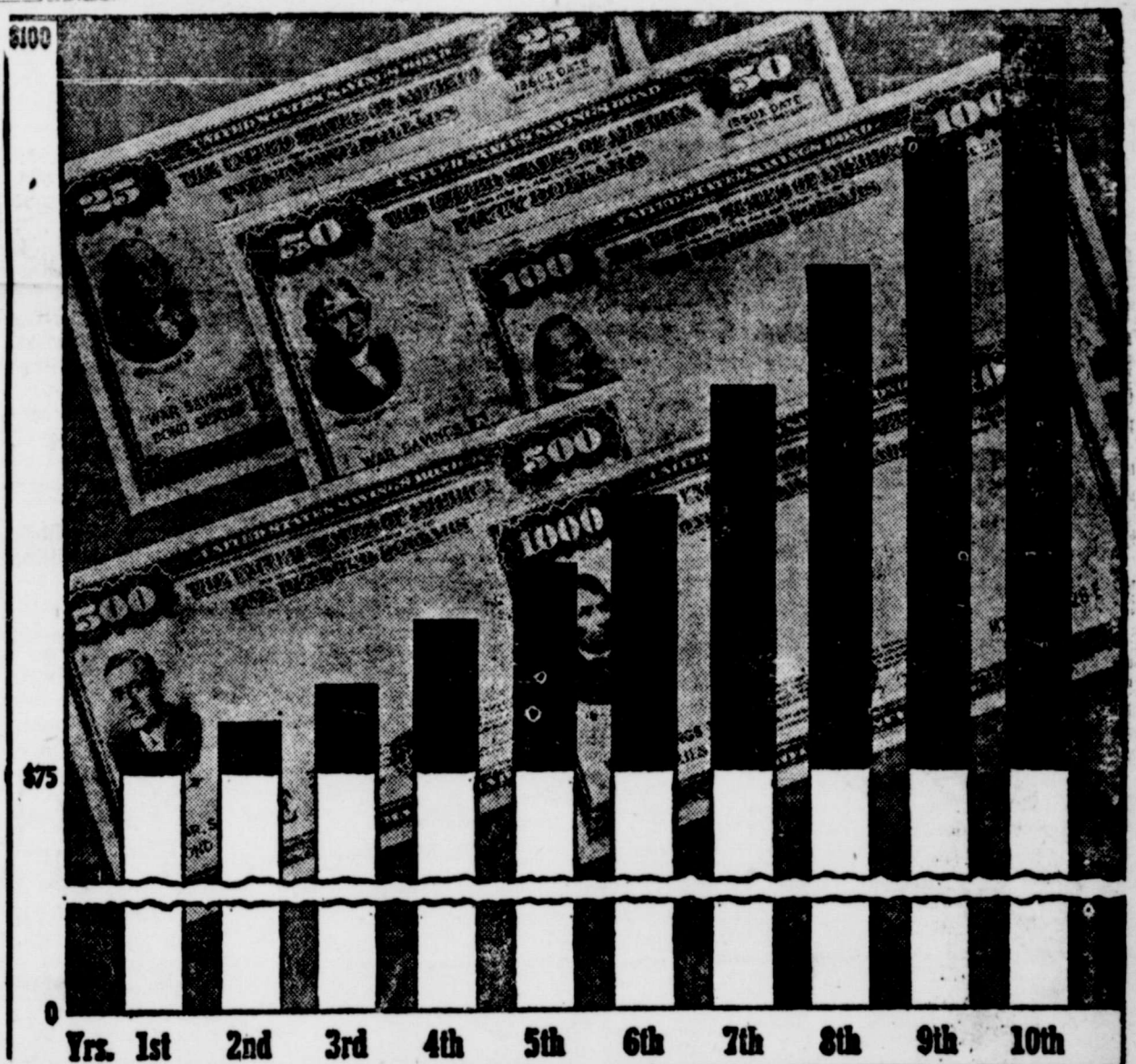
### GEN. WALTER C. SHORT TESTIFIES

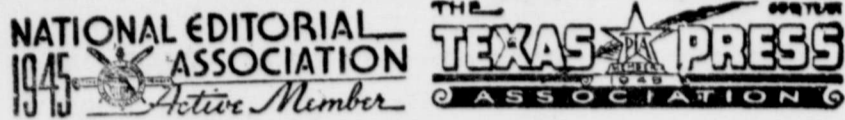

Mrs. Mary Jane Farris was born Dec. 27, 1873 at Moffat, Bell County, Texas, and died November 24, 1945.

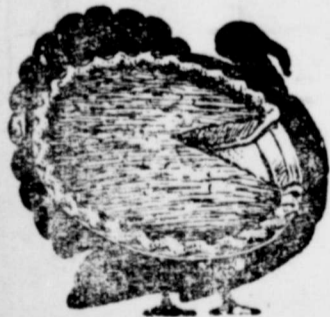
She was converted at the age of 17, and joined the church. She was married to William Nelson Farris, June 25, 1890 at Belton, Texas. Her husband preceded her in death.

# HORNETS FINISH SEASON: DROP 2-DIST. TITLE 38-7

## A-TOMICATS BUTCHER HORNETS LIKE AAA DID CATTLE-HOGS

It was a riot, from the start to finish, and a worse riot at the finish, if possible.

A guy named Mills, was the difference, and what a whale of a difference a few figures make. His number was 88, and if the game had kept on another half, they could have made it 88.

Of course, there were some blocking backs and linesmen that did splendidly for the Blackcats, but the story was MILLS. They came here to avenge a 1-point defeat of last year by the GHS Hornets, there, but they shouldn't have over done it, and folks they didn't leave anything undone. The "35-point" boys, if any, were jittery, and had perfect reason to be.

Let's don't talk about it, just read how it happened. If the Hornets had to pick a "let-down" night, why, oh, why, was it Fri-

day night, but, as we've always Phillips said, we'll bet on the horses.

Now, in all due respect to every one and the Hornets, in particular, we're proud of them. They've played nicely during the season, and, with no let-downs, except in some of the weaker teams they've played, and these didn't show up as let-downs because the count was usually high. Clifton and McGregor, were practically the story for the entire season—the others were hardly competition. So, we guess they just had to let down.

There were three standouts, with reservations, for the Hornets. Tatum was there, as usual, but a little butterfingered. Bone was good in spots, Pennington stopped Mills, and that was a three-man job, but the boy that played his heart out in the game was big Whitt, and he bore the brunt of the line play, and was pretty well assisted by Featherstone, with McDonald and Painter taking an occasional bow. First set-back, was that Frank, had the flu, and tho he tried for a couple of plays, the "bugs" had him, and he couldn't go, and knew it, himself, too well. Anderson and Johnson were seen-sawed in, Anderson on offensive plays and Johnson centering on defense.

Well, anyway, we're champions of District 29, anyway, and that ain't bad, so what. The boys are still O. K. in my book.

Here's how it happened, too roughly.

Mexia receives at north, Hornets kick, from south and defend south goal. Anderson holds, Tatum kicks from own 40, ball goes to Hill on the 10 and he returns to the 35, stopped by Tatum. Mills hits left tackle, stopped by Anderson and Necessary after 3 yards. Mills to McCoslin is stopped by Davis on the 41, 3 yards. Mills carries, and is stopped by Whitt after 3 yards. Mills carries and goes for 1st down, stopped by Tatum and Featherstone. Ball on the 46.

Dickson hits S, stopped by Tatum. Blackburn in, B. Hill out. Time, Mexia. Johnson in, Anderson out. Wilson in, Phillips out. Mills hits C for probably 2 yards, stopped by McDonald. Mills passes and it is intercepted by Bone on his 31, and he returns to the Mexia 49, stopped by Mills. Anderson for Johnson. About 6 substitutions for Mexia that we didn't get. Davidson to Bone incomplete, as he drops. Necessary takes, dropping one yard at rt T, stopped by Deguire.

Tatum can't get going either, stopped by McGuire and Nussbaum, and loses 2. Tatum kicks straight up for 30 yards and the ball rolls back from the 30 to the 35, and its Mexia's ball. That Anderson, Johnson exchange. Wilson for

Mills on a wide end run is thrown out of bounds by Necessary after 5 yards. Mills hands to McCoslin, who fumbles, but recovers, and they drop 5. Mills quick kicks, and Bone covers it on the 40 yard line, momentarily fumbling. That change.

Blackman in, Sawyer out. Tatum weaves and wiggles thru 20 yards to the Mexia 42, stopped by Dickson and Hill. Necessary carries, stopped by Blackmon. 1 yard. Tatum carries, fumbles, and recovers dropping 2 yards. Davidson to Bone over C incomplete. Tatum kicks nicely to the east side of the field and over the goal line. Cats on the 20.

Franks in, Anderson out. Mills carries on a beautiful run down the sideline, and he goes to the 4 yard line before being knocked out. Started on the 20, making a 76 yard run. Time, Hornets. Pennington in, Patterson out. at end. Mills hits left side, stopped by Bone, 1 yard. Mills goes over for 6 points. Dickson holds, McCoslin kicks, and it was good. Mexia 7, Gatesville 0.

Blackmon in, Sawyer out. Hornets receive, Hill holds, McCoslin kicks. Ball to Necessary on the 13, and he returns it to the 42,

stopped by Nussbaum. Davidson passes to Patterson who layed out on the sideline, and it's incomplete. Bad pass from Center and Necessary fumbles, recovered by Mexia on the Hornet 32. Franks goes out. Anderson in. Wilson in, Phillips out. Mills goes wide and is stopped by Necessary on the 28, 4 yards. Mil's passes, incomplete, knocked down by Whitt. Graham for Patterson. Mills goes from there around the Hornet right end, easily, going over untouched. Dickson holds, McCoslin kicks, and it's no good. Mexia 13, Gatesville 0. Pat-

erson for Graham. They kick, to Bone, on the 30, and he returns to the 43, stopped by Hill and Blackmon, as first quarter ends.

The natives were starving — un- oil came— and then, they and the Dutch stayed. The latter were moving them to another island, until the oil was hit in Venezuela.

And, so it goes. It's just an argument, and everybody's entitled to have his thoughts on it, whether for

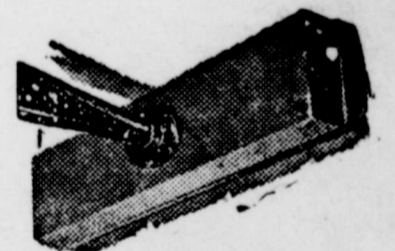
