BULL STORY

HAS HAPPY ENDING

A \$7000 bull lost out of a truck near Gatesville several nights ago has been found and penned up by Jim Herring of McGregor, and R. L. Briley of Winters is a happy man.

Briley, the hauler who was taking the bull from the White Hat ranch near Sweetwater to the Jenkins ranch at Normangee, missed the animal when he got to Marlin Thursday morning, and notified officers, including Sheriff Homer Casey. Telephones started ringing. A bull was penned up in Marlin City park, but Briley looked at him and said he wasn't the right one.

Then Saturday morning Herring telephoned to tell Casey he had the animal, and Casey found Briley at the circle, and Briley went after his bull.

Value of the bull is arrived at by the fact that \$3500 was paid for a half interest in him, according to Briley.

The bull got away when the tail gate of the truck fell down as the truck hit a bump near Gatesville, Briley thinks.—The Waco Times Herald.

Dudley Watkins of Ireland is entering school at A & M college, in Oklahoma City.

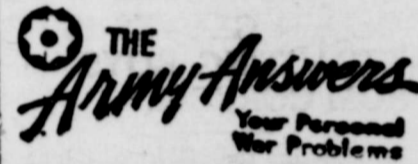

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column.

Q. I am a reserve officer now on inactive duty. If I get the commission in the Regular Army which I applied for, I will be appointed a first lieutenant. Will this put me at the bottom of the first lieutenant's list?

A. You will rank immediately below officers in the same grade in the Regular Army with equivalent or next greater length of service.

Q. I am a veteran who was dis-

charged from the army in November, after four years of service. I was twenty-six when I enlisted. I have been told that there has been a change in the G I Bill of Rights which would now allow me to go to college for four years instead of the one-year refresher training I was formerly entitled to. Is this right?

A. Yes. Both the "refresher or retraining course" and the 25-year-age limitation have been removed from the G I Bill of Rights. A veteran may now get approved education or training for a period of one year, plus a period equal to the time he was in active service. The total period may not exceed four years.

Q. My husband will have 28 months enlisted service in the army next February 12. Can you tell me when he will be discharged under the present army demobilization plan?

A. By next April 30, all enlisted men except volunteers who have 30 months service will be separated from the army. Your husband will have 30 months service by that time. He may be separated before April 30 if his services are not required; if he is surplus to the needs of the station to which he is presently assigned, without replacement and he desires separation.

Q AND A ON CONTINUATION OF SALE OF BONDS

Q. Will the government continue to sell "E" Bonds?

A. Yes. The same type of Savings Bonds that were sold during the war years, and they will carry the same features. Those issued now will be called U. S. Savings Bonds instead of War Bonds or Victory Bonds.

Q. What is the difference between war bonds, victory bonds, "E" bonds and the new Savings Bonds?

A. None, except in name. They are all guaranteed by the government and will be paid according to the schedule printed on them. They increase in value each year. Hold them to maturity for the greatest return on the investment.

Q. What is the interest rate on the Savings Bonds?

A. 2.9% and will return \$4 for every \$3 invested if held to maturity.

Q. Will Savings Stamps continue to be available?

A. Yes. Particular emphasis is being put on their sale through the schools. They will also be on sale at most banks and postoffices as well as through other channels.

Q. How much was invested by Texans in "E" Bonds during the war financing period?

A. \$1,590,576,394 was invested in "E" bonds since the inception of the program in Texas.

Q. Will there be more drives?

A. No, not as such but the savings bond program is being continued into peacetime and special attention will be given the payroll bond issuing agents.

Q. Why should people continue to buy savings bonds?

A. It is a good business for the individual; the return is good and they are a riskless investment within the reach of all. The systematic purchase and holding of these bonds will provide personal security.

Q. How many persons own bonds?

A. 85,000,000 Americans.

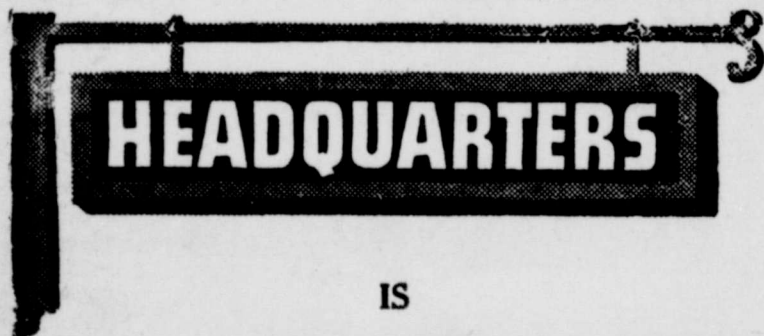
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
