Q. Is it true that boys 17 years old can now enlist in the regular army?

A. Yes, but they must have the consent of their parents.

Q. My husband is a corporal in the army and he will soon be discharged. We expect our child will be born in about six months. If he were to apply for government

maternity and infant care now, would it still be possible for me to obtain that aid, even though he will be out of the army when the baby comes?

A. It is advisable for your husband to apply for Emergency Maternity and Infant care before he leaves the service. However, if he applies after he leaves the service and a physician certifies that the pregnancy occurred during the time he was serving in the Army as a private, corporal or sergeant, the aid will be granted.
