2ND ARMORED TO ASSEMBLE AT CAMP HOOD

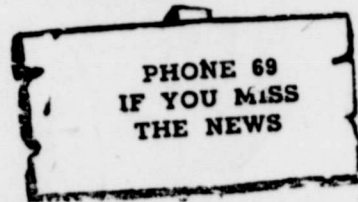
WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The 2d Armored Division will assemble at Camp Hood after it returns from overseas and remain there for an unspecified period, the War Department announced Monday.

The 2d Infantry Division, now training at Camp Swift, will make that camp its permanent station, it was announced.

Miscellaneous small units now stationed at Camp Bowie will be withdrawn by March 31, but the War Department was unable to furnish information at this time on the future use of Camp Bowie.

Camp Fannin has been declared surplus as of Jan. 19 and will be closed.

Camp Hood is capable of handling 80,000 troops. The 2d Armored Division, when it moves into the camp, will occupy only about one fourth of the camp area.

CHUNGKING, Nov. 8. (AP) Russian forces have withdrawn from Manchurian port cities of Hulutao and Newchang leaving the Chinese Communists in control. Communist leaders will hold Americans responsible for any grave consequences resulting from presence of American forces in North China areas.

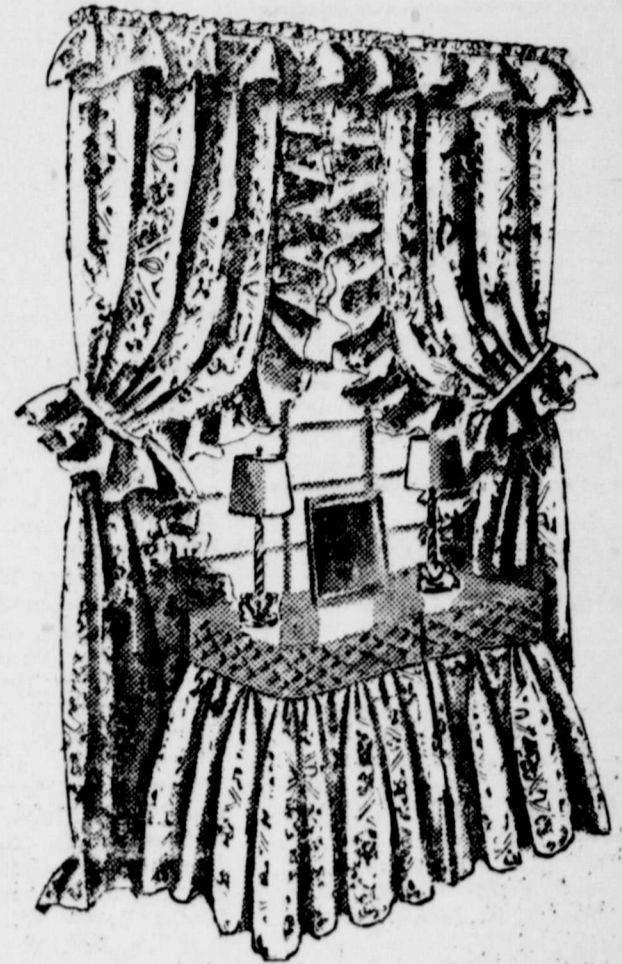

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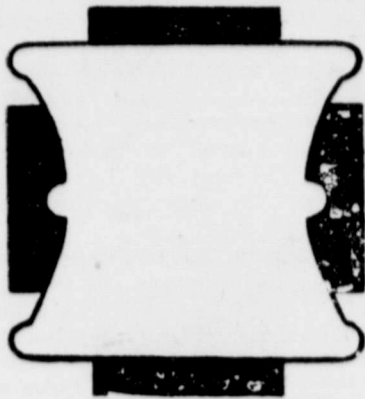

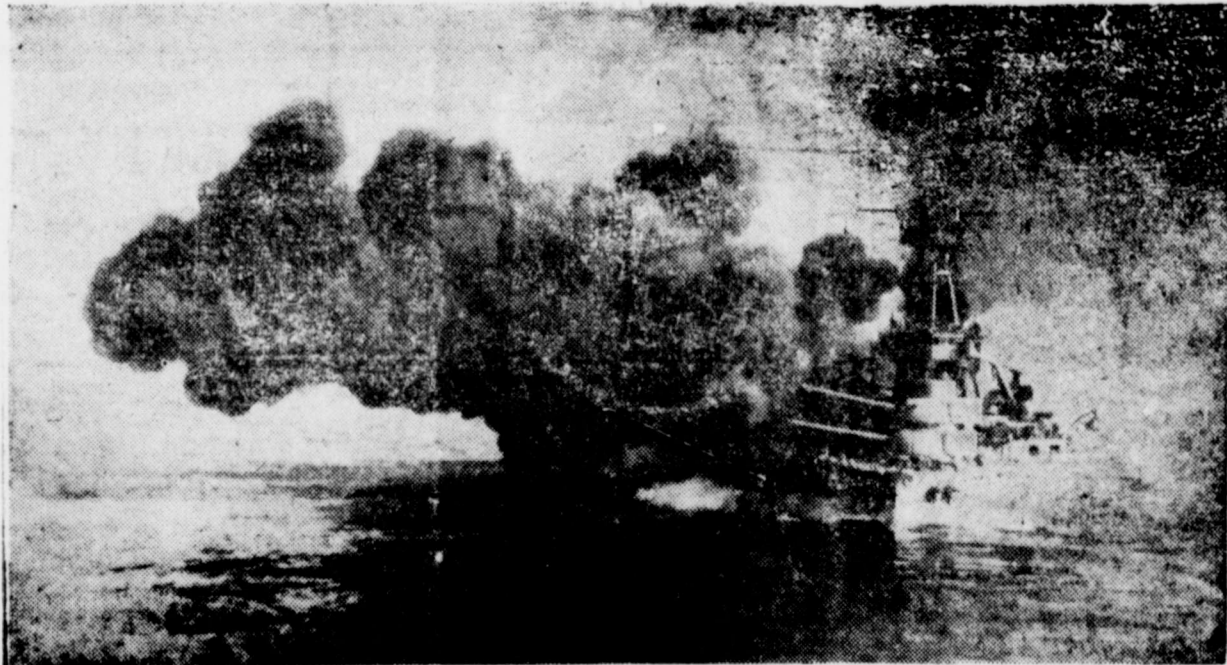

Dear Friends:

Yesterday the House acted on one of the most controversial issues of the session—an additional appropriation for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration. This organization is supported by all of the United Nations but the great bulk of the money (72%) is provided by the United States. Great Britain provides the largest part of the remainder, although the American Republics contribute smaller amounts. This money is used to carry out relief work in the liberated countries. It is not used in Ger-

many and Japan. Some time ago Congress authorized the appropriation of \$350,000,000 of which \$800,000,000 has already been appropriated. This bill provides for the appropriation of the remaining \$550,000,000 for which the United States is obligated. I believe most of us agree that our country should carry out its commitments and also agree that we should insofar as possible aid our allies in preventing starvation and suffering. The difference of opinion arises over the question of whether or not we should attach qualifications to our bounty. I believe we should.

It is generally admitted that in many of the countries of eastern Europe this relief is being used for purposes that were never intended by the United States. It is true that we don't know just what is happening in many of these countries but the suspicion is strong that some of these supplies have been used to arm or at least to feed communistic-partisan armies. I do not believe that any American money should be so used. I believe the best protection we have is publicity. I, therefore, voted for an amendment which was adopted prohibiting the use of any American money in any country where the representatives of the American Press are denied the opportunity to observe and freely report on the distribution of these supplies.

The question of wages, prices, and the responsibility of labor unions for the performance of their contracts has become increasingly acute. It is almost universally agreed that we must retain a reasonably high level of wages, prices

and national income. This is the only way we can hope to pay the public debt. In the past it was universally agreed that as production costs increase the retail price of the goods so produced must increase. Wages make up a large part of the production costs of most consumers' goods. I simply cannot see how wages can be increased 30 per cent without materially increasing the cost of these goods. The C. I. O. says that the manufacturers can absorb these increases without passing them on to the public. As I see it, wages must be based on the value of the services of the laborer and can never be long maintained at a figure so high as to make the production of goods unprofitable. It seems clear that if we are to raise wages more than we increase the productivity of labor, we must raise prices. This means an increase in the cost of living. I think we should stop fooling ourselves and meet the issue. How much higher do we want to raise prices? If we raise wages we will of necessity raise industrial prices. If we raise industrial prices, we must raise agricultural prices. Farm prices are already far behind other prices, but if they go up, food will go up, and we will be again called on to raise wages, and the whole cycle starts over again and the sky is the limit.

I think the situation is extremely dangerous. The president recognizes the danger and has felt that he must cancel all his trips out of Washington including his trip to Waco and Temple, which was set for December 5th. I regret this very much. I hope he will be able to get down to see us this Spring. In the meantime, I hope we will be able to work out a firm and sound labor policy which will of necessity involve a decision on the question of how high we are going to let prices go, and some binding obligation on the unions to carry out the contracts they make. Many of the existing strikes are in direct violation of outstanding contracts which the striking unions have made. The unions should be required to honor their contracts just as their employers are.
