WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—Labor Department officials said the government seizure of strikebound farm equipment plants and California canneries was increasingly probable. Both have important bearing on the nation's food supply and world starvation.

VON RIBBENTROP ON STAND, NUERNBERG

NUERNBERG, Germany, March 28. (AP) —Joachim Von Ribbentrop, former German Foreign Minister, went to the stand today in his own defense shortly after his former secretary testified a secret Russian-German pact dividing Eastern Europe, including Poland, was signed by Foreigned Minister Molotov and Ribbentrop in 1939 before the war.

The testimony was epmitted over objections of the Russian Prosecutor, General Rudenko.

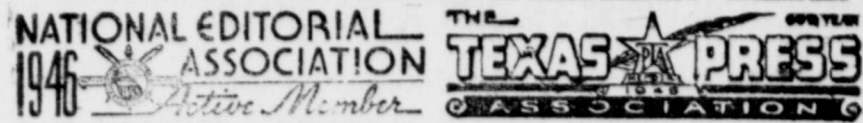

**Old-Fashioned Yegg
Makes Modern Haul**

NEW YORK—(AP)—The safe and loft squad of detectives found special interest in the way a grocery market safe had been blown with nitroglycerin. It was the first time in 12 years that the "soup" had been used on a job in New York.

The sleuths decided the robber was a very old-fashioned thief until they found that in addition to taking \$500 from the safe, he also got away with a tub of irreplaceable butter.
