"FAVORABLE" IS REPORT ON BELTON LEON DAM SITE

Here's the substance of a mimeographed War Department, Corps of Engineers Notice of partially favorable report on improvement of Leno River, Texas.

Skipping the preliminaries, it says, partially, as follows:

"a. A dam and reservoir on the Leon River near Belton, Texas, known as the Belton site, for Flood Control and Water conservation to be constructed at the sold cost of the Federal Government; and

b. A local improvement project on the North Fork of the Leon River at Eastland, Texas—Total cost to the United States is estimated at \$11,733,000 for the Belton Reservoir, and \$82,800 for the channel rectification work at Eastland, Texas.

Then, there's a bunch of conditions regarding the Eastland project, but none regarding the Belton site. Then skipping, it says:

"The principal reason for recommending only partial improvement of the Leon River, Texas, is that it was found that the cost of all other projects requested by local interests would exceed the benefits that are expected to be derived therefrom". You can say that about all of them.

"You are notified that all interested parties have the privilege of an appeal from this conclusion to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, a permanent body sitting at Washington, D. C. to which all examination and survey reports of this character are referred. Parties desiring to present any statement or facts concerning the proposed improvements may be heard on an appeal by the Board either orally or in writing. Written communications should be addressed to the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, No. 2 New York Ave., N. W. Washington, D. C. and should be mailed in time to be in the possession of said board within 4 weeks from the date of this communication (February 27, 1946). "If, however, you can't get your dope together in his time, advise, and an extension of time will be granted. There you are, folks. We take another beating!

There are disasters, there is home nursing, there is hospitalization of veterans and care for their families while this is being done, and there are 1001 other things that you could be told about, only you don't need to, because you know them.

Now, he e's only one way to do his, and that is to dig deep and dig quick and meet this quota.

There are still men overseas that need the Red Cross' aid and they've folks at home that needs this help too.

Oh, why do we go on like this? You know what it's all about, and we don't even need to urge you to do your part. You're just going to do it anyway, and Coryell county will again do its bit and oversubscribe another quota. She's never failed yet!

SID GREGORY, JR. HAS STATEMENT FOR VOTERS

To the people of Coryell and Hamilton counties:

This is just to let you know that I will be around to talk to you about your state government. As far as I can see, it is in pretty bad shape.

I always thought the people ran the government and made the laws. But after reading some state laws and after nosing around behind the scenes in Austin I've found some things that do not seem to express the will of the people. Some laws seem to have come straight from the wishes of Big Eastern Corporations—definitely not from the wishes of the people of Texas.

For example, why is it perfectly legal for the New York corporations in the oil and sulphur industries to drain away millions in Texas wealth every year. Yes, we get taxes on our oil from these companies, but those taxes are ridiculously small. Other states make big money on our oil, but the lion's share is still made by the private companies. And that money finally gets into the hands of a few individuals.

Tennessee gets almost as much money per barrel on our oil as we do. Rhode Island, by taxing incoming Texas oil, made enough to pay each one of its returning veterans a five hundred dollar bonus.

At the same time, Texas can find money enough to pay only about half what California pays in old age pensions.

Why this diversion of the people's interests? You know as well as I do that the strength of the corporation's influence is in their heavily paid mob of lobbyists. With their big dinners, big talk in back rooms and unlimited money from the companies they work for, these infest Austin like vultures. They force little men in our legislature to sell the people short. The people many times never hear about the really big deals they put over at the expense of the people of Texas.

These practices of the lobbyists should be exposed again and again by our elected men in the legislature. The people back home have no lobby in Austin. They have only their representative. If he is a victim instead of a force, the farm-to-market roads will suffer delay, and higher transportation rates will gain, to mention two examples:

PRARIE VIEW TO DO STUFF FOR COLORED

AUSTIN, February, 28, (AP)—Governor Coke R. Stevenson said today the spirit of the law passed by the 49th Legislature raising the status of Prairie View Normal for Negroes to a University "should be carried out if there is demand for it."

Commenting on application of a negro for admission to the University of Texas Law School, the Governor said he felt the consummation of the purposes expressed in the new law would solve the entire problem.

FREE-FOR-ALL IN GE STRIKE IN PHILLY

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. February 28 (AP)—Striking General Electric Company workers and sympathizers battled police in a free-for-all today in one of the most violent outbreaks in post-war labor disputes.

Three thousand marchers broke through the police lines three blocks from the plant, bowling over six officers on motorcycles before 18 mounted policemen routed men and women in the parade. Estimated number injured was 20.

SEVENTEEN JAPS SENTENCED IN SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, China, February 28, (AP)—Seventeen Japanese military men were sentenced today, five to the gallows and twelve to prison, for strangulation and cremation of three American fliers at Hankow in 1944.

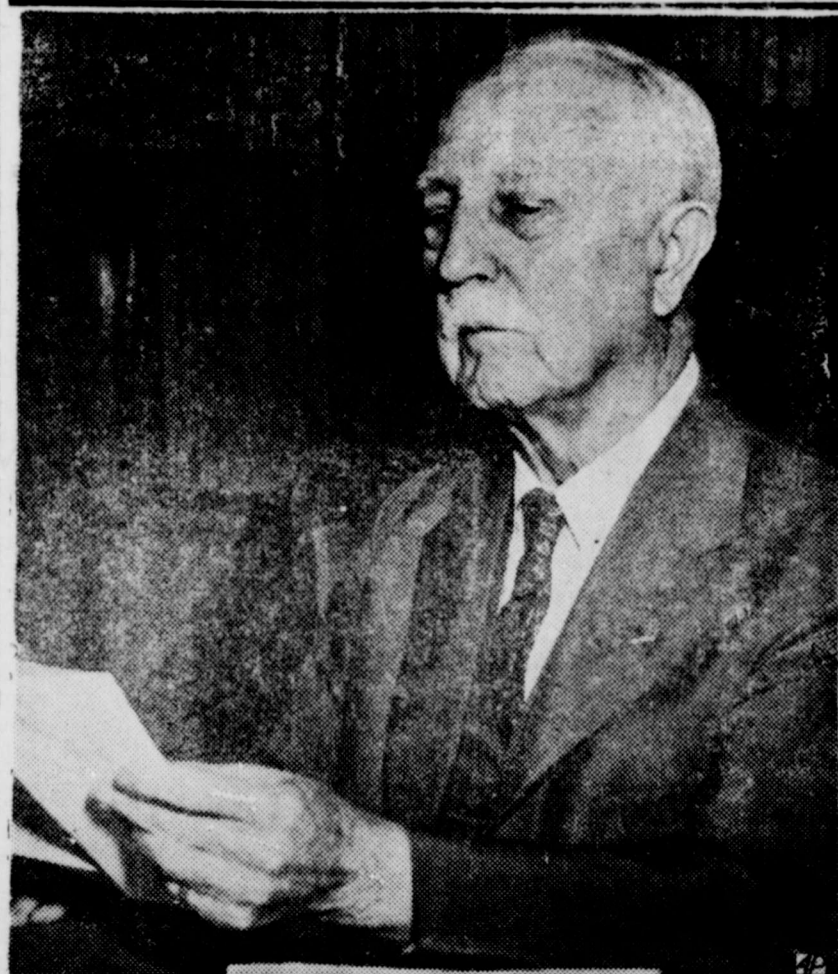

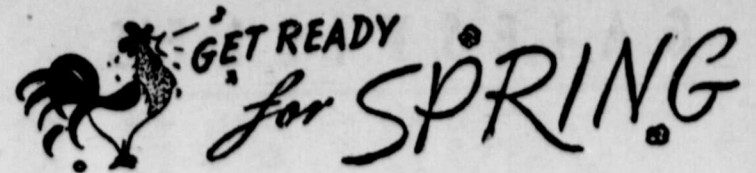

WASHINGTON :

WASHINGTON — There'll be one less tornado in Kentucky this year. Wilson W. Wyatt, former mayor of Louisville, is in Washington.

President Truman has handed him the double-barreled job of housing expediter and national housing administrator. One way or another, the breeze from those appointments still will be blowing when the 1948 elections come around.

The nation's capital got used to southerners kicking up dust a long time ago—as a matter of fact, about as long ago as when the colonies were trying to put 13 eggs in one basket. But for the most part, these southerners took it kind of slow and easy. There always was enough huffing and puffing before the big breeze to give fair warning.

WILSON WYATT isn't like that. He blew into town a month or so ago and he's still blowing a gale which has a staff and a score of committees gasping—and already has blown the roof off a lot of controversies.

That doesn't bother Wyatt a bit. What he's trying to do is put a few million roofs over the heads of America's houseless in the shortest possible time—at least 2,700,000 units in the next two years.

Almost everybody says that's impossible. But there are a few who say the impossible is just what the Kentucky tornado will achieve if he doesn't blast himself and others into utter exhaustion first.

From the day Wyatt hit Washington, he has out-conferred his boss, President Truman, who is just about the champion conferrer of all times. Having only a mayor's localized knowledge of housing problems, the new expediter set out to pass his national housing post-graduate tests in about five weeks.

STARTING his office work around 9 or 9:30 A. M., the genial ex-mayor of Louisville has been working until midnight or even 5 A. M., exclusive of homework. There is the record of one conference that started at 2 p. m.

A BIG BLOW IN HOUSING

and went through until five the next morning, with only time out to munch food that was laid on the conference table. Less than five hours later, the Kentuckian was back at his desk, as fresh as a new-plucked sprig of mint.

Until he announced his program, Wyatt, ordinarily a fairly talkative fellow, didn't do much but study and listen. If there's any government agency or industrial group having anything to do with housing or the materials or labor that go into construction that Wyatt hasn't listened to, it's because it hasn't had any representative in Washington.

In 1941, Wyatt then 37 years old, tossed aside his prosperous corporation law practice to take over the mayor's office in the city of bourbon, fine hesses and good easy-going living.

What happened to Louisville is what happened to a lot of important industrial cities during the war years. It threatened weekly to burst out at the seams. The boys from Louisville here tell me it would have, too, if it hadn't been for Mayor W. W. W.

NEW YORK—Bill Schiller, a smarty who has turned polka dots into decimal points which follow long lists of rich figures in black ink on his company's ledgers, never quits trying to find some new method to interest the world in his constant passion, the circular figures which are on all his ladies' ready-to-wear goods.

His ties, handkerchiefs, underwear and whatever can be designed in that fashion without violating the esthetic tastes of Lucius Beebe and the other best dressed New Yorkers, bear his family trademark. He wishes constantly that men might break down the sartorial rules and wear dotted trousers, suits, hats, even shoes. His new offices are a Norman Bel Geddes riot of circular glass dots inlaid on walls floor and ceiling.

Bill's decision to make a career of polka dots came from his mother.

"When I was a youngster in Brooklyn, just starting out in the clothing business, my mother impressed on me the fact that polka dots are always in style, that as a saleable commodity there would be less gamble in them than in any other designs. Since I decided she must be right, never once have I been struck with any leftover polka dots. My mother used to make clothes for the wo-

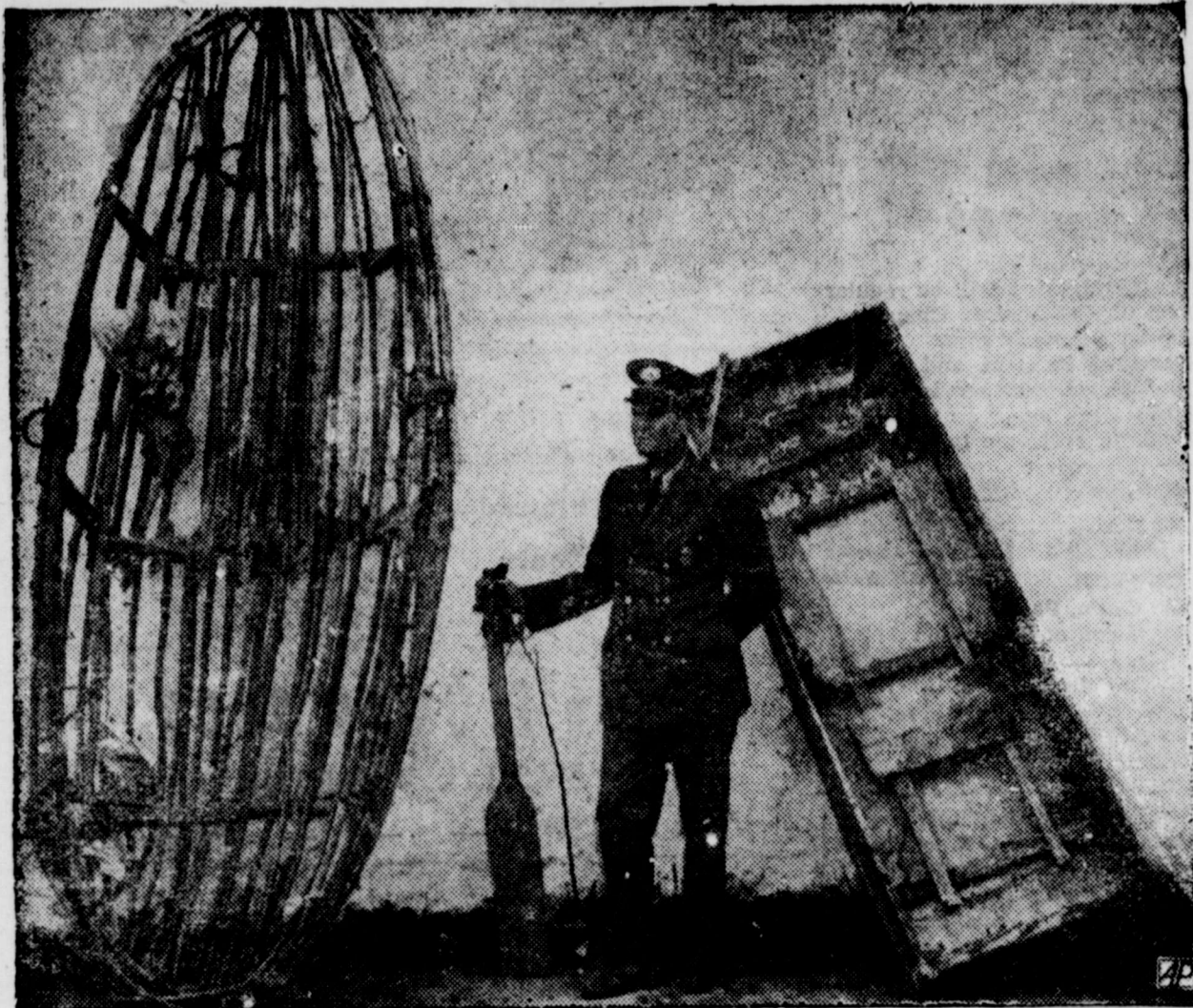
men in her neighborhood, and she found that the dotted dresses were the easiest to sell and that the material could be used for everything — ties and handkerchiefs, even pen-wipers."

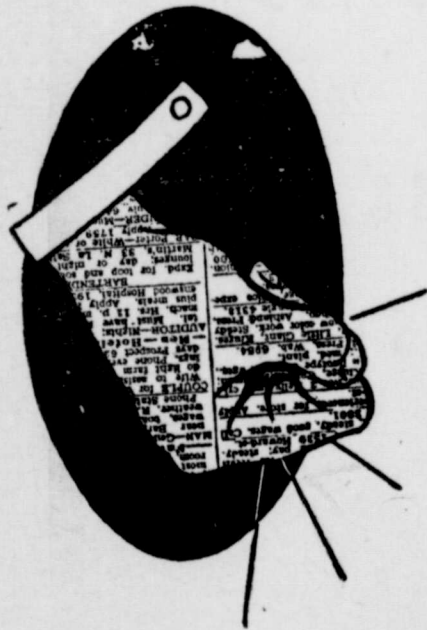

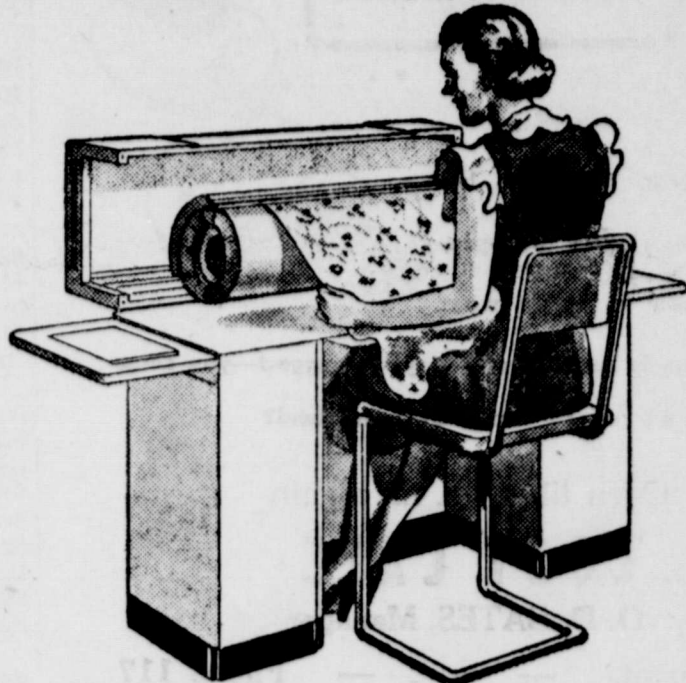
